KINSALE HARBOUR BOARD FACES DISSOLUTION

After waiting for 13 years for the findings of a report by KPMG to be implemented, it seems control of Kinsale Harbour is finally to be transferred from the Department of Transport, Tourism and Sport to Cork County Council in the very near future, according to the members of Kinsale Harbour at its September meeting.

Originally established in the 1890s, the local voluntary Harbour Board has overseen the running of the local port for over one hundred and twenty years, with current board member, Mr Eamon O'Neill, being the fourth generation of the family to serve on the local statutory body.

While the decision came as no shock to the nine voluntary members of the local Harbour Board, the manner in which the decision was communicated certainly angered the Harbour Commissioners.

Chairman of the Board, Mr Tony Lane, led the condemnation of the Department of Transport, Tourism and Sport's decision not to inform the Board officially of its decision to transfer the running of the local sea-side port to Cork County Council.

Mr Lane said the members had learned of the decision at the side of the street and to the voluntary members, including Mr Frankie Kiernan, who served for 42 years on the local statutory body, it was a disgrace.

Mr Lane pointed out that the Harbour Board is a very cost effective and efficient body, with fellow Harbour Commissioner, Mr Pat Guilfoyle agreeing with the Chairman's comments, adding Cork County Council had no expertise in running a busy port.

Certainly there was concern among the members of the local board that the existing expertise in running the busy port would be lost when the board is dissolved.

In response to the issues raised at the recent Harbour Board Meeting, a spokesperson for the Department of Transport, Tourism Sport said: "The Department has officially written to the Regional Harbours, including Kinsale, on many occasions during this process. Letters issued to the Chairman of all the remaining Regional Harbours in March 2011, again including Kinsale, informing them that the Department was reviewing the assets, liabilities and staff of the Regional Harbours in advance of their transfer to Local Authority control. Kinsale Harbour Authority have co-operated in this process, however no decision has been reached yet on a date for the transfer of Kinsale Harbour."

Cllr Alan Coleman, who is also a member of the local Harbour Board, speaking after the meeting, said: "The retention of the board members in running the port is my priority, even in an advisory capacity." The local Fianna Fail elected representative is set to raise the matter with County Manager, Mr Martin O'Riordan.

In addition to the future of Kinsale Harbour Board and the manner in which the decision was communicated, the members also raised the issue of funding for the completion of works within the confines of the harbour as well as the employment entitlements of the two existing Harbour Board employees.

Member of Cork County Council and the local Harbour Board, Cllr Kevin Murphy said the Council had only recently learned of the transfer and no concrete information was available for future plans."

Cllr Murphy went on to state that he had spoken to the County Manager on the subject and the top official at the County Hall is set to address the elected representatives at a full meeting of Cork County Council on Monday 26th September, with a spokesperson from County Hall later confirming that issue has been placed on the agenda for the meeting on the 26th September.

LUSITANIA MYSTERY TO BE SOLVED?

The sinking of the Lusitania off the Old Head of Kinsale in May 1915, with the loss of 1198 lives, has long being the subject of much controversy. In particular, the debate has focused at the speed of the Cunard owned Liner's demise after it had been struck by a single German torpedo.

Much speculation has centered on the ship's cargo and the possibility of it carrying ammunition for the allies, with the impacting German torpedo causing a catastrophic explosion, sending the ship to the ocean floor in under twenty minutes.

Despite a number of Archaeological Historical Dives, including most notably those conducted originally by John Light and later by Robert Ballard, no evidence has been found to substantiate the claims.

However, a new Archaeological Historical Dive Expedition has been commissioned by an American company to investigate the mystery. Two of Ireland's foremost underwater archaeologists, Mr Laurence Dunne and Ms Julianne O'Donoghue, have been employed to oversee the project and have spent the month of August conducting an extensive probe using the most sophisticated equipment to conduct their inquiry. Mindful of the site as a national monument and a mass grave of the victims of the disaster, Mr Dunne said "all of our activity carried out on the site was done with the outmost respect for those individuals who lost their lives."

In fact, before the expedition began, a commemoration service was held on board the Irish Lights Vessel, The Granuaile, which had been employed in the month-long project. In addition to the extensive survey of the vessel, a number of objects, including the bronze telemotor, part of its steering mechanism, and its telegraph and four portholes were also recovered as vital components of the forensic investigation into the Lusitania's sinking.

In relation to resolving the mystery that has surrounded the vessel since its sinking in May 1915, Mr Dunne said the data is currently being reviewed and no conclusions will be made until all the information has been collated.

However, as the expedition is the subject of a National Geographic Documentary, the public will have to wait until May 2012, when the programme will be aired on the satellite channel before the findings are made public.

The Sáile team are busy rallying support for phase two of the project, Kinsale Sports and Community Centre. 'People have been so supportive already,' said Siobhán Green, marketing and fundraising coordinator for Sáile, 'our aim now is to raise awareness and keep that support up.' With phase one complete, the pitches in place and in regular use, the next phase is the building, which will be a hub of activity for the town. The proposed centre, costing €2 million, will include a community/ sports hall, a gymnasium, meeting rooms, dance studio and children's playground. It's hoped to commence construction work in 2012.

The current facilities include a state of the art floodlit synthetic grass facility, tennis and basketball court, grass training & events pitch and a community garden & orchard. The all-weather facility is proving very popular with teams travelling from as far as Cork City and Bandon to play. It is used regularly by local sports clubs for their training. No membership is required to use the facilities; they operate on a pay as you play system.

Last year Sáile hosted a men's soccer league, community planting days, Easter and summer multi-activity camps and micro soccer coaching sessions. All of these were a great success and Sáile hopes to build on this during the coming year. A

ladies social soccer league is starting in October. It's a great way to keep fit for the winter months and have some fun. All abilities are welcome. Teams will be selected on the night. Sáile are launching a Lifestyle Scheme in October which means students, unemployed & over 55s can register to receive discounts or savings on all the facilities. Sáile are hosting a Sunday Lawn Games Afternoon on 25th September to celebrate Positive Ageing Week and National Grandparents Day. It's a great opportunity to participate in croquet, boules and much more. Activities to keep the smallies entertained and refreshments will be available.

around and a chance for the Sáile team to say thank you for all the support so far. The third fundraiser is a joint community initiative run in conjunction with Macra na Feirme. 'We are hoping to tap into a new innovative fundraising initiative - while cleaning up the local environment in the process,' said Siobhan Green. 'We are very excited about this joint initiative and will be asking for people in Kinsale and the surrounding areas to donate their scrap metal that is lying idle in yards, barns, garages and fields. We will be looking for all your unwanted scrap metal, old tractors, farm machinery, scrap cars, copper electrical goods - the list is endless! If you have any scrap metal hold onto it and let Sáile and Macra na Feirme take it off your hands in October and dispose of it for free. From Surf to Ironman

Congratulations to Andrew Lockington on completing the Frankfurt Ironman in July. The Ironman is the ultimate triathlon, consisting of a 2.4-mile swim, a 112-mile cycle and a marathon run (26.2 miles), raced in that order and without a break.

Andrew has always been interested in sports. When he finished school in 1997 he became an outdoor instructor at Delphi. His love of surfing led him to open his own surf shop, Offshore, here in Kinsale four years ago. When a shoulder injury kept him off his surfboard last year he moved his focus to

other sports. With the 2006 Dublin marathon and the 2009 Gaelforce already under his belt, he had been thinking about braving the Ironman for a while. Then when a friend of his was diagnosed with a serious illness he made a personal decision to do it for him.

Andrew started training on December 1st and from then until July whenever he was away from his shop, he was probably out running every road near his home in Garrettstown or cycling to Glandore and back via Cork city. At the height of training he was covering 450km and burning 10,000 calories per week.

'The hardest part of the training', said

Andrew, 'was going to bed at 8pm when it was still bright and all the other kids were out playing.' The 5am starts were more than a little unpleasant too. Overall he enjoyed the training though he does warn that 'it's all consuming. As well as the training there is

the careful planning of what to eat, bike maintenance, physiotherapy, and the neverending laundry of sports gear!' On July 24th Andrew hit the water in Frankfurt at 7am, one of a group of 2117 people all swimming over and under each other. 11 hours and 26 minutes later, in better time than he had

hoped for, he ran across the finishing line, a very happy Ironman. 'The whole experience was amazing, the weather and the scenery were great. I met people from all over the world. I'd recommend it to anyone,' he said. He is already looking forward to doing another Ironman.

Meanwhile Andrew's surf shop, Offshore, will be hibernating this winter but will be returning in the spring with a new look and fresh stock. Wetsuits, booties and hardware will continue to be available throughout the Winter on his website and facebook page.

Age Action Ireland set up Positive Ageing Week as a festival which highlights the positive aspects of ageing and honours the contribution older people have made and continue to make to their communities. Sponsored by ESB Electric Ireland, the central aim of the week is to celebrate the fact that we are living longer and that ageing is not a burden but an opportunity. Events are

held all over Ireland for the festival. Last year Kinsale had a coffee morning to mark the week. This year with the help of funding and being a designated Positive Ageing Town, there is a packed schedule for the whole week.

There will be up to three events a day, catering to a cross section of interests. Some of these include a poetry night in Kinsale

Bookshop for Culture Night, fitness classes, a trip down memory lane at St. John's school, a pamper morning with Judy Donegan at Haven Bay, an entertainment evening with the Toastmasters and a gala concert at the Friary featuring Christine Murdoch Hogan, tenor Ryan Morgan and soprano Emma Kate Tobia.

Leaflets outlining the week's events will be distributed by doctors and nurses, in chemists, shops and in other places around town. Every event is open to all of the public. The organisers are appealing to everyone to spread the word and to extend invitations to older neighbours, friends and relatives to go to some of the events which might interest them. There is no minimum age limit. Some of the events in fact celebrate bringing the generations together such as the Sunday Lawn games at Sáile on 25th September, the day before National Grandparents Day.

Last year Haven Bay won the Nursing Homes Ireland National Care Awards for catering. Chef Emmanuele Ferri will be giving a cookery demonstration on Friday 23rd September. This year Haven Bay has again been nominated for the catering and also for the community initiative award. otherwise be lost in a market swamped by big companies.



This service is an annual tradition to give thanks for keeping safe families, friends and neighbours who put to sea over the previous year, whilst also praying for their safety in the year ahead. Right Reverend Andrew Wright, Mission Chaplain to the Royal National Mission to Deep Sea Fishermen, will lead the ceremony and St Paul's Cathedral Choir will be joined in musical prayer by the Band of the Royal Marines for the occasion.

The service is regularly attended by the Lord Mayor of London and members of the Royal Family. A number of senior Naval Officers will be in attendance. The Chairman of the RNLI, Admiral Lord Boyce, the former First Sea Lord of the Royal Navy and RNLI Chief Executive, Mr Paul Bossier will be also be in attendance. During the course of the ceremony, a procession takes place in which 18 Standards are paraded to represent seafaring institutions such as the Sea Cadets, the National Sea Training College, the Marine Society and the Royal Naval Association, together with the Royal National Lifeboat Institution. RNLI Inspector for Ireland, Martyn Smith selected the Kinsale Station to bear the Charity's Standard at the ceremony.

Kinsale RNLI Station will be represented by John O' Gorman, Lifeboat Operations Manager, Mr Kevin Gould, Deputy Launching Authority, and Mr Richard McKinlay, Station Mechanic.

Delighted and honoured to represent RNLI at this very special ceremony, RNLI Kinsale stated:

"The team at Kinsale is delighted to have been selected as a station to represent RNLI at this very important event. Richard, Kevin and I are very much looking forward to representing our station and the charity as a whole.

During the ceremony, we will give thanks for the safety of all our local seafarers. We will pray for their ongoing safety and the safety of all our crew, who risk their lives to save others at sea, in the year ahead. We are so grateful to be part of the RNLI organisation, which provides a safety net around our coast to help saves lives at sea. Without the support of the public, we would not have a service to offer." On Sunday 31st July, Kinsale Lifeboat Station opened its doors to offer a rare glimpse of the inner workings of this vital public service. Visitors were invited to tour the lifeboat station, inspect the Kinsale lifeboat, the Miss Sally Anne, and hear first-hand accounts from the voluntary crew about how the service operates. This followed a busy period for Kinsale RNLI as over a three day period in July the lifeboat was launched for three serious incidents which resulted in four people being rescued. The lifeboat volunteers were professional and prompt in answering the calls for assistance. Each time the lifeboat crew are called to assist, they never know what they will face to save lives at sea.

The RNLI volunteers provide a 24-hour search and rescue service around Ireland and the UK. The RNLI operates over 230 lifeboat stations with 43 in Ireland. The RNLI is independent of the Coast Guard and government and depends on voluntary donations and legacies to maintain its rescue service. Since the RNLI was founded in 1824 its lifeboat crews and lifeguards have saved over 137,000 lives.

PRESENTATION ROUND TO IRELAND FOR MERCY SHIPS YOUNG SAILORS

Special medallions were presented at the Emigrants' Reunion reception at Kinsale Regatta Festival to nine young people who sailed around Ireland non-stop last year, raising €5,000 for the charity Mercy Ships, ocean vessels providing health care to the poor in port areas around the world. The recipients were skipper Ben Fusco, James Bendon, first mate; Dave Lee, Katy

Mullins, Katie Gambier-Ross, Sean Murphy, Ayden Clarke, Sophie Scannell and Tess Kingston, most of whom were present along with family members, harbour chaplain Canon David Williams and harbour board member Billy Lynch and Paralympic sailor John Twomey for the presentations by Regatta Festival chairman Ted McNamara and harbour master Captain Phil Devitt.

The voyage, which was completed in six and a half days, was preceded by extensive training from Kinsale Outdoor Education Centre headed

by Victor Fusco with the support of CH Marine. The oldest sailor on board Odyssey 39, a Sonas yacht kindly donated for the voyage by Dave Ross, was aged 19. Great support was provided by many people in Kinsale and along the way by the Irish Coastguard and the Kinsale harbour master who is a member of the Regatta committee.

Mayor of Kinsale and Regatta secretary Fred Treacy said the young sailors and Kinsale OEC were tremendous ambassadors for the harbour town.





PARISH RECOGNISES PRIEST'S CONTRIBUTION

Canon John K O' Mahony, who has been based in Kinsale since 1998, celebrated his Golden Jubilee as a priest on Saturday June 18th with the local community in Kinsale.



To mark the event a Mass was celebrated in St John the Baptist Church, Kinsale. Fr. Robert Young delivered a homily and Canon John K concluded the Mass by sharing with the congregation some brief thoughts of what those fifty years of priesthood had been like for him. The Mass was followed by a buffet meal and music in the Trident Hotel where John O'Keeffe, Chairman of the Parish Assembly acted as MC for the night and presented a This is your Life profile on Canon John K O'Mahony which was signed by all the guests.

Canon David Williams presented him with a history of St. Multose Church which is called "St. Multose, the way it was, the way it is, and the way it could be." In giving it to him he said that it was part of their shared heritage. It was printed in 1895, and is now 116 years old. It was written by the Revd. Darling, who was Rector of St. Multose at the end of the 1800's

Catherine Kelleher, Chairperson of the Community Building and Support Group presented a bistro set of a table and chairs and a voucher on behalf of all his Parishioners and friends.

Fred Treacy, newly elected Mayor

of Kinsale, and Cllr Kevin Murphy – then Mayor of County Cork also spoke. Music was provided by Vincent McCarthy and John O'Connell.

The function was attended by over two hundred guests who all appeared to enjoy this joyous occasion immensely, especially the guest of honour!

The Kilcrohane native entered the priesthood in 1961, having studied for the religious life in the seminary in Maynooth, where he also completed a BA.

Like many of his generation, the young priest found himself crossing the Irish Sea to take up his ministry in the UK's second largest city at a time when the levels of emigration from Ireland were similar to today.

Based in a leafy Birmingham suburb, the young curate was not exposed to the difficulties many of those emigrating from Ireland suffered during the early sixties. However, the experience was to have a profound effect on the young Corkman, particularly recognising the important role the local parishioners played in the running of the parish.

Certainly his later appointment as parish priest to Ballinhassig in 1989 reflected the lessons he had learned in his Birmingham days, establishing the first Parish Council in the Diocese of Cork and Ross.

So successful was the project in Ballinhassig and an additional Parish Council in Kinsale, Bishop Buckley appointed the then Parish Priest in Kinsale, Canon O' Mahony, to the position of Director of Parish Pastoral Development, a role he developed over the next four years.

The Bantry man's ability to break new ground had long been established, having being appointed the first Director of Social Services for the Diocese of Cork and Ross by the late Bishop Murphy in 1982.

So impressed was the Bishop with the significant role played by the director of the new service he was appointed a Canon in 1989

Certainly for many it was a fitting reward for his hard work in establishing such organisations as CURA, a voluntary organisation established to help those who are

faced with a crisis pregnancy, as well as his commitment to the adoption process in the country, having been appointed to St Ann's Adoption Society in 1967 by the late Bishop Lucey.

His expertise within the adoption process saw Canon O'Mahony appointed to a high-powered Government review group in the early 1980s. Many of its recommendations now form the basis of much of the legislation in relation to adoptions in Ireland. Reflecting on a lifetime of administering to those most needy and vulnerable in society, Canon O' Mahony said:" Celebrating my fifty years is not about my achievements but rather acknowledging all those who I worked with to make a real difference to those fortunate."

However, on a personal level, it's the growth of the Parish Councils

which gives him the greatest satisfaction.

Shortly after his arrival in Kinsale he undertook, along with a dedicated committee, the muchneeded renovation of St. John the Baptist Church at a cost of €1.8 million. He subsequently set about reducing the debt in the Parish which has been virtually eliminated as a result of his commitment.

Canon John K. has made an extraordinary contribution to the parish during his time here, his gently and kind manner, his wisdom and patience has endeared him to all his parishioners. He is a charitable, most assuming and hardworking man and his commitment to his calling is total.

We wish Canon John K. many more years of ministry in Kinsale.

Festive opening of Lidl in Kinsale

The long-awaited opening of Lidl Discount Store took place amid much fanfare on August 4th last. The official opening was performed by four local children who participated in the 'Welcome to Lidl' float at the Regatta Festival fancy dress parade, accompanied by Mayor of Kinsale, Fred Treacy.

The ultra modern new retail outlet, located on the site of the former Kinsale Infantry Barracks dating back to 1802, was a hive of activity as store manager Sinead O'Driscoll from Farran and staff greeted shoppers with lots of opening offers including free food and bakery samples and beverages, half price on all fruit and veg, a non food clearance sale and spin the wheel. The opening weekend also featured a Happy Family Day, free barbecue food and a holiday raffle in aid of the Irish Heart Foundation.

The site, located just off the main Eastern (R600) road entering the town from Belgooly, has car parking, a pedestrian and wheelchair access from Barrack Hill; access for delivery vehicles from Pewterhole Cross, landscaping which has retained some of the original barrack walls and a historical information plaque. The store is open from 8am to 9pm Monday to Friday and from 10.30am to 7pm on Sunday.

Mayor Fred Treacy, who was accompanied by fellow town councillors, said the opening as a very welcome boost for Kinsale and gave shoppers extra choice.

The Kinsale outlet is serviced by its 29,000 square metres regional distribution centre in Charleville. The company is this year celebrating ten years of business in the Republic of Ireland where it employs 2,500 people.

• While the opening of Lidl is very welcome in the town, providing choice and of course much welcome employment, it is also important that the small, family and individually owned and run businesses are supported during these challenging times as these are the lifeblood of our town. Several businesses have already closed in the past number of weeks with others downsizing or relocating. It would be a terrible shame if any more are to suffer the same fate as it would make Kinsale a less interesting and less appealing location for visitors as well as locals. Your support for small local businesses is more important now than ever before! To quote a local shopkeeper, if you want local shops, shop local!

At the September meeting of Kinsale Town Council, Cllr Tomas O'Brien proposed the council pursue the possibility of assistance for the Tidy Towns effort through Solas workers as done previously under Fás. Other towns availed of this, he added and it would greatly boost the voluntary effort.

Cllr Tony Cierans urged a full take up of places available for adult education courses with different modules on offer from Kinsale Community School.

On a proposal by Cllr Dermot Collins, congratulations were extended to Kinsale GAA players Brian Coughlan and Richard Coughlan and selector Paul McCarthy of the victorious Cork team which won the All Ireland Junior Football title.

The Fitzgerald family and Blue Haven Food Company were congratulated by councillors on the recent official opening of its food production unit at Little Island.

An open day for the unemployed in

Kinsale was proposed by Cllr Noel Harrington who pointed out that the town and its catchment area had 1,282 on the live register compared with 561 in 2007, of which 1,146 were over 25. He suggested Enterprise Ireland and recruitment agencies be invited to the open day for such an event which should be supported by the council.

Cllr Cierans urged full support of the first public meeting of Kinsale Youth Support Services at Acton's Hotel on Monday, October 10th.

Acting town clerk Ms Clare Levis said the new town council manager Ms Patricia Power would be taking up duty later this month.

On a proposal by the mayor, members agreed to a request from Mr Oliver Lynch of Kinsale Active Retired Association for a presentation at the next meeting outlining a proposal to install a 'fone Zone' exercise area for older people at an appropriate public site in the town, similar to that done in Carrigaline.

The parishioners of Clontead Parish celebrated the Diamond Jubilee of Fr Daniel Burn's ordination recently, with Mass at the Sacred Heart Church Belgooly.

Before the congregation retired to the Huntsman Bar for some light refreshments, former Chairman of Clontead Parish Council, Mr Martin O' Regan, publicly thanked Fr Burns for his continuing dedication to the parish, celebrating Mass every day at 10am in Belgooly.

Indeed over the course of the morning's events, the popular former parish priest had many glowing tributes paid to him, including the current Chairman of Clontead Parish Council, Mr Sean Scully, describing the Tarelton born native as a very genuine individual and a gifted orator. The Riverstick resident added that Fr Burns had been a great asset to the parish since his original appointment in 1984.

Mrs Joan Coughlan, a former member of the Parish Council, also paid tribute to Fr Burns for his commitment to the parish.

Ordained in 1951, having completed his studies in Maynooth University, where in addition to studying fours years of Theology, Fr. Burns also completed a three year general degree, which included Celtic Studies and Philosophy. A pupil of Farranferris, the former diocesan school's inspector with the Diocese of Cork and Ross, Fr Burns has been a lifelong promoter of education.



Describing education as one of the most important pursuits throughout a person's life, Fr. Burns continues to immerse himself in a wide range of literature, including theology, scriptures, current events but he also enjoys reading well written fiction.

Certainly, since taking up his first assignment

in 1951, in Lancashire, England, the former Parish Priest of Clontead has always encouraged his congregation to participate fully in the parish's activities, as many of his former parishioners in Dunmanaway, Mayfield, Bealade, Ahiohill, Blackrock and Belgooly will testify.

Burns was also fortunate enough to see some of England's finest footballers perform, including Tom Finney and Stanley Matthews, when he arrived as a young curate in Preston in the early 1950s.

A regular spectator at the local and county GAA scene up to recently, he certainly took a delight in Ballymartle's recent successes.

For man who is not one for a fuss, the event was a fitting way indeed to mark a unique milestone.

SERIOUS ACTION NEEDED ON DOG FOULING IN KINSALE

Serious action must be taken to tackle the dreadful problem of dog fouling on the streets of Kinsale, said Cllr Dermot Collins at the September meeting of the town council.

He was speaking in support of Mayor Fred Treacy who described the ongoing issue in the tourist and heritage town as 'horrendous' and called for the dog warden to again visit the town.

The mayor said he and fellow councillor Tomás O'Brien saw for themselves the problem while residents of Butcher's Row had contacted him complaining about dog fouling on the green where children play.

Cllr Collins said there was now need for serious action because it was an indictment on Kinsale TC. 'The filth is unbelievable and it's a blight on our town'. He suggested the dog warden spend a week in the town and take action against owners.

On a proposal by Mayor Fred Treacy, congratulations was extended to Kinsale Tidy Towns committee on winning a silver medal and the South Cork county award in the Super Valu National Tidy Towns competition. Cllr Billy Lynch is a member of the committee.

Cllr Noel Harrington called for a litter bin along the popular Low Road shoreline walk between Scilly and Summercove and also repair of two seats. Cllr Collins concurred. Illegal dumping at Catholic Walk was reported by Cllr Harrington.

Cllr Tony Cierans said he and others were getting despondent about the future of the Municipal Hall pointing out that it was over a year since major restrictions on its use came into force.

Cllr Treacy spoke in support adding that having to relocate council receptions to other venues in the town cost Kinsale TC a lot more. Acting manager Mr Louis Duffy said he agreed with Cllr Cierans. He explained that it was an issue of fire safety but was confident there was a solution. He undertook to refer the matter to the County Architect's Department. In a report, the town clerk stated that an e mail on the update of works required on the Municipal Hall and works required to return sittings of the District Court there would be furnished to members. It has also been suggested that the James O'Neill Memorial Mill Building be partly used as a court venue.

Kathleen Murphy died recently and a special tree was planted at Ringfinnan in her honour.

There was a very large turnout at the removal on Monday from Gabriel and O'Donovan's Funeral Home, Bandon, and at the Requiem Mass on Tuesday at the Church of the Most Holy Heart of Mary (Mountain Chapel), Goggin's Hill, which was followed by burial at Ballyheada Cemetery.

Mr Roger Dale, on behalf of Waterlands Shipping and Warehousing said: 'We are all profoundly devastated and shocked by what has happened and our thoughts and prayers are with the family and friends of the deceased at this time'

KINSALE YOUTH SUPPORT SERVICE CREATES AWARENESS


community young and old alike to attend.

PREMIERE OF DVD 'BALLINSPITTLE – A PORTRAIT'

There was a delightful double bill on the big screen at the local community centre recently for the 'world premiere' of 'Ballinspittle – A Portrait' by Cormac O'Connor and Johnny Hanrahan followed by 'De Courcey Country' which was filmed by Fr T A O'Regan back in 1959.

The good sized attendance was welcomed to the 'world premiere' by chairman of Ballinspittle Festival Committee JJ Hayes who pointed out that the new 35 minute film is on sale as a DVD while copies of the film made 52 years earlier can also be ordered. He expressed the hope that a similar exercise, capturing on film different snapshots of life in the village and parish, could be undertaken every ten years and congratulated and thanked the film makers for choosing Ballinspittle.

'Ballinspittle – A Portrait 2010-2011' is an impressionistic documentary made over a year celebrating new ventures, heritage projects and the activities of local groups. Running for 35 minutes, it creates a vivid snapshot of the area's development at a particular time and show how its traditional character is being transformed by new arrivals and activities.

Interspersed with flashback footage from the 1959 film, it features the grotto, the village, local children, the great work of local historian Raymond White at ancient wells and other landmarks, Templetrine graveyard, the GAA club, the Friendship Group for active retired, the drama group, Kuk Sul Won martial arts, G-Town Adventures and surfers, artist Fiona Calnan, sculptor Vivienne Roche, Garrettstown beach, Irish Coastguard and Cliff Rescue group, farmer JJ Hayes at Kilkerrin, some lovely singing by Alice O'Sullivan and Margaret Cahalane and concludes with the annual summer festival and commentary by Timmy O'Donovan of the children's fancy dress parade.

CASH-STRAPPED KINSALE **TOWN** COUNCIL, AT ITS 2012 BUDGET MEETING, WILL REVIEW ITS SYSTEM FOR FUNDING CIVIC AND COUNCIL RECEPTIONS.

This was agreed after Cllr Darren Cotter, at the monthly meeting, unsuccessfully asked that the local authority fund the €811 for advertising and other costs regarding the road closures at Market Quay and part of Week (KAW)

Town clerk Ms Michelle Kelleher said that in the past, the money for this came out of the entertainment fund totalling €6,000 for council receptions but this was fully committed for 2011.

While the council hadn't made any direct payment to KAW, it had given the organisers free use of the Municipal Hall for storage, made its office there available for using the

address system, waived administration fee for the road closure and reduced the rate for casual trading during

The town clerk added that because the Municipal Hall wasn't available, the council had to use privately owned establishments which increased the cost to up to €1,000 for a reception to cover use of the room and food that would be more expensive than if the council was supplying it and hosting a reception on its own property.

Cllr Cotter felt the council should be more pro-active given the huge benefit KAW was for the town and the fact that the Kinsale TC coat of arms logo was to be seen in all the festival literature. There was need to examine what was of most benefit arguing it would be money better spent than on some receptions attended by around 40 people. Cllr Dermot Collins agreed, saying there was no need to spend so much on

Cllr Tomas O'Brien however, reminded fellow members, that they signed off on the €6,000 entertainment fund at what was a cut-throat 2011 budget meeting with no rate increase. There was no allocation to the Sovereigns Cup, Kinsale Rugby Sevens, the brownies and girl guides, all of which were very worthy, and warned against changing the rules in the middle of the year because that would be unfair on other groups. He agreed that KAW was of great benefit and stressed that he participated in

In support, Cllr Billy Lynch said it would be dangerous to shift the goal posts in the middle of the year and suggested the whole issue be looked at the 2012 budget meeting. This was agreed.

Working today for a sustainable tomorrow

BLESSED WITH BOUNTY

At this time of year, when the harvest is at its peak, the vegetable patch is groaning with produce, the hedgerows are dripping with blackberries and the sea is teeming with mackerel we can be grateful that we are blessed with such tremendous bounty. And much of it is practically on our doorstep. It shows that an actual local food economy is within our grasp as long as we keep forging ahead with local food projects.

Kinsale Community Supported Agriculture is one such project. One of the first of its kind in Ireland, its members have not only successfully grown their own oats and turned them into edible porridge, but this year they are experimenting with a South American grain-like crop called quinoa. Quinoa can be eaten as an alternative to rice or couscous, is rich in protein and has a balanced set of amino acids for humans. It is also gluten-free, making it easy to digest and it also grows well in the Irish climate. This could be another first for Kinsale!

The summer was less than warm this year, but TTK's Jeannie Timony worked hard to bring us a series of highly successful talks and wonderful workshops that were informative, educational and entertaining.

TED COOKE'S WOODLAND WALK

This leisurely paced walk was held on a (rare) hot sun-drenched day in July, making it easy exercise and also a great social and learning event. The gorgeous Doon Woods smelled and looked absolutely glorious and the 25 people who attended the walk found Ted to be a passionate and knowledgeable speaker on ecology and natural history.

He explained how our hedgerows were developed and how natural succession and natural regeneration works. He also talked about how Ireland's townland names provide and important key to the historic ecology of a place, e.g. "Dun Daru" meant Fort of the Oakwood. He spoke of the many species in the woods and their ecology as well as the geology of the woods. We had a wonderful picnic break, giving everyone time to socialise in a sunny clearing in the woods. It allowed everyone time to absorb some much needed hot rays whilst enjoying the delicious shared food. All in all this was a thoroughly relaxing yet very informative

Ted and Jeannie Timony have since worked on a pamphlet which will celebrate Doon Woods biodiversity and ecology with notes taken from the walk, which will soon be available to buy at a low

What, you may ask, is agro-homeopathy? The question was answered at this practical workshop with Mark O'Sullivan, homeopath, environmentalist and I.T. teacher.

Mark taught us how to manage our gardens sustainably and without toxicity, how to heal fungal and bacterial diseases and balance nutrient excesses & deficiencies. He explained with great clarity how we can restore damaged or traumatised plants and soils, how to prepare and apply the homeopathic remedies for plants. Ever wondered how you could get rid of garden slugs without resorting to toxic repellents? Mark showed how all manner of pests from slugs to beetles and various larvae can be deterred in a safe, effective, non-toxic manner.

This was a jammed-packed well taught workshop and so successful that Mark will be return at a later date to do another workshop, in Spring 2012.

THE WORK THAT RECONNECTS WORKSHOP WITH DEARBHAILE BRADLEY

The material for this workshop was developed by Joanna Macv. one of the world's foremost and eminent eco-psychologists. Ecopsychology explores ways to heal ourselves and society by reconnecting with each other, our communities and our planet to build a sane and sustainable future.

What a pleasant surprise this workshop was, with Dearbhaile leading us through some wonderful experiential exercises to help us find, explore and develop the inner resources we all need to cope with the challenges of living in a rapidly changing world. People in Ireland have just experienced a seismic shift in the collapsing of the unsustainable "Industrial Growth Society" and even though we may on some level have accepted the long term inevitability of such a collapse, it is a very different matter to actually experience the reality of the economic downturn.

There is such an overwhelming wealth of information as to how the world as we know is in meltdown and very little grasp of how to take the "baby steps" now that can lead us to the sustainable future that is our only chance of survival. This workshop gave us the opportunity to find and live true to a more satisfying set of values that those offered by our materialistic culture.

The feedback from participants was very positive:

TTK Every summer receives emails from with from abroad requests to visit the birthplace of the global Transition movement. We are privileged and a little humbled to be held in such high regard, but it is always a pleasure to meet people from other countries who share our concerns and are keen to

forge a similar path to resilience and sustainability.

This summer we had a group of six Korean students from their 'Global Youth Leadership Training Programme', making it the fourth visit to Kinsale by people from that country. The reason? Korean national TV filmed our Spring Fair in 2007 and since then we have been receiving them. We are happy to share our experience of a community responding to looming and inevitable decline in energy supplies and climate change. They in turn are keen to learn how much progress our community has made since its inception five years ago and what tips we can give them for starting their own Transition initiatives.

EUROPEAN LEARNING PARTNERSHIP

TTK has become involved in a rather unique project with a number of organisations from around Europe including Transition Sweden. 'Teachings for Transformative Change' came together for the first time at a house in Sandycove last August to explore

tools for helping people to deal with change both individually and at community level. Ten participants from Ireland, Sweden, Denmark, Germany and Austria spent three days getting to know each other, holding workshops and developing processes as part of a two-year long EU-funded educational



programme. The results of the research will be shared via a workshop or series of workshops to be held in Kinsale within in the next year or two. It promises to be envelope-pushing, ground-breaking stuff.

We live in a society where information is power and the gap between those who have it all and those who don't is ever widening. Kinsale & Dock Rowing Club's final preparations for the 2011 ICRF All Ireland Coastal Rowing Championships

in Kilrane, Co. Wexford, began on August 18th with the various crews being put through their paces by the coaches, once this was done it was time to take the boat out of the water and with all hands on deck as much cleaning and polishing was done to get the new and as yet unnamed boat ready for the biggest rowing regatta in Ireland. There were 45 clubs and 450 crews entered which totaled up to 2693 competitors, so qualifying for the finals never mind to say winning medals was never going to be easy.

The Drinagh Court Hotel in Wexford was to be home for our club for the weekend. It was an early rise Saturday morning with us participating in the first race at 8.30am which was the Veteran Mixed Final. Rowing conditions on the Saturday were very poor, so bad in fact that one would wonder how all the ferries that were entering and leaving Rosslare Port beside us were able to sail across the Irish Sea. The Vet Mixed crew were drawn in lane 13 of 14 and found the conditions very difficult and had to be content with being placed 13, also with all the qualifiers coming from the inside lanes which had the benefit of the shelter of the land. The next crew on the water was the U12 Girls and they gave a fine rowing performance to come 5th in their heat and were the 6th fastest boat overall into the final. The U14s were next up and they too had the advantage of an inside draw and duly came 5th and they too could look forward with some confidence to their Sunday final. Next on the water were the Pre-Vet Men who had an outside draw and were unfortunate to come 7th in their heat and just lost out in a place in the final as a result which left them very disappointed as they had put in much hard work. The U14 Girls heats were in 18 of the 35 races to be held on the day, with 27 clubs entered (the biggest by far in any category) and with only 4 to qualify from each heat for the final it was always going to be difficult and they finished 8th in their heat in the end.

The U16s were next up in race 21 and they too had an outside lane and could only manage 12th as a result. The remaining crew to qualify was the Pre-Vet Mixed who were in race 26 rowing exceptionally well to finish 4th and to comfortably qualify for Sunday's final. This meant that 3 out of the 7 crews that had to qualify made it to the finals on the Sunday. Sunday itself dawned a much better day and with the wind blowing from a NNW direction conditions were a lot more suitable for rowing but with the advantage switching to the middle to outside lane draws. The first race was to be at 8.30am again but due to various issues there was a delay of about 2 hours. We had crews involved in 3 of the first 5 finals and the 4th crew had to wait until the 22nd final for our remaining crew to compete. The first of the 5 crews that we had qualified for Sunday's finals was the Veteran Men who rowed very well but found it tough going in lane 1 and ended up 9th out of 12. The U12 Girls rowed very well in their final but despite that could only manage a very credible 8th place in Ireland out of the 12 finalists. The U14s also rowed very well but still could only manage 11th place. The Veteran Ladies were on the water in race no 5 in what turned out to be one of the most competitive finals of the day but unfortunately they finished well out of the medal picture. We then had a long wait for race 22 when it would be the turn of our Pre-Vet Mixed crew but try as they might they were unable to make any impression on the leading crews and finished 11th. While some of these results might seem disappointing one has to remember that we were up against the best the entire country has to offer, so therefore everybody can feel very proud of their efforts.

This was a first time experience at being at an All Ireland rowing competition for many of the new members this year and I am sure that they, plus the more experienced ones, enjoyed the experience very much and are in fact anxious for more. A big thank you to all who made a very enjoyable weekend for all possible. That brought the competitive season to a close, well done to all involved.

Special guest and then Mayor of Cork County, Kevin Murphy from Kinsale, said the extension was something very positive in a time of recession and of the highest quality for an area which had grown enormously in recent years. He congratulated all involved on what was a day of celebration.

MC Eamonn Kelly took the opportunity to highlight the impact proposed controversial changes to the school transport system would have on rural central schools, such as Belgooly (comprised of the former Ballymartle, Belgooly and Ballingarry schools), Newcestown, Minane Bridge and Kilbrittain, that were guaranteed such a service when founded in 1979. In urging that this be reversed by the Government, he thanked local county councillor Alan Coleman

for highlighting it in a motion to a meeting of Cork County Council. The principal also paid tribute to school gardener Michael Horgan and congratulated retired parish priest Fr Daniel Burns on the diamond jubilee of his ordination.

The Minister for Agriculture and Food was presented with fresh produce from the Green Flag school garden by pupils Declan Horgan and Sinead Lordan while the county mayor and Fr O Murchu were given strawberries from same by Oisin White and Aoibhe Coleman.

Up and running and proving hugely popular since it became operational on July 13th is the much admired Kinsale Day Care Centre attached to Community Hospital.

The ultra modern facility, supported by the Health Service Executive (HSE), is due to be officially opened later this year. Nurse co-ordinator for the project is Kathy Etty and chairperson of the management and fund raising committee is John Thuillier.

The centre is currently open every Wednesday and Friday from 9am to 5pm but this is due to increase to every weekday.

For a nominal fee, a maximum of 20 clients, aged 65 years and over can avail of the centre. Most of them live alone but some are in sheltered housing such as Guardwell Homes. Transport is provided by West Cork Rural Transport Scheme and every day clients can enjoy tea/coffee and toast on arrival, a really tasty three course lunch and in the afternoon tea and biscuits.

During the day, there are opportunities in the spacious Stanley Roche dining and recreational room to play cards, bingo and other games; exercise, have a party, enjoy music and visiting entertainers, listen to guest speakers and take part in reminiscence therapy - indeed whatever the clients want, said Kathy Etty, Nurse Co-Ordinator at the centre, who stressed that dignity and independence for the older person are key principles of the centre.

State of the art services and facilities are also

on offer in specially designed rooms. These are the clinic which currently provides podiatry; occupational therapy (Frances Fitzgerald and Deirdre Cullen); a relaxation room (massage bed and relaxation therapies), a hairdressing salon and a laundry where a change of clothing can be stored for clients who wish to shower. The toilet is extra special with reclining shower chair and a Clos-o-Mat automatic toilet, ideal for the less abled.

There is also a superb kitchen attached to the dining room, a staff room, store and offices and particularly impressive is the beautifully landscaped garden which is greatly appreciated by both clients and staff.

Permeated by lots of natural light, the ambience at the Day Care Centre both indoor and outdoor is bright and cheerful.

Kathy reported 'a very positive response' from clients and the general community since the day care centre became operational. Indeed, those now availing of the service said they were thrilled to get out of the house, enjoy good company and an excellent meal. One of them said it helped her to stop worrying and

gave her something to look forward to. John Thuillier.

chairperson of the management and fund raising committee, said the community project, was completed on time and within budget this year and a very successful open day was held on June 11th. Main contractor was Twomey Construction, Crosshaven, and the architect was Hyde Partnership, Douglas.

The voluntary committee includes John Thuillier, chairperson; Cora Roche, secretary; Dr Tom O'Leary, treasurer; former hospital matron Maureen O'Donovan; hospital matron Paula Stubbs; Cariosa Lynch, HSE; Sr Anne Marie O'Sullivan, Heide Roche, Margaret Ryan, Pat O'Leary, Michael Frawley, Ted Whitaker and Bernadette Galvin. There are many other volunteer helpers.

John Thuillier said Kathy Etty was a fantastic organiser and also paid tribute to the three care assistants Emma Horgan, Lea Miklody and Judy Nyhan, chef Josephine Murphy, the medical and professional staff and others for the wonderful care and service they provide to the elderly. He specially thanked the HSE and in particular Gretta Crowley and Gabrielle O'Keeffe and various organizations, clubs and individuals in the parish and beyond who have supported different fund raising events including a barn dance, quizzes and sing-song

John said Kinsale Day Care Centre was a fine example of care for the older person involving the community and said it was hoped to broaden the scope of the facility in that regard in co-operation with the HSE and others, possibly in the development of innovative diagnostic and treatment procedures for the older person. Fund raising continues to be important and the project committee will continue its involvement in management but it is also hoped to form a Friends group.
