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New SuperValu and Primary Care Centre for Kinsale town

The announcement that Smith's SuperValu is to open its new store at the Glen, New Road, Kinsale, in 2014 which will include a Primary Health Care Centre has been warmly welcomed by Mayor Tony Cierans.



RNLI lifeboats launch to sinking tall ship Astrid with 30 people on board

Four RNLI lifeboats were launched on Wednesday July 24th to a sinking 42 metre Dutch training vessel Astrid, which had hit rocks inside the Sovereign Islands at Ballymacus Point near Kinsale. All 30 people onboard were brought to safety when Kinsale lifeboat transferred all the casualties from the sinking ship onto Courtmacsherry RNLI lifeboat and a local vessel, the Spirit of Oysterhaven. They were then taken to Kinsale.

Both Kinsale and Courtmacsherry RNLI lifeboats were called out at 12 noon to go to



and was driven on to rocks by a strong southerly wind. The grounded vessel was taking on water and a crewmember from Kinsale RNLI was put onboard. Eighteen of the casualties were taken off the Astrid

by Kinsale RNLI lifeboat and transferred to Courtmacsherry lifeboat, before being brought to safety.

The remaining twelve were put onto a liferaft deployed by the Astrid's crew, which was towed to safety by the Kinsale lifeboat and picked up by a local vessel. The people on board the liferaft were then taken to Kinsale harbour and assessed by medical teams.

Irish Coast Guard helicopters from Waterford and Shannon

were also on scene along with ambulances and medical crews from Cork.

Speaking about the callout Courtmacsherry RNLI Coxswain Sean O'Farrell said, "Everyone was very fortunate. I want to praise the quick thinking of the skipper and the crew from the Astrid. They kept calm and did everything we asked them to do. We were able to get them to safety quickly and a major tragedy was averted. To be able to recover thirty people safely was a great day for everyone involved."

Well done to all the emergency services involved but we are particularly proud of our own Kinsale lifeboat and the RNLI volunteers who give so much of their time and energy and risk their lives in all sorts of weather to save the lives of others. If you wish to show your appreciation for the work done by the RNLI. Kinsale Lifeboat holds its annual Open Day on Sunday August 4th at the Lifeboat station. Everyone is welcome to go along, admission is free but donations are most welcome. It is donations from the public that allow the RNLI to carry out their incredible work. saving lives at sea.



END OF AN ERA AS KINSALE SCHOOLS AMALGAMATE

The end of the 2012/2013 school year marked the end of an era in Kinsale with the closing of St. John's N.S. and St. Joseph's N.S and the amalgamation of the two to form a new school, Scoil Naomh

One hundred and sixty-eight years of dedicated service to education in Kinsale by the Sisters of Mercy came to an end with Mass at St. Joseph's to mark the official closure and graduation of its 6th class. Fr. Robert Young, along with other speakers, paid tribute to past and present teachers, staffs, boards, parents association. clergy and pupils but especially the Sisters of Mercy for their hard work, dedication and commitment. Thanks and best wishes behalf of the Sisters of Mercy were expressed by Sr Mary McAuliffe who was principal when the school opened in 1978.

It was back in 1844, that a widow from Macroom, Mary Ann Burke, who joined the Mercy Order in Limerick, was persuaded by her brother and parish priest in Kinsale Fr Justin McNamara to set up a girls school in the town which had four for boys but none for females.

When the Sister opened the girls' school in the convent in 1845, they had over 700 girls but only six teachers who also had to feed them. During the Great Famine, an inspirational woman, Mother Bridgeman went to Belfast to learn to make nets and set about doing so in Kinsale so that the people could get food to survive and to help the girls become self sufficient later, she also went to Limerick to learn lace making and brought a craft to Kinsale for which the town became world famous and after that the manufacture of shirts and socks for soldiers.

Through lodging the Sisters' salaries in a bank, Sr Mary Baptist helped raise the funds to leave the three storey boarding and day school in the old convent building to the building the new St Joseph's NS in the adjoining grounds and it opened in 1978.

Susan O'Hanrahan, Principal of St. Joseph's, went on to speak about the broad range of subjects and activities, many closely linked to the community, as well as in preparation for and celebration of the sacraments. She particularly welcomed principal and deputy principal of St John's NS, Alice McCarthy and Norah Kenny; retiring principal of the community school Sean O'Broin and his successor and outgoing director of Kinsale College of Further Education Fergal McCarthy and also remembered with fondness the late Oliver Lvnch.

'Now as we make a giant step forward in amalgamating to a co-educational school, I think Mother Bridgeman would have been proud. She saw education as collaborative and community based' said Susan and addressing the Sisters present added: 'We are honoured to be part of your great tradition and we will bring your ethos with us as we move forward and evolve into a bright and promising future'.

The final year pupils were: Kriska Pentek, Polly O'Brien, Aoibheann Gray, Ella Finucane, Grace Ackerlind, Shauna Linehan, Jennifer O'Connell, Jennifer O'Shea, Kellie O'Connell, Kayleigh Kelleher, Nur Adlina Mohammed Ali, Donna Thorpe, Sarah O'Donovan, Siobhan McCallum, Sonia Lech and Sophia Wiggington.

At St. John's N.S. an emotional gathering of past and present pupils, teachers, staff and members of the board of management and parents' association celebrated Mass. Events began with a most interesting slide show by local historian and former principal Dermot Ryan. Kinsale's long history and tradition of education, he said, dated back to the opening of the first national school by the Half Wall (Ramparts) for boys only in 1840. The original St John's NS was run by the Presentation Brothers, known locally as 'The Monks', from 1895 to 1970 (with infants taught in the convent) and the current school, which was officially opened in 1978, was of a modern design with a courtyard and spacious grounds.

He remarked it was a shame that the 35 years old building on spacious ground was being levelled instead of extended or that the site was used to accommodate the fast expanding community school nearby while a new purpose built co-educational school could have been located on co council land adjoining the facilities of Saile Sports and Leisure centre. At the conclusion of the slide presentation, Alice McCarthy made a presentation to Dermot.

Mass was celebrated by Fr Robert Young PP, assisted by Fr Mariusz Placek O Carm while prayers were also led by Canon David Williams.

It concluded with the oldest pupil Darragh Crowley lighting a candle and passing it on to the youngest Aaron Courtney in the presence of Alice McCarthy and the principal of St Joseph's Primary School, Susan O'Hanrahan. It symbolized a new chapter in education in Kinsale with the amalgamation taking place next September into Scoil Naomh Eltin which will be based on the convent site before moving into the new 16 classroom facility currently occupied by St

Tributes were paid by Chairperson of the board and past pupil from the old school at St John's Hill, Tony Greenway, former principal Margaret Canty, Triona O'Neill, on behalf of the parents, and presentations were made by Deirdre McCarthy and Caroline

The final act was for 6th class pupils to ring the school bell (originally at St John's Hill) for the last time, after which refreshments were served by the parents while the boys were treated to goodies and ice cream.

It's never too late to find your passion and fulfil your life through education, said entrepreneur Sean Gallagher, guest speaker with his wife Trish at Kinsale College of Further Education (CFE) Graduation Evening in Acton's Hotel recently.

Certificates were presented to over 200 students of the third level college from all over the world in art, business management, office administration, caring for the elderly, early childhood care and education, theatre performance, classical acting, hotel and catering, culinary art, TV, film and multi media production, outdoor education, permaculture and sustainable horticulture.

On behalf of Kinsale Good Food Circle, Roman Minihane presented scholarships to FETAC Level 5 hotel and catering students Graeme Moorecroft, Ballincollig, and Amber Pierce, Killaloe, Co Clare, to further their culinary studies.

'My first impression is that it must be great craic to be in this college and I really get a sense of the life and dynamism that's present in the room', said Sean who pointed out that it was 20 years since he was in Kinsale when he was working with the National Youth Council and where his wife to be Trish was doing an outdoor education course under Co Cork VEC, which now forms part of the Kinsale CFE curriculum.

The former Dragon's Den panellist, who founded Smarthomes and was a Presidential election candidate in 2011, said his philosophy of life was very much in line with that of the college. In particular, he was a great believer in education to which he returned three times, having not had a great experience initially in primary and secondary school because he had some challenges in terms of learning that prohibited in fully participating.

'After formal mainstream education however, I went to follow my passion; agriculture, farming and the land, and went from being previously at the bottom of the class to the top, because I found something that truly excited me, was interested in and had a passion for,' said Sean.

There was need for each person to find his or her passion through lifelong learning and this often only occurred in later years due to the confines of formal education when a person could ask the questions 'who am I, what really matters to me and what is my purpose in life?'

Never was it so important to re-engage with education, in a time of high unemployment. In doing so, many people transformed their lives by following their heart and stressed, 'it's never too late to be who you could have been.'

Stressing the importance of giving people education right across the board, Sean said it was a pleasure for him and his wife to be among so many students who were so alive and had found their passion and teachers who provided a warm and encouraging environment and wished all graduates a life fulfilled.

Trish Gallagher from Kanturk, spoke fondly of the best two years in her life as an OEC student in which she learned sailing, abseiling, rock climbing, kayaking etc and how to teach sports under the direction of John Thuillier, Jeff Corcoran and others but also the communication, leadership and other skills she learned in Kinsale which stood to her later life as a sports instructor and other careers. She thanked the college and also wished graduates a happy and fulfilled life.

Student representative on the CFE board, Paddy Kelly thanked all the staff and spoke of the great learning experience he gained not just from courses but also from college life in his two years there.

Guests were welcomed by the director of Kinsale CFE Fergal McCarthy who congratulated all graduates and thanked tutors and staff, all of whom he mentioned, including Klaus Harvey who got a standing ovation and administrator Kathleen Maher. He also congratulated Sean and Trish on the recent birth of their son Bobby.

Having told graduates that investing and re-engaging in education in these challenging times, was a wise decision, he went on: 'Austerity as an economic model is a failure and is particularly so when it strikes at education. The effect of such measures for our college next year includes a raising of the teacher-pupil ratio meaning we get less teaching hours and a 35% cut in funding arising from cuts to VEC budgets.

'This is regressive in a time when investment in the type of work we do – providing people with the opportunity to upskill and re-train was never more important', said Fergal who urged the Government not to cut back on education.


Now in its 24th year, it is widely regarded as one of the premier events on the Irish classic car calendar.

For a first brew, Kinsale have absolutely nailed it."

For now, the Blacks are working on making their first

KINSALE MEALS ON WHEELS AGM

The AGM of Kinsale Meals on Wheels was held on 16 May 2013.

Meals on Wheels has operated in Kinsale since the early 1970s. It exists to provide nutritional meals to those in the community who, for a variety of reasons, may not be in a position to prepare meals for themselves. Whilst the service is focussed on Kinsale we provide meals to several clients in surrounding areas. Liaison is maintained throughout with Kinsale-based Public Health Nurses.

Meals are delivered by a team of volunteer drivers on Monday, Wednesday and Friday throughout the year. More than 30 drivers are involved.

2012 represented another satisfactory year for Kinsale Meals on Wheels with more than 2800 meals delivered to our clients in the Kinsale and surrounding area.

During 2012, meals were prepared at the new Haven Bay facility. Meals are collected there and delivered with efficiency and good humour by our team of drivers. We continue to be grateful to all of our drivers who provide such a dependable service throughout the year, come what may and to those on the 'Reserve' list who step in as needed, often at short notice.

Operations were supported by HSE grant which covers around 50% of the cost of the operation, with the remainder being provided by direct contributions from our clients

We acknowledge once again the help and financial support from Kinsale Lions Club, Altrusa Club, Sisters of Mercy and the continuing support from Buttrum and Associates, from Trident Hotel and from HSE.

Old Head Signal Tower could become significant tourist attraction-Dalv

Minister of State, Brian Hayes TD, last week described the efforts of the Courcey's Rural Development Committee as commendable and inspirational following a visit to the Old Head Signal Tower project at Kinsale with local Fine Gael Deputy, Jim Daly.



Speaking following the

visit, Deputy Daly said: 'The project to restore and renovate the Old Head Signal Tower began back in 2010 when a sub-committee of Courcey's Rural Development Association was set up to investigate the possibilities of developing the Tower and its surrounding grounds. A feasibility study was undertaken and the development concept is to restore the Tower as a panoramic viewing point, with a view to using the internal Tower as a space to illustrate its significance and history to visitors. There are also further plans to build an underground museum for Lusitania interpretation and to build a visitor centre including a cafe and craft shop.

"Full planning permission has been granted for the renovation of the Tower and the project is currently the subject of a Leader funding application. As the site is owned by the OPW, the committee requested, though my office, that Minister Haves, who has responsibility for the OPW, would visit the project and see first-hand the potential to develop this attraction for locals and visitors alike."

On visiting the site, Minister Hayes said: 'The progress made to date by the committee is truly commendable and inspirational. I will certainly offer my support in any way I can to help this project succeed. I will be liaising with my colleague Minister Hogan, whose Department has responsibility for Leader funding, to ensure he is fully aware of the significant progress made by this committee so far. Bringing the project to a full planning permission status was no easy task. The committee is to be commended for its work'.

KINSALE & DISTRICT NEWSLETTER

Most appropriately on Trinity Sunday (May 26th), a former practice of 'doing the rounds' was performed after almost a century at a well attended ecumenical ceremony to mark the rerededication of Trinity Well, Fort Hill near Charles Fort.

Spearheaded by mainly local residents who are members of Trinity Well Conservation Group, it's the first phase of a project to restore and maintain the adjoining cemeteries on both sides of the road which were overgrown and neglected for decades.

Carmelite Friar Stan Hession said holy wells were places of reflection and prayer which brought serenity and healing and it was in that spirit they were gathered. He, along with Canon David Williams led the prayers, which included St Patrick's Breastplate, and performed the blessing and this was followed by Fr Norbert Heaslip, O Carm leading the procession of people in prayer clockwise round the restored well with Michael Sheehan and Maureen Bocking at the front.

There is a temporary timber crucifix

above the well where the water is not yet suitable for drinking. Before and after photos of the site taken by Tony Bocking have subsequently been presented to Summercove National School by committee chairperson John McCarthy and secretary PJ O'Callaghan.

PJ O'Callaghan said that in ancient times, a water source was very important for a variety of uses and would often be located near a place of worship. Close to the site once stood Holy Trinity Church serving the former parish of Ringcurran and also a Barry Og Castle which was taken by Cromwellian forces in 1641. Forty-one vears later, it was decided to demolish the church near the well for fear it was used by rebels to attack Charles Fort.

Like many others in Ireland, the water from Holy Trinity Well was believed to have curative powers and a 'Pattern Day' where people 'did the rounds' was held every Trinity Sunday until the early 20th century until this was banned due to anti social behaviour at the site. A recent discovery at the well was what appears to be an Italian Miraculous Medal of Our Lad, a photograph of which was circulated by Cllr Noel Harrington at a recent meeting of Kinsale Town Council.

The final day of the 2013 Covestone Asset Management Sovereign's Cup enjoyed Caribbean-like conditions of 14-16 knots of wind, flat seas and blazing sunshine, to conclude a week of magnificent sailing in Kinsale Harbour at the end of June.

At the Prizegiving Ceremony, Regatta Director Mike Walsh thanked all competitors for taking part and the huge number of KYC volunteers and staff that ensured the smooth running of the event. Also, he thanked Donal Roche, Managing Director of Covestone Asset Management and acknowledged their sponsorship and excellent support.

The Sovereign's Cup 2013 was awarded to Peter O'Leary and his crew on 1720 Sportsboat Spiced Beef, "for their consistency in performance in an incredibly competitive class," according to Regatta Director Mike Walsh. "This was a very difficult decision to make as there were four boats in the running but O'Leary and his team were outstanding in my opinion," he added.

The Spiced Beef crew comprised Peter and Robert O'Leary and Jamie Donegan from RCYC and Cathal Cottrell and Youen Jacob of Baltimore Sailing Club, who were all delighted to accept the beautiful Waterford Crystal perpetual trophy.

The Portcullis Trophy, awarded to the boat with the best performance under ECHO handicap, was presented to Godot, skippered by KYC stalwart, John Godkin.

The idyllic conditions provided the battleground for all classes, who after three days racing remained very tight at the top with all to play for on the final day.

Classes 0 and 1 blasted 'around the cans' course on the final day of racing. In Class 0, Andy Williams' team on-board Keromino stretched their legs in impressive style, displaying awesome power under her A-sail on the downwind legs to finish her regatta with two bullets and the Class 0 overall trophy. RCYC's Corby 39 Gloves Off came home in second with club mate Conor Phelan's Jump Juice pipping Richard Fildes Impetuous into third by a mere half a point.

Class 1 proved to be a battleground between the J109's and A-35's for all podium positions. John Maybury's Joker II with North Sails Ireland Nigel Young calling shots took the laurels on 15 points with Howth YC's Storm coming second on 18 points. Third was Rob McConnell's Fools Gold on 26 points. A mere 3 points separated third from fifth, making this one of the tightest contests of the regatta.

In Class 2, Sovereign's Cup veteran and former overall trophy winner, Anthony Gore-Grimes and his team on Dux proved consistency is the name of the game. Discarding a 10th, the team on Dux never finished outside of the top five to win the class. Wicklow Harbour Sailing Club's Slack Alice took second, with the evergreen Cavatina filling the final podium position.

KYC's paralympian, John Twomey made Class 3 his own, winning all races in his Blazer 23, Shillelagh. John showed a masterclass performance in both the heavy and light airs beating the Foley/Bergin/Byrne J-24 into second place. An T'Oileanach took third place, with both J24's clearly enjoying the planeing conditions downwind.

The 1720 European Championships was an extremely closely fought event. Going into the final day, the leader board remained wide open, demanding consistency in performance in the last two races. Grasping the opportunity was Peter O'Leary and his RCYC/BSC team on Spiced Beef who along with her four bullets from earlier in the regatta,



scored a third and fifth to take the overall title ahead of Tom Forrester-Coles on Ricochet. Third was the Durkan/O'Sea team on T-Bone with Nicholas O'Leary at the helm who, despite winning the final two races, were unable to recover from dropping their rig on windy Friday. Great credit is due to this team who worked well into the Friday night to ensure they made the last two races.

The Quarter tonners had their fair share of excitement over the regatta. Getting these boats downwind in big breeze and rolling seas with the rig pointing in roughly the right direction is no mean feat, as Sam Laidlaw's Aguila displayed excellent crew work and skill to take the class win. Tony Hayward on Black Fun was second with Rob Gray on Cote third on count back from Willie McNeill's Illegal Immigrant.

The White Sail classes enjoyed four great races over the course of great racing throughout the regatta. The Charles Fort line provided an alternative experience for sailors and was deemed a great success by visiting competitors. In White Sail Class 1, the Elan 333 Bite the Bullet took the honours from the Hanse 311 Loch Greine with Emir Herr third. White Sail Class 2 proved an all-Kinsale affair, with Ger and Fiona Grant taking the class win on Loa Zour, Ray Bowes Calero second and Richard Hanley third in his GK24, Saoirse. Loa Zour won the Overall White Sail Trophy much to the delight of skipper and crew.

The Michelle Dunne Prix d'Elegance trophy for the best turned out boat and crew was presented by Carrie Dunne on behalf of the Dunne Family to Andy Williams' Keronimo.

Regatta Director, Mike Walsh made a small presentation to KYC member Denis Kiely, who, 20 years ago had the vision to establish the Sovereign's Cup regatta in Kinsale on the alternate year to Cork Week at RCYC. Mike also made a special

presentation to recognise efforts of Ben Fusco and his young team on the 1720 Sportsboat Merlin with an onboard average age of 17. Closing the prize-giving, Mike announced the next Sovereign's Cup dates of 24th-27th June 2015 welcomed everyone back to Kinsale Yacht Club in the near future.

Kinsale Triathlon Club has held their first and biggest event of the year with their inaugural Fun Fun Fun Kidathlon which ran on July 21st at the Dock beach.

Triathlon is an increasingly popular sport with an event on somewhere every weekend of the season. It consists of a swim, a bike and a run and the distances vary from a 750m Swim, 20k Bike and a 5k Run in a Sprint Triathlon; to a 3.86km Swim, a 180km Bike ride and a 42.2km (Full marathon) run for an Ironman distance triathlon which is not for the faint of heart, however, this event was different, distances were much shorter and so was the height of the competitors.

Age groups ranged from 6-15yrs and they all looked every bit the triathlete, complete with race numbers, goggles, hats and high performance bikes, some even had stabilisers! A fantastic turnout of 112 competitors, most of whom had preregistered, warmed up and completed the course in overcast but humid conditions.

There was separate competitions or "Waves" for different age groups. The swim was in waist deep water and ran parallel to the shore with distances varying from 25m-75m. Both the bike and run legs were on the low road out towards the bridge which was closed to traffic for the duration of the event.

Although for most competitors this was their first event, they clearly knew what to do as they took off their swim hats and goggles while exiting out of the ocean. En route to their bikes some parents helped kids out of their wetsuits leaving the marshals to clip on helmets, take bikes off racks and direct them onto the bike course. Once the bike was finished another guick transition where they re-racked their bikes and started on the run course before crossing the finish line for refreshments.

The purpose of this event is to introduce kids safely into a healthy, fun and social lifestyle. Pre-race we were getting reports of an 8yr old refusing an ice cream because he didn't want to have sugar, and a 6yr old who wanted to know if he






Tony Cierans (Labour) new Mayor of Kinsale

Newport, Rhode Island, and praised the council at a time when the town looked so vibrant.

DISTRICT COURT IN **KINSALE** TO CEASE

There's dismay in Kinsale over the announcement that sittings of the District Court in Kinsale are due to cease and relocate to Bandon by the end of this year.

It will have turned out to be a short reprieve for the harbour town because sittings, held on the first and third Thursday of the month, only resumed there back in January, after an absence of two and a half years.

A 'very disappointed' Mayor of Kinsale Tony Cierans commented: 'Like the abolition of town councils, this distances people from government services. People are reassured when justice is done where the crime was committed. The arrival of the judge. police and media etc shows us that our town has value. The removal of the court tells us that we are regarded as a backwater town. The greater the distance between the people on the street and those who govern and wield justice, the more people will be suspicious of the integrity of the system. It's far easier to trust in and give affirmation to a system that's visible and accessible to the people.

Recently, the Courts Service said it wanted to ensure that future investment

was only made in courts with what it termed 'justifiable case loads'.

President of the West Cork Bar Association and local solicitor Diarmuid O'Shea said it was a huge blow especially after such a hard fought campaign to get the Courts Service to relocate back to Kinsale.

The Temperance Hall in the town centre was always seen as temporary but it was hoped that the little used but spacious James O'Neill Memorial Mill Building owned by Cork County Council could be made available for just two days a month.

Kinsale Court, said Diarmuid, was a busy sitting and holding sittings in Bandon would be a source of great inconvenience to everyone concerned.







OBITUARY - Gerry Galvin, a Kinsale Legend

It is some months now since Gerry Galvin died and almost 30 years since he moved from KInsale to his new home in Moycullen in County Galway where he and and his wife Marie opened their Drimcong House restaurant. Just as was the case with the Vintage, Drimcong went on to win many awards and plaudits and Gerry himself won the Irish chef of the Year award on many occasions There are many in Kinsale who will remember him well and others who will have heard his name mentioned in passing. But whether they knew him on a personal basis or just by reputation they will know that he was one of the most creative and inventive Chefs that Ireland ever produced as well as being an accomplished writer and poet and also a thoroughly nice, gentle and kindly person to all that crossed his path

Gerry and Marie were very close friends of Anne and I over a span of some 50 years and I feel privileged to have been asked to write some words about him in today's Kinsale Newsletter. I met Gerry first at the outset of our careers as fellow students in Shannon Hotel School. In later years we worked together in England and then coincidentally arrived in Kinsale in the same week of 1972; he to manage the Trident Hotel and myself as manager of Actons. Those were exciting days in KInsale - pioneer days really. Peter Barry, Hedli McNiece and Gino Gaio had already blazed a trail for others to follow with their Man Friday. Spinnaker and Gino's restaurants and a few of us newcomers joined them by opening our own restaurants and consolidating Kinsale's growing reputation as the Gourmet Capitol of Ireland. Those of us in the Hotel and Restaurant trade were joined by others in other businesses and walks of life, some Kinsale born and others who came to make their home here, but all of whom recognised the potential and importance of tourism to the town and formed the voluntary Kinsale Community Promotions which later became the Kinsale Chamber of Tourism, funded by local businesses with another Kinsale legend Mrs Peggy Green at the helm. The Wild Geese weekends of the mid seventies helped to fill most hotel and guesthouse beds during the "shoulder season" months of April and May while the Gourmet Festival did likewise in October. The Galvins played a vital role in both organisations making Kinsale the Jewel in the Crown of Irelands Tourism industry. In 1974 Gerry and Marie started the first 'Vintage' in what had been O'Sullivans Restaurant/ Cafe in Main Street and a year later moved across the road to where they soon established what was to become one of Ireland's most well known and best-loved restaurants.

Gerry had a unique way of using simple, fresh and just as important, local products with stunning effect. He featured dishes such as Clonakilty Black Puddings, combining them with apple compote, onion and apple sauce and even west Cork Oysters. Those of us who were fortunate enough to sample his cuisine fondly remember dishes such as grilled skewered Scallops wrapped in bacon, and coated with breadcrumbs, rosemary and olive oil; baked fish gateaux, sweetbreads with mushrooms and sumptuous vegetable dishes such as Turnip Bake, Stir-fried Cabbage with mushroom, onion and bacon and Potato and Vegetable Cake to name just a few. Gerry and Marie operated their restaurant

only at night-time and closed for the winter months with the result that their growing family of Cristina, John and Jenny saw much of their Mum and Dad and enabled them to forge many personal friendships despite the demands of their busy

restaurant enterprise.

Gerry produced his first cookery book "The Drimcong Food Affair" some years later, followed by his "Everyday Gourmet", both of which revealed many of his dishes and his whole philosophy of food. To quote him from one of his books - "I want to spare would-be cooks the annoyance of having to seek out exotic ingredients and to invest time and thought in preparing sensible, happy meals".

His book of unique poetry "No Recipe", based on his life experiences was launched in Galway by now President Michael D O'Higgins in 2010 followed shortly by his first published novel "Killer a la Carte" - a thriller which tells the tale of a Food Critic- one James Livingstone Gall- who was also a serial killer. In real life Gerry himself had a sometimes critical view of 'Food Critics'.

In the aftermath of the Drimcong House experience Gerry and Marie created a lovely home just outside nearby Oughterard and lived happily and contentedly while enjoying the company of family and friends as well as finding time to write food related articles for magazines and newspapers and devoting time to his beloved books and poetry. We shall not see his like again.

CROWLEY CLAN GATHERING LAUNCH

CALLING all Crowleys! The clan is coming together, most appropriately in 2013 Gathering Year, in Kinsale from September 13th to 15th and has put together an impressive line-up of events set to attract Crowleys and their friends from near and far.

Details were outlined at an enjoyable launch in clan taoiseach Jerry Crowley's Crossmahon Bar near Bandon recently by PRO Liam Crowley.

The Crowleys, said Liam were a branch of the McDermotts from Connacht whose bravery in the Battle of Clontarf in 1014, according to The Annals, was seen by the High King of Ireland, Brian Boru himself. He was so impressed by one that he gave him the name 'O Chruadhlaoich' meaning 'Hardy Warrior'.

The O'Crowlevs, Liam continued, were noted for their fighting skills, mainly as mercenary soldiers on the side of clans along the west of Ireland and by the mid 1400s settled and became well established in West Cork. The ancestral castle and tower at Ahakeera, four miles north of Dunmanway is believed to date from the 16th century.

All changed at the Battle of Kinsale in 1601, which effectively heralded the end of gaelic Ireland and Lord President George Carew ordered that every O'Crowlev be killed. As a result, the clan disintegrated and following subsequent uprisings against the English, penal laws and plantations, many fled to continental Europe and the Americas.

'We can be very proud of our origins and what we stand for', said Liam Crowley who pointed out that the first clan gathering took place at Kilbrittain Castle and the Pink Elephant in 1967. It was held every year, then faded for a time but thanks to Tom Crowley in the USA and others in the Crowley Clan Council, was revived in the late 'eightes and held every three years since at different places with great success. The previous clan gathering in Kinsale in 2010 was attended by over 200.

Looking ahead to the 2013 gathering. Liam said 'We need to get the information out there and would particularly like as many Cork and Irish Crowlevs to come to Kinsale in September, bring along their family trees and re-connect with fellow clan members from overseas We are also planning to stage a special event in 2014 to mark the 1000th anniversary of the Battle of Clontarf'.

County Cllr Kevin Murphy added his best wishes and assured everyone of



a warm welcome to his native Kinsale stressing it was so important in the year of The Gathering to bring visitors to Ireland and boost tourism and the economy. Indeed, said Jerry Crowley, the Trident Hotel and other venues were already booked out for the weekend in mid September.

Cllr Murphy pointed out that Crowleys continued to reside in and around the battlefield of Kinsale while the late Representative Paul Crowley was a major driving force in the twinning of Kinsale with Newport, Rhode Island, USA. A notable member of the clan today is Bandon based MEP Brian Crowley.

Canice was a great darts player, playing for many local pubs over years and winning many medals and trophies. He is remembered for his large feathered


He had a great love for Manchester United, Munster Rugby, Cork Hurling and Football, wearing the jersey to match the sporting occasion every Saturday and Sunday.

K-CoRD Launched in Kinsale

At a recent public information evening by K-CoRD, (Kinsale Community Response to Dementia) a strong appeal was made for members of the public, those affected by dementia and their carers as well as health care professionals from the catchment area to register with the network.

'It's all about persons with dementia being able to remain, where possible, at home and active in their communities', said project leader Dr Tony Foley who pointed out that Kinsale was one of four towns in Ireland chosen to pursue this thanks to support from Atlantic Philanthropies and the HSE through the charity Genio.

Dementia, he stated, was an umbrella of symptoms relating to memory, personality, behaviour and communication, of which Alzheimer's was the most common. 'One in three people over 65 will develop dementia. 41,000 were diagnosed with it in Ireland 2012 and the figure is likely to be 140,000 by 2041.

Individualised supports were needed because the challenges were different for everyone. In that regard, working groups had been set up to address key priorities: 1) supporting persons with dementia and their carers; 2) creating educational opportunities; 3) developing assistive technologies and 4) fostering a dementia friendly community.

Serving a catchment area of around 25,000 people, K-CoRD, said Dr Foley, had around €200,000 per annum funding for a monitored three year programme, which by 2016, he stressed, must continue to be cost effective choice, offer a a good quality of life and be sustainable.

He spoke enthusiastically about the education and training working group which already had a workshops for volunteers and links with the community school, hospitals, Haven Bay and Cramer's Court care homes and Kinsale College of Further Education (CFE) the latter of which has Ireland's first dementia specific module course approved by City and Guilds, London.

'We still need ideas and new energy. We need to expand our voluntary network, find out who needs help and form a register of interested people. Public support can change the lives of people with dementia and even one hour a week cold make such a difference, said Dr Lane who added that K-CoRD's project manager is Liz Creed at its office based in Apartment 24, Haven Bay Village, Kinsale, Tel 021-4709700, e mail: info@kcord.ie

Occupational therapist Deirdre Cullen emphasized the importance of early diagnosis of and engagement with people who have dementia. Such persons had a right to know but also a right to continue participating fully in the community and be treated with dignity and respect.

K-CoRD fully endorsed the Genio principle of providing

person centred care and she spoke about the need to be innovative and flexible such as trying to match carers and persons with dementia who would have similar interests.

Carer Ann Twomey, spoke about 'assistive technology', a term used to describe devices in the home, etc. which enable a person to perform a task he or she would otherwise be unable to do. The working group aimed, without pressure, but through a balanced approach, to make a person with dementia more self reliant, independent, confident and also

Dr Micheal Hynes said there was already great community support, most notably through Healthy Options Projects, Positive Ageing Week and Bealtaine. He referred to the K-CoRD café, a carers' solidarity group, buddy walking and initiatives through the local arts, sports bodies and tourism/hospitality sectors. 'Let us work together to create a dementia friendly community in Kinsale,' he added.

A question and answer forum in which Cllr Noel Harrington called for more hours and funding for home carers who do so much good work and save the HSE millions of euro by freeing up hospital beds.

First youth health worker for Kinsale area appointed

KINSALE and district's first youth health worker, Tom Walsh, was formally announced by Minister of State for Mental Health, Kathleen Lynch TD on behalf of Kinsale Youth Support Services (KYSS) at a well attended function in the Carlton Hotel in May.

The 51 year old from Crosshaven, who is married with two teenage daughters and has a background in youth work in alcohol and drug intervention, said he was 'hugely excited' on his appointment, the first of its kind in West Cork. He was hugely impressed by the community spirit in Kinsale and surrounding parishes where he will work and stressed he was 'a real person,' young people experiencing difficulty or concerned family members or friends could phone (085-8725789) and meet.

Minister Lynch, along with all other speakers, paid tribute to KYSS for its outstanding achievement since its establishment in 2010, especially the infectious enthusiasm, energy and determination of its founding chairman James O'Mahony and his committee who were actually doing something for the well being of youth and their families. She also praised the Health Service Executive (HSE) for its financial backing of KYSS and the

Congratulating KYSS, Minister Lynch said: 'the policy is national but the solution is local and stressing the importance of everyone working in partnership, assured Tom Walsh that he wasn't alone but had the full support of the HSE, the Government, KYSS and an entire community wishing him well.'

Mariel Twomey gave an outline of the work to date of KYSS serving a catchment area of 10,000 people which, following extensive consultation, had included an awareness day and the launch of a website and the booklet Mise (My Life) which addresses the stigma of mental health. drug and alcohol addiction. More recently 'Minding Young People's Mental Health' talks were held and following a competition, wrist bands distributed with the slogan 'Take Care, Help is There'. KYSS was also on Facebook and there was fantastic support from Riverstick Foroige Club, with its Reliant Robin/KYSS car and poster display, plus many other organizations and local individuals. The KYSS model, she added, was replicated in areas over Ireland.


Fellow KYSS member Dr Tony Foley said a youth health worker for the Kinsale area was sorely needed. The My World National Youth Survey conducted by the Headstrong and the Dept of Psychology at UCD in 2012 revealed that mental health difficulties emerged in early adolescence and peaked in mid teenage years and it was here that intervention was needed to address the risk factors of alcohol, drugs, anxiety and depression.

Dr Foley went on to thank the committee, Eli Lilly, Southern Regional Task Force and Cariosa Lynch, Karen Mullane and Gretta Crowley of the HSE.

Gretta Crowley on behalf of the HSE, said was struck by the common unity of purpose in Kinsale born out of listening to young people and congratulated all concerned. It was really important for people to take personal responsibility for mental health and KYSS was a model of excellence at local level through people working together at a time when services are constrained by the current economic position and added that the HSE had a responsibility to support such a body to find effective solutions.

Chaplain to over 800 students at Kinsale Community School (KCS) Honor O'Brien, in the course of an eloquent description of her role based on the core message 'help is there', said it was a very important occasion, and acknowledged the great support provided by KYSS, of which she is a member, for young people in need. She said she looked forward to working with

Fifth year KCS pupil and Riverstick Foroige member, Amy Morgan said having




KYSS and a youth health worker was very reassuring and had this message 'it's okay to have a bad day and very important to talk'.

My sister and I were adopted as babies from Hunan province in China. I was so excited heading off. Even though this was to be my second trip back since my adoption, to me it was like the first. I don't remember the last time as I had just turned 3.

We flew from Cork to London to Shanghai. When we arrived in Shanghai 24 hours later our guide Linn picked us up and brought us to our hotel.

On Sunday 24th at 8 in the morning, our guides Linn and Kevin picked us up and brought us to the Science museum. It was huge and had 4 floors.

After that we went to the YuYuan gardens which gave us a glimpse of ancient China. There was a pond there that had huge gold fish the size of salmon! Finally we were brought to Nanjing road which is a really busy shopping street. The mums were delighted at first but then really disappointed to be told that they only had half an hour!

To finish the day we went to see an acrobatic show. It was really amazing but the funniest bit of all was that a lot of mums and dads fell asleep!

On Monday, most families were brought to the airport or train station to begin our journeys to the provinces where we were born. With one other family we flew to Changsha in Hunan. We checked in to the Dolton Hotel. We got really cool rooms. We were up graded to the executive floor due to a mistake in our booking. I found Hunan very different than Shanghai. While we were there we went to see a lot of famous sites. One day we went to Saoshan, Mao Ze Dong's home town. When we went to statue square where there was a big monument of Mao, we met a big group of other kids on their school tour. All of a sudden there were hundreds of school children surrounding us. I felt like a film star because all they wanted is to take photos of us. They were even practicing their English on us.

Another site we got to see in Hunan was Orange Island. There was a big stone head and shoulders of Mao at 17 years of age. Inside it will eventually be a museum.

My favourite part of our trip to China was going to visit Xinhua where I was born. En route there we staved in a hotel in Loudi, which was about 1 1/2hours away from Xinhua. A funny thing happened in the hotel. We needed another bed in our room and our guide told the house keeping staff. The next thing there was a knock at our door and the house keeper indicated that something was coming to the room. We presumed it was the bed. Instead we got a big shock as we were brought a fridge freezer instead! Mummy said we didn't need it and so they

Meadhbh and I are really lucky to be from the same orphanage. We got to meet the director that was there when





we lived there. She is now retired but came back to meet us. We met the new director also. We went shopping with the staff for the orphanage and it was really nice to see the children with such smiles on their faces playing with the bikes and push cars we bought for them. We travelled back to Loudi, tired but happy. Wait for it. What was in our room – the fridge-freezer!!

On Easter Sunday we flew to Chengdu, which is the capital of Sichuan and that night we went to see Sichuan opera and mask changing show. It was really spectacular seeing the mask changing. At one stage they threw masks into the crowd and Aoibhe and I were lucky to get one each. Mummy made sure Meadhbh wasn't left out and bought her one at the end of the show.

Let me tell you about some of the food in China. The food very much depends on the province you are in. In the province I came from there is a lot of chili used and therefore the food is very spicy. Hardly any lean meat is used. We saw plenty of fat and bones - Yuck! As in other provinces they serve the birds complete with heads and claws. One night in Changsha Aoibhe and one of the other girls on the trip ate ducks tongue and snake. One night there were little cooked turtles on offer. Double Yuck!! But we did have lovely food too. My favourite was the sweet and sour chicken and the kung pao chicken even though they were different than having them in Ireland.

The next morning it was a very early start. We left the hotel at about 5am to get our flight to Beijing. Once we got there we went to the Forbidden City. It was really nice there and it was a lovely sunny day. When we came back we went to Kung Fu show. That was a really good show. My brother Enda would have loved it. Mummy bought the DVD of the show to bring home to him. Between all the shows we went to, the acrobatic show in Shanghai, the Sichuan opera in Chengdu and the Kung fu show in Beijing I liked the Kung Fu show the best.

The next day went to visit the Great Wall of China. We got the cable car up. We had to walk for an hour or more before we reached the tobogganing area. The steps were very uneven. It was again a lovely sunny day and had a lot of up and down as we travelled across the Great Wall. Once we reached the tobogganing area I was so excited and could not wait to toboggan down the Great Wall. It was really great fun and I can't wait to do that again sometime. Later that evening we went on a rickshaw which was also very exciting. We visited the Hutong area of Beijing and had dinner there in a family

On our last day in China we went to the water cube in the Olympic Village. That was one of the highlight of the trip for me. Part of the water cube has a water amusement section. There was so many water slides and they were all really great fun. Let me back! After that we went to the restaurant for a pecking duck lunch.

Overall I think my experience to China was amazing. It was the best holiday I've had in my whole life. I can't wait to return and visit China in a few years time again. Next time I'll bring my dad and my brother Enda. Dad will be great for carrying the bags!!

TEMPERANCE HALL, KINSALE

KINSALE & DISTRICT NEWSLETTER

The Temperance Hall, Kinsale's example of Victorian architecture, constructed in 1885 at the top of the pier where the waterfront meets the town, has in recent years enjoyed a renaissance. This is attributable to new administrative structures and an energetic determination to undertake necessary preservation and essential restoration work. Being owned by the community the finance required to undertake the repairs and run the building are raised through income generated from the use of the hall. Apart from capital expenditure, the day to day cost of heating, lighting, insurance and the extensive range of maintenance is a constant challenge and a major budgeting task for the committee.

New windows, gutters and shutters in traditional materials have been fitted. Major work was undertaken on the roof and the dangerous condition of the chimney made it necessary to have it replaced. A number of the windows and doors have been renewed all subject to stringent planning conditions. Fire alarms and emergency lighting have been installed to satisfy safety requirements. New chairs and display boards were purchased and the kitchen and toilet have been replaced. As part of upgrading facilities heating has been improved and extensive redecoration internally and externally has been

The physical improvements have created

greater demand for the use of the hall which continues to be made available on the principal that it is a community facility which has been its purpose from the beginning. It is synonymous with fund raising for charity and good causes making the central location ideal for coffee mornings, bring and buy sales etc. Activities ranging from keep fit, tae kwon do, set dancing to drumming have found a home in the hall. Art and craft exhibitions take place regularly. It is also the venue for youth activities, active retirement groups, bowling, drama, lectures and talks. These are just a sample of the variety of activities that take place and the committee is most anxious to facilitate any group who wish to use the hall on a strictly noncommercial basis.

All this is organised and coordinated by the hall committee elected annually at the AGM which is open to the public. When established in 2005 the first task undertaken by the management group was to draw up a constitution whose initial objective was to vest the ownership of the hall in the community. Working unobtrusively and without publicity successive committees have concentrated on day to day operation and putting administrative structures in place to insure efficient use. While fees are kept at a minimum all users are asked to contribute a fixed rent. This is based on the principle of being fair to everybody and on the need for the hall to pay its way



particularly at a time of escalating charges for heating, lighting, insurance, on-going maintenance and finance to cover the costs incurred by the committee's effort to improve the facilities.

Currently the present committee have embarked on a project to improve the internal look of the hall with a grant application with West Cork Development Partnership which presents some problems because of the nature of the building and its 19th century character. The objective is to look to the future, extend possible uses. make the interior more comfortable and the building a welcome venue.

Evocative black and white images celebrate a silver anniversary

IRELAND ● Timeless Images by Giles Norman

A chance request to photograph a school project provided renowned photographer Giles Norman with his first opportunity to use a camera and, by 1981, he was creating his first portfolios. He developed a distinctive style, of black and white to deliver the essence of his subjects while travelling Ireland in search of images. To mark twenty-five years since the opening of his gallery in Cork, Giles presents over 150 of his most enduring images in this remarkable collection. From rugged headlands and windswept oceans to fragile flora and shadowed skies, these images capture the timeless splendour of Ireland.

Since the gallery opened in historic Kinsale thousands of visitors have witnessed Giles' special talent. Giles may have inherited his talent from his mothers's family as her great-uncle was the Belgian painter, Henri de Braekeleer, one of Van Gogh's great influences, whose paintings still hang in the Royal Museum of Fine Arts in Brussels.

Giles' images of the Irish landscape that evoke a purity of vision, mostly stripped of manmade intrusion. Wider views of wild, remote places intermingle with small details of windows and moments in urban and rural life with little concession to the human form. Preferring to keep his pictures 'real', he shuns the special effects of modern photography. Skeletons of fishing boats, lonely roads, deserted ruins and cobbled streets speak of a life apart from the image, and of our temporary passage. A shaft of light between clouds, a breaking wave, the elegance of a single flower remind us how special these moments are. The emphasis Giles places on the art rather than the science of photography makes his photographs more engaging and memorable. Accompanied by his own observations and insights on his work, Ireland - Timeless Images by Giles Norman is a must for anyone who shares Giles' passion for photography and the Irish landscape.




