Transportation Plan for Kinsale

A new one way system, a waterfront link road, harbour-side boardwalks, additional pedestrianisation and street upgrading, more off-street parking, development of a northern relief road and new western by-pass are among the proposals in the draft Kinsale Transportation Study (KTS), a summary of which went on public display recently in the Temperance Hall.

Consulting engineers Faber Maunsell were jointly commissioned by Kinsale Town and Cork County Councils to develop a strategy for the town and its hinterland recognising the fundamental role that transport and ease of access have to play in sustaining a vibrant local economy in the tourist and heritage town

The study has reviewed the existing transportation network and highlighted key constraints in consultation with all stakeholders, the local authorities and the public and a considerable amount of data was collected in order to develop a computer traffic model of the town. It outlines short, medium and long term measures for Kinsale up to 2020 and beyond.

Based on the 2006 Census, the current population of Kinsale is 4,099, located in 1,517 households. Surveys indicating there are 1,590 vehicle trips during the evening peak period demonstrates a high level of car use - typical of small Irish towns - resulting in congestion exacerbated by long stay parking.

Based on current zoned residential lands, the maximum population growth for Kinsale in the long term is 7,500 and if this happens, there would be a potential increase of 53% in vehicular trips from 1,590 to 3,082 which would impact very heavily on traffic flow and the character of the town.

Among the issues and challenges highlighted in the KCS are:

- Around 30% of all town centre traffic is 'through traffic'.
- The road network is limited in terms of space and alternative routes but junctions such as Pearse Street, Emmet Place and Long Quay (Boland's Corner) can be improved.
- \bullet Traffic flows increase by an average of 25% in the summer and without intervention, future growth could increase congestion and delays by up to 125%
- Public transport serving Kinsale is good but suffers from delays in the town centre and there is need for bus turning areas.
- Pedestrian, mobility impaired and cycle facilities, footpaths, crossings, leisure routes and street lighting need improving.
- There is significant potential for improved management of parking supply for the benefit of the town centre.
- Current limited provision of loading bays with some narrow streets unsuitable for delivery vehicles, resulting in obstruction and congestion.
- The need for reduced speeds and improved road safety have been identified.
- Road surface conditions need improving.

The study team has come up with five separate strategies: the road network, parking, public transport, cycling and walking.

ROAD NETWORK

This is aimed at tackling the issues of 'through traffic' and congestion and making Kinsale more pedestrian friendly without negatively impacting on access for car drivers. The main proposals are:

- Development of the Kinsale Northern Relief Road upgrading the existing route and some new construction to connect to the R605 Bandon Road.
- A new Western relief road/by pass this route would provide additional connectivity for the west of Kinsale town from the R600 (Eastern or main Cork Road) and further reduce 'through traffic'. It would be a new road starting at the R605 Bandon Road (northern route) and going south west to intersect with the Cappagh Road and R606 Kinsale-Bandon Road (southern route).
- Junction improvements.

TOWN CENTRE

Measures, if implemented under this strategy, would deliver a 68% reduction in vehicle delay and queuing and a 43% reduction in travel time and release street space which could be used to prioritise pedestrian facilities, trading and general town centre activities. Proposals include:

- Waterfront Link Road one way south bound between Long Quay and Pier Road in front of the proposed Howard Holdings hotel and marina development.
- New town centre one way system proposed along Pearse Street, Market Street, Guardwell, Main Street and Emmet Place to provide a loop around the centre with minimal delays. It would also facilitate path widening, landscaping, traffic calming and pedestrian amenities.

- Pedestrian improvements pedestrianisation of Short Quay from Emmet Place to Market Street and Market Street from Market Square to Guardwell/Main Street except for emergency vehicle access. Outside of pedestrianisation times, Short Quay would be one way west. Upgrading of facilities for pedestrians and mobility impaired at junctions.
- \bullet Traffic calming junction tables, shared surfaces and signage and in the longer term traffic lights at Boland's Corner & Emmet Place/Pier road junction.
- · Improve delivery management.

PARKING

Kinsale town centre currently has 344 on-street and 404 off-street parking spaces, three quarters of which are free and operating well. The KTS seeks to maximise turnover of these and protect and support the economic vitality of the town. Proposed measures include:

- Revised on-street public parking from 344 to 308 spaces.
- Revised off-street public parking from 404 to 750 spaces.
- Revised flexible pricing and enforcement structure.
- Improved parking accessibility from approach roads.

PUBLIC TRANSPORT

Current services are Bus Eireann, school buses, the Land Train, taxis and a pilot Bandon-Kinsale West Cork Rural Transport Initiative. The KTS aims to encourage further use of these and thereby reduce car dependency. Measures proposed include:

- Improved town centre bus access and bus stop facilities.
- Dedicated coach park parking and taxi/hackney rank.

WALKING AND CYCLING

Improving the pedestrian environment, especially safety, is a key objective. It also notes that the existing road network is unsuitable to provide significant cycle infrastructure and that Kinsale has no cycle lanes. Measures proposed include:

- Full mobility and accessibility for pedestrians in the town centre.
- Localised pedestrian improvements outside the town centre.
- Safer routes to schools Pedestrian boardwalks on the quay and coast roads
- Provision of cycle parking Development of local and tourist cycle routes.

In addition, say the KTS compilers, the strategy will help support economic growth, integrate land use and transportation, protect the heritage status and minimise impact on the environment in Kinsale.

The estimated cost is around \in 19 million. Early implementation of the waterfront link road, town centre traffic management changes, the Northern Relief road, junction upgrades and improved parking management would provide very clear and visible benefits to Kinsale in the short term. In the longer term, the western relief road would complete a quality and much needed by-pass and consequent benefits.

On duty for Faber Maunsell at the recent public consultation day were Susan Kehoe and Brian Coakley along with senior engineer with the county council Peter O'Donoghue who reported a generally positive feedback. All were agreed that traffic flows had to be improved but when asked where some of the extra off street parking can be provided, Peter replied that the council has earmarked land in the Barrack Hill area for long stay parking. He stressed that the KTS was very much geared towards achieving an integrated plan of action catering for all modes and needs for the benefit of the residents and businesses of the popular tourist town.

Members of the public were invited to make submissions in writing to Kinsale Transportation Study, c/o Faber Maunsell or by email to kinsalestudy@fabermaunsell.com up to May 21. Later this year, it will go before elected members of Kinsale and Cork County Councils for adoption. Members of Kinsale TC are due to meet the consultants at a special meeting on May 28.

At a special meeting of Kinsale Traders, held in The White Lady bar on Friday 15th May, approximately twenty business people gathered to make their observations regarding the Transportation Study. Some of the main concerns discussed were the provision of a Ring Road, the provision of parking accessible to the town centre rather than on the outskirts, the reduction of parking spaces in the town centre and that the main access to the town centre from the Cork road be reconsidered and reconfigured. The traders have entered a written submission to Faber Maunsell regarding the study.

SEA SUNDAY AND BLESSING OF NEW KINSALE HARBOUR OFFICE

SEA SUNDAY' in Kinsale on May 17 was extra special with the annual service in St. Multose's Church broadcast live on RTE radio, the ceremony at the memorial to all who died at sea and the blessing of boats followed by the dedication of Kinsale Harbour Commissioners' new office on Pier Head

by port chaplain Canon David Williams.



Nearly every organisation associated with the sea and maritime rescue was represented at the annual Sea Sunday' service in St. Multose's Church organised by the Mission to Seafarers. A welcome was extended by Canon Williams who said it was held annually "to

commemorate all those who have died at sea, to pray for the safety of those who work at sea as well as for those who use the sea for recreation, and to support in prayer all those who would respond to a marine emergency".

Colours and memorial flowers were presented during the service by flag bearers representing different organisations. Prayers and readings were recited by Carmelite Prior Micheal O'Neill, Canon John K. O'Mahony and Methodist Mrs. Liz Payne as well as by Mayor of Kinsale Dermot Collins; chairman of the harbour board Billy Lynch and harbour master Captain Phil Devitt.

Edmund Butler of Kinsale Area Coastguard read an extract from the new book 'Nine Lives' by Captain David Courtney which highlighted the bravery of Limerick River Rescue and other coastal and inland waterway rescue services prepared to lay down their lives for others. Canon Williams remembered those who died at sea off Ireland in recent years including Benno Haussmann, Dommie Meehan, Barry O'Driscoll, Barra O'Loingaigh of South Western Regional Fisheries Board, Ger Bohan and Tomazsz Yagla of 'Honeydew II', Kinsale; Tony Coohill, Feichin Mulkerrin of Cleggan.

There was a guard of honour by members of Civil Defence as the congregation entered the church and they along with the Naval Service, the RNLI, Coastguard. ONET and several other organisations marched in the parade led by the Naval Service Reserve under Lt. Cdr. Liam O'Keeffe and the Health Service Executive Ambulance Service Pipe Band through the town to Pier Road after the service.

At the Lost at Sea Memorial, prayers were recited by the local clergy and a wreath was laid to seamen by harbour board chairman and fisherman Billy Lynch. The memorial flowers which had been presented on the altar at St. Multose's Church were conveyed by Ewen Tubridy to crewmen Liam O'Connell, Nicky Searls and Mark Lewis on the Kinsale RNLI inshore lifeboat 'Sally Anne' who laid a trail of these in the harbour. As they did so, a lament was

played by Air Corps Corporal

Joe O'Donnell.

At the Pier Head, Canon O'Mahony blessed the boats including some new vessels. A wreath was given by Billy Lynch to Morrie Fitzgerald, skipper of 'Blue Diver' which was subsequently passed on to the lifeboat for laying at the harbour entrance in memory of all



fishermen who died at sea. Prayers were recited by the clergy and Micheal Hurley of Courtmacsherry Lifeboat led the singing of 'Home by the sea'.



Canon Williams then performed the blessing and cut the tape to officially open the impressive new Kinsale Harbour Board office which all guests toured. Harbour master Capt. Phil Devitt now has a full view of the inner harbour from the top floor office, which is in the style

of a ship's bridge, at the new and enlarged building. It is equipped with VHF radio, computers, fax and CCTV cameras.

The Port of Kinsale has a throughput 60 to 80 commercial cargo ships a year handled by Henry Good and Co., and is home to around 20 local fishing trawlers and over 350 leisure and sporting marine craft. There are two marinas and 100 swinging moorrings at the harbour which has around 800 visiting leisure, fishing and angling boats per annum and is home to the Sovereigns Cup, Kinsale Regatta and other top sailing events hosted by the local yacht club. There are nine members on the harbour board and Phil Devitt's predecessors for many years were Eddie Hurley and Daniel O'Shea.

The new harbour office was grant aided by the Department of Transport, designed by Rob Jacob of JLS Design (who also designed the Lost at Sea Memorial). Adam Cronin of Cronin Millar, Cobh, was engineer and it was built by Coffey Construction, Athenry. Features include a main office, boardroom, filing room, dockers' room, insert bin area, dual public toilets and lift. In the boardroom is a letter from Joseph Hosford announcing the first letter of the board in 1870 and a telegram from Queen Alexandra thanking the board for its vote of sympathy on the death of King Edward VII.

The first official function in the new building was a ceremony to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the signing of a friendship pact between Kinsale Harbour Board and the Merchant Navy Association (MNA), in Barry, Wales.

Signing of friendship pact by Kinsale and Barry Councils

"AT long last!" declared Mayor of Kinsale Dermot Collins at a historic function in the Municipal Hall where he and Mayor of Barry Howard Hamilton signed a friendship pact between the town councils.

Mr. Collins extended a warm welcome to his Welsh counterpart and Lady Mayoress Carol Ann Hamilton along with previous Mayor Stuart Egan (also a member of Vale of Glamorgan Council) and members of the MNA, Joe Norton, Jim and Keith Greenway, the latter two of whom have strong family connections with Kinsale.

"Today's official signing is the culmination of many years of correspondence and negotiations between council members, officials and others. I understand the original idea to promote close ties between our two towns was the brainchild, within the council chamber, of Tim O'Brien, a former chairman. He left no stone unturned to foster close ties between both communities and travelled at his own expense on a number of occasions to Barry with friends (Michael Austin, Denis Collins and others) to try and secure a friendship pact with Barry TC," said Mr. Collins who also acknowledged the efforts of councillor Billy Lynch, Jim and Keith Greenway, Joe Norton and Leo McMahon and others who never gave up trying to achieve some form of official link.

Many a Kinsale family, said Mr. Collins, settled or sailed into and out of Barry over many years resulting in a long and enduring connection between both port towns. "I sincerely hope it will continue to blossom through positive exchange visits between social, sporting, educational and cultural organisations from both towns in the years ahead to deepen that friendship".

Mayor of Barry in his first week, Howard Hamilton said words could not fully describe the warmth and hospitality he and his wife and colleagues from Barry had received in Kinsale. He paid a special tribute to Mr. Collins and his council for organising the ceremony.

Keith Greenway, on behalf of others in the MNA and other organisations in Barry who had been campaigning for this for almost ten years, thanked all

involved in the signing of the historic friendship pact. He quoted the words of former Kinsale mayor Tomas O'Brien that many a Kinsale man left to go to Barry which to them was their gateway to the world. Some settled and sent money home and others died in the world wars, among them able seaman Patrick Joseph Lucey, Scilly, who was buried in Merthyr Dyfan cemetery in Barry in 1942. Congratulations was also



expressed by Jim Greenway who said that many Kinsale descendants in Barry and district would be delighted that at long last the pact was signed.

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Dunderrow National School New Extension Opening

sporting organisations, schools, parents, neighbours and friends came together to celebrate this special occasion. Apologies were received from Bishop John Buckley.


After the early morning downpour, the sun shone brightly adding to the great sense of occasion.

Principal, Mary Cottrell initiated the celebrations with an opening welcome for all and this was completed by the school children welcoming rendition of Oró Sé do Bheatha Bhaile.

In the Principal's address that ensued, a brief history on the growth and development of Dunderrow National School was outlined.

Primary education in Dunderrow dates back to the 1800's when the first permanent school and teacher's residence

was built in the local area known as "The Doon". This was later replaced by a twoclassroomed school in Horsehill in 1933. The school was honoured on the day to have Sonny Kearney, whose primary education



Due to the growth of enrolment and the poor condition of the building, a new school was completed in Leighmoney in 2000 under the Capital Building Programme.

The years of the Celtic Tiger saw great demographic change in the area and school enrolment numbers continued to increase, so an application was made in October 2006 for a new school extension under the Devolved Building Programme. This was granted in March 2007 and so began the project of building four

and commitment of the staff for the happy learning environment in the school.

The great sense of community and partnership in education was highlighted by Mr Dave Urbanek, General Manager of Eli Lilly, who again congratulated the school on the achievement and highlighted the quality education being provided in Ireland for our youth.

Kinsale Peace Project debates the Israeli-Palestinian Conflict

On Thursday 26th March the Israeli Ambassador Zion Evrony came to the Friary Centre in Kinsale to speak about the conflict from the Israeli perspective. On Friday 27th March the Palestinian Ambassador Dr. Hikmat Ajjuri traveled to Kinsale to speak about the conflict from the Palestinian point of view. Each talk was followed by Q & A sessions which offered people the opportunity to ask the difficult questions.

Just over two decades ago, who would have believed that the Cold War would come to an end and the Berlin Wall would be demolished? Or that there would be an end to apartheid in South Africa and that Nelson Mandela would become it s president? Or, that we would see the Peace Process succeed in Northern Ireland and that Martin McGuiness and Ian Paisley would be nicknamed the chuckle brothers? Yet, all these things have come to pass. So there is every reason to hope that there will be a peaceful resolution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict in the not too distant future.



Dear Editor

How amazing to visit the grassy hill at Courtaparteen, a fine spring day and find the site completely sere and brown. This lovely location has been systemically burned by a chemical herbicide so that it will soon be reduced to a barren and ugly patch of bare earth.

As all agricultural directives will indicate, total herbicides are not to be used on heritage sites, REPS locations, setasides, etc., but only in cases of absolute necessity, as when crops are being rotated.

Not only are the results of herbicides unattractive, and destructive of biodiversity, they are also counterproductive. Now that the natual grasses are dead, it it the noxious weeds such as docks, thistles and nettles which will more quickly infest the site.

Courtaparteen is a frequently visited location for local walkers and tourists alike, and features in the recent guide to Kinsale walks. Great care has usually been taken by the Co. Council to keep the site attractive and well preserved. But its beauty is now completely ruined.

However, these aesthetic considerations aside, there is a far more devastating consequence to the use of chemical spray at Courtaparteen. The cliff on which the old church sits is dangerously undermined by coastal erosion. In a stormy year it is not unusual for several feet of cliff to fall away. The grass roots were the last line of defence against the encroachment of wind and water. Now that the grasses are dead, the cliff will inevitably erode much faster.

The immediate danger is that the graveyard and historic church of St. Ruadain (11th century) will now slip quickly into the sea, whereas it might hopefully have endured another century or two at least.

Courtaparteen has over the years featured in poems and stories about the area. The misuse of chemical sprays has certainly hastened the demise of this place of beauty and historical appeal. All this is particularly ironic in the region of Kinsale which has an active historic society and offers comprehensive environment courses in its Further Education College.

I urge the County Council office based in Kinsale to take urgent remedial action to restore the site with native grassland mix (or even grassland and wildflower mix). It may not be completely possible to repair the damage, but I feel it must be tried.

One of the many highlights was being elected Mayor and representing the people of Kinsale for that year.

I have worked tirelessly over the past ten years on behalf of the people of Kinsale which was indeed an honour and a privilege. The fact that I was elected with such a strong vote on both occasions convinced me that the work I was doing was benefiting the community which is the very reason why I wanted to put my name forward again for the Elections.

I feel that being prevented from running this year is an infringement of my civil liberties and democratic right as an Irish Citizen - a point that I have made to the current Minister for the Environment, Heritage & Local Government, Mr. John Gormley. Mr. Gormley, the same Minister who stated in the Irish Examiner that "serving your community was a privilege and an honour", is now denying me that privilege and honour by not amending this draconian piece of legislation.

It is with regret that I am not running and wish to thank my family, friends and loyal supporters who have helped and supported me over the past ten years as a councillor.

A public meeting was held in the Trident Hotel on Monday March 23rd, on how Kinsale can beat the recession. Since then weekly meetings have been held at Acton's Hotel aimed at putting in place an action plan of targets aimed at revitalising the town and its tourism industry when the town phase of the sewerage scheme ceases at the end of May.

Eighty-seven people attended the initial meeting called by the local Chamber of Tourism,

chaired by its president Ciarán Fitzgerald, assisted by Maria O'Mahony. The consensus was that there is a need for people from all tourism and business interests in Kinsale to cooperate for its benefit.

As a result of the discussions and suggestions at a recent brainstorming session eight working groups have been set up to tackle the issues that have arisen at the weekly meetings.

The first group is 'Spruce Up Kinsale' which includes paint promotion, a weekly tidy-up, a litter challenge, bins and fines. Everyone is invited to help with litter picking which takes place in the town every Thursday night at 7pm commencing in Short Quay. The Litter challenge also began on 30th April and runs for 6 weeks. The second group is the 'Cork - Kinsale Link-up', headed by Jola Wojtowicz, who can be contacted on 021 477 3322 and info@jolasrestaurant.com. This involves a driver incentive, a Cork advertising campaign, advertising on coaches and free parking.

Dermot Collins is in charge of 'The Tourist Experience', which involves coaches, ensuring the public toilets are open and clean 7 days a week, and attractions such as the museum, which was not going to open this year due to lack of funding. 

Home of Hope Officially Opened

Thanks to the incredible generosity of all the people of Kinsale, we were able to raise almost all the €50,000 total needed for our Home of Hope in just over a year, and on the 29th April Maureen and Pam attended the official opening. The ceremony was performed jointly by Adi Roche, CEO of Chernobyl Children's Project International, and Alexander Trukhan, head of the Belarussian Children's Fund. The Home is located in the small village of Vilcha (86 inhabitants) in Zitkovichy region, which is in the far south of Belarus not far from the border with Ukraine. "Our Family" has now moved in - Mama and Papa, Tanya and Vasily, who have two children of their own and six children fostered from orphanages, all with very sad histories, who've already been living in the family for three years in a nearby small wooden house with "Babushka", Tanya's mother, who will still be on hand of course to help with caring for the children. The Home of Hope has lots of space, and as there is a stork nesting in the garden, Tanya and Vasily are sure this is a sign that they will take in more children! It was a wonderfully happy day with beaming smiles on all faces, and we hope in future summers to honour our promise to bring the children to Kinsale for rest and recuperation.

We also spent time in Vesnova Children's Mental Asylum, which has been totally renovated by CCPI and where volunteer Irish nurses are training the local staff to give the children better care. Some of these trained carers are paid from CCPI funds to ensure that the new standards of care are maintained. Irish fundraising has also paid for specially moulded wheelchairs for children unable to sit up in regular ones, which has totally transformed their lives and helped to prevent further deformities. CCPI has built a terrace of six apartments at Vesnova, little Homes of Hope for young adults - former patients in the Children's Asylum who would otherwise have moved into adult asylums at 18, but who can now live nearly independent lives with the help of their carers.

We visited a daycare centre built by CCPI (funds raised by Pfizer staff) to a design by Duncan Stewart - in fact the project he was working on when he suffered a near-fatal fall there a few years ago! - and now offering family counselling, crisis intervention, crafts training, cookery and computer classes, all from the most modern facilities and in a warm and caring environment. The director of this daycare centre took us out to the surrounding villages to meet some of the desperately poor families who benefit from the centre's services.

Although we met people living in misery - in dreadful squalor and with terrible health problems - refused help by a government trying to deny their existence, it was truly uplifting to see in so many places the enormous difference that CCPI has made to children's lives. It's a real privilege to work with such a worthwhile charity where we could literally see that every euro given goes directly to where it's most needed.





Haven was established in late 2008 by Leslie Buckley who was affected by the conditions that he witnessed first hand in Haiti having spent a lot of years working there. He has been so affected by the poverty that he has already donated one million euro towards

the project.



The aim of Haven is to build houses for the people of Haiti which is the poorest country in the Western World. Conditions in Haiti are dire for the vast majority of its population of 8.5 million. Seven out of ten Haitians are living below the poverty line of \$2 a day. One child dies every hour from starvation, with almost a quarter of children under five suffering from malnutrition. Unemployment stands at 54% and half of the population cannot read or write and hundreds of thousands of people are condemned to live in shacks and slums.

Haven's vision for Haiti is one where every one of its citizens has a proper place to call home, where children have somewhere safe to sleep at night and families feel secure. It is Haven's aim to build one thousand new homes and improving two thousand more by the end of 2011.

Catherine and Jane will be traveling to Haiti in October with 250 other volunteers to work on the project to help build homes for the people of Haiti. To do this €4000 each has to be raised by them and they are asking the public to support their fundraising efforts over the next few months. 





THANKS to Kinsale Harbour Board, public toilets were open for use in its new building at Pier Head, Mr. Billy Lynch informed fellow members of Kinsale Town Council at their monthly meeting. Mr. Lynch, who is chairman of the harbour board, said the toilets were free and open from 9am to 6pm daily. Mr. Michael Frawley and other members welcomed this. Mayor Dermot Collins suggested the opening times of the public toilets at Pier Road be displayed.

In a report, town engineer Mr. Rob Andrews said new sewer connections were made to the main drainage scheme for the tourist office and the adjacent public toilets at Pier Road, the latter of which had re-opened. These had previously drained directly into the harbour via an existing old culvert. Mr. Charles Henderson stressed the urgency of securing funding and the go-ahead for the treatment plant at Commoge to serve Kinsale Sewerage Scheme, which is due to be completed by the end of 2010

Up to now, he understood, surface water mixed with sewage meant that what discharged into the harbour was around 90% diluted foul water but any remaining discharges, once the scheme was completed would be 100% raw sewage if the treatment plant, which was likely to take one year to build, wasn't up and running. "We're looking at a smoking barrel in 12 months time if it doesn't happen", he warned.

Mr. Collins said that according to a recent Ministerial reply to a question the Dail, the funding was there. Mr. Fred Treacy however, asked if the contract had been awarded. The Minister did give the go-ahead but was the funding there? The manager, Ms. Mary Ryan undertook to check.

TRAWLER POSING DANGER

Abandoned trawler 'Lucky Star' posed a navigational danger in Kinsale Harbour and should be removed to a safe berth in Cork said Mr. Billy Lynch at the May meeting of the town council.

Mr. Lynch, who is chairman of Kinsale Harbour Board said that only for the intervention of Canon David Williams chaplain to the Mission to Seafarers, harbour master Captain Phil Devitt, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, the Chamber of Tourism, local boat owners and other people in Kinsale who provided fresh water, food and support for four Pakistani crewmen left stranded on the vessel in recent weeks, what had become a humanitarian crisis could have been even more desperate.

The crewmen, who were not paid wages totalling over \$30,000 for five months, were flown home recently, almost two months after arriving in Irish waters and being abandoned by their Greek captain and the vessel's owners on March 16th. One of the crew had to take his child out of college in Pakistan because he wasn't paid by his employers and consequently couldn't pay the fees.

'Lucky Star', said Mr. Lynch was now "a dead ship" in that it wasn't manned and had no lights. It was also light and high in the water which meant that in high winds there was a real risk of it going ashore, breaking up and causing oil pollution in Kinsale Harbour. Although officially detained, it seemed the Department of Transport had washed its hands in the matter while the Greek owners hadn't responded to any phone calls or e mails. It's understood the former Icelandic trawler arrived into Kinsale from the Faroe Islands en route to Greece.

It was quite clearly a danger to navigation and he proposed that the Minister for Transport be written to and urged to direct that the trawler be removed from Kinsale Harbour - where there was no berth space available – to Cork City where there were plenty of vacant quays to secure the boat. Mr. Fred Treacy seconded and paid tribute to all who provided assistance to the stricken crew, one of whom was not in the best of health.

It's Never Too Late To Learn

Written Off? which featured on RTE ONE on Mondays at 7.30pm is a total departure from traditional educational programmes. It is a TV documentary which follows the lives of eight adults who all have difficulties with reading, writing, spelling and basic maths. Many such people invest a lot of time and energy into hiding their difficulty, due to the stigma associated with having literacy difficulties in today's society. This should not be the case as support is available through the Adult Basic Education Service, which aims to dispel this stigma and support those who could benefit from a second chance at learning.

This free and confidential service is available in the Kinsale area at the Further Education Centre on the Bandon Road, where you or anyone you know that might have difficulties with reading, writing, spelling, maths and basic computer skills needed for everyday life, can avail of tuition given by training tutors in a relaxed and informal manner.

The success of this service is dependent on the voluntary tutor whose involvement is vital for the provision of one-to-one tuition that is tailored to meet the needs of the learner. You can help support others who wish to benefit from our service by becoming a voluntary tutor - no previous qualifications required, as training will be provided.

Log On, Learn Initiative in Kinsale Community School

The Log On, Learn Programme is a new initiative which has been set up by Intel, in collaboration with Microsoft and supported by An Post. This initiative involves Transition Year (TY) students 'buddying up' with older people in their community to teach them how to use computers and the internet, as it relates to their specific lifestyle and life interests.

It is estimated that 99% of secondary school students are able to use a computer and the internet, whereas in the over 65 age category only approx 25% can use a computer and the internet. The *Log On, Learn* programme is the perfect opportunity for TY students to pass on their computer skills to older people.

The programme consists of 8 modules, but the one-to-one training is tailored to suit the need of each individual learner. The training takes into account the older person's initial skill level, learning pace, interests and hobbies. Naturally the programme is of enormous benefit to the student also as they learn to relate better with adults and get a better understanding of the older generation along with developing their teaching skills.



The classes took place on Wednesday afternoons in the school computer room for a total of 8 weeks (running from March to May). Eighteen TY students volunteered their free time to take part in the programme and they had no problem recruiting willing students in their local community. In fact there is a long list already for next year! Teachers also gave of their freely

of their time to supervise the computer room for the duration of the classes so a big thank you to all involved.

All in all the initiative was a huge success, with both generations learning so much from each other. As a result of the initiative the

students of TY4 were motivated to arrange a visit to the Haven Bay Centre to support National Alzheimer's Tea Day on 7 May. They performed an array of songs and musical pieces for the entertainment of all those in attendance.


KINSALE WINTER WARMER

Working today for a sustainable tomorrow

SPRING FAIR 25TH APRIL

The eve of this year's Spring Fair saw the launch of the very unique Green Door Art Show with its art and installations focused on sustainability. The artists took inspiration from the elements of the earth: Tara De Las Cases chose different coloured clay and earthy pigmented colours and sculpted some beautiful pieces which were then framed; Brendan Powers' work embraced two of nature's elements: fire and earth, utilizing the medium of pyrography (writing with fire); Donal O'Gara crafted fine functional art material based on recycled steel and wood; Brian Brennan used found objects which he recycled into beautiful pieces and Rob Ireson used a D.I.Y. ethic, working primarily with metal and recycling what ever possible to power interactive kinetic sculptures such as his analogue virtual reality machine. A sculpture of a red elephant was created by Brian Hart. The



piece was a metaphor for the contradictory nature of man: we make things, then discard them. The resulting piece was a red plaster elephant in a cardboard boat that may or may not float!

All the work focused on a low environmental impact theme and all of the artists used recycled and found materials.

Spring Rain! Is this becoming a habit? On the morning of the Spring Fair we woke up to torrential rain and howling winds, same as last year. But perhaps it was a blessing in disguise as by early afternoon St. Multose Hall was buzzing with people and energy. Had it been sunny they might have all gone to the beach! Again TTK joined forces with Kinsale Tidy Towns, who ran their second annual car boot sale. This year we moved to St. Multose Hall, and what a fantastic venue this turned out to be. We had a probable attendance upwards past 500 people. Car boot stalls were a €20 donation to Tidy Towns and all 20 exhibitors said they had a successful day.

'Cheap and Cheerful' Grow your own event 21st March 2009

A fun and informative evening was had by all on Spring Equinox when The Temperance Hall was packed with gardeners eager to see the wonderful Joy Larkcom speak. The



evening began with Kinsale Community Garden coordinator, Aimi Pinder, who gave a talk on 'growing in small spaces'. She focused on the techniques with which vegetables can be grown even when a large garden is not available.

Next up was Joy, who is the author of a number of beautifully written books on vegetable growing. She is the authority on oriental vegetables and it is her we have to thank for the 'cut and come again' system of growing salads. Her talk on 'Creative Vegetable Growing' was a wonderful slide show illustrating various examples of how to create beauty in the vegetable garden using pattern, form and colour as well as a touch of inspiration. One thing that became evident from both talks was that vegetables don't need to be grown in straight lines hidden at the bottom of the garden!

A raffle was also held with prizes of gift vouchers and seeds for which a big thanks goes out to Future Forests and Brown Envelope Seeds. The evening was a huge success, not only for the information and inspiration received by those present but because through donations, raffle ticket sales and a tea and cake stall we managed to raise €300 for the Community Garden. DOWN AT THE COMMUNITY GARDEN by Aimi Pinder

Since the beginning of March we have been sowing a number of salads and vegetables both in pots to grow on in our cold frame or straight into the ground. The salad bed is looking quite full with leaf beet, spinach, rocket, beetroot, radish, oriental leaves and lettuces all planted out. They are really coming on and in a few weeks time we should be able to start harvesting some! Other veg has been sown in situ such as peas, broad beans and parsnips (which we sowed with radishes to get a quick crop before the parsnips get going). Potatoes have also been planted in tyres and their green tops are growing at a fantastic rate.

Maintenance work has also continued: timber edging beds, improving levels to make flat work areas and continuing the work on extending the shed to make a covered seating area, which is nearing completion. All in all everyone has been working very hard and the garden is certainly demonstrating what can be done when people come together for just three hours a week!

The free 6 week course in organic growing has been a wonderful success. So far, classes on 'Soil', 'Seed Sowing' and 'Composting' have taken place and participants have been gaining lots of tips to take into their own vegetable gardens. If you would like some help to get going growing or just want a fun afternoon out please do come down to the garden workdays Sundays 1-4pm.

- 2) The group agreed to set up a Kinsale Energy CoOp (advice bureau) with the intention of 'saving money, and reducing carbon dependency for the Kinsale community.
- 3) How people/businesses might better measure/reduce their electricity use. Could we use Smart Meters (cost €150) or loan them out? Can we find out more about current Kinsale usage? What if we could arrange a thermal picture from the air for the town?
- 4) There are many energy generation opportunities to be further discussed such as hydro power and wind power.
- 5) A series of well targeted 'energy saving forums' might be held in town to help members of the community be better informed about these issues. Contact Alan at: 087 2219266.

Elder flowers are the most fragrant found in Irish hedgerows. In late May and June umbels of creamy blossoms adorn the Elder tree, transforming its scraggy, undistinguished appearance into midsummer exuberance.

The branches of the tree contain a soft pithy core which is easily removed to create hollow pipes from which reputedly the fairy folk made their musical instruments. The most likely time to see fairies was under an Elder tree on Midsummer's Eve.

As a protective tree it was planted at the back door of dwellings to ward off evil spirits.

The young leaves, bark, flowers and berries all have considerable properties and uses in traditional herbal medicine even the roots, which as Nicholas Culpepper in his 17th century Complete Herbal recommends 'the juice of the root taken, mightily procures vomitings and purges the watery humours of the dropsy.'

For contemporary palates the flowers can be used to make a simple cordial or a sparkling white wine. The flavour of gooseberries can be enhanced if the flowers (tied in a mustin bag) are added during cooking. As the berries ripen they become blueblack and can be used to make jellies, jam and excellent wine.

These trees in flower can be seen on Compass Hill or along almost any roads around Kinsale and elsewhere in the next few weeks.

"HORRENDOUS", was how Mr. Darren Cotter at the May meeting of Kinsale Town Council described the growing problem of illegal roadside dumping on the outskirts of the town.

He asked if hidden battery-operated surveillance cameras could be installed at litter black spots and if projects could be initiated in the town to raise awareness and combat the problem. He stressed that his comments were not a reflection on Kinsale Tidy Towns committee members who were doing their utmost to tackle litter.

Mr. Billy Lynch, who is vice chairman of Kinsale Tidy Towns committee, said he recently picked up rubbish over a section of road on the outskirts of Kinsale from E and T Builders to Pewterhole Cross and suggested if each of the nine councillors did the same along individual roads, it would help.

Mayor Dermot Collins pointed out that the dumping referred to was happening in areas under the jurisdiction of Cork County Council.

Whatever cutbacks took place, it was essential that the grass in open spaces in housing estates such as Ballinacubby and Butcher's Row be cut, said Mr. Lynch as this was very important from a Tidy Towns point of view. In a report, town engineer Mr. Rob Andrews said street cleaning operations at weekends in Kinsale could be affected by reductions in the amount of overtime available to operatives. Routes for street cleaning by town council staff were being reviewed to improve effectiveness.

Mr. Michael Frawley congratulated the council staff, in particular Peter Gimblett and Tim Eaton who were out very early on a morning during the Kinsale Rugby Sevens festival cleaning the streets. Mr. Tomas O'Brien paid tribute to the council staff, the Gardai, Civil Defence, Red Cross and fellow members of Kinsale Rugby Club for hosting another successful festival which helped secure the future of rugby in Kinsale, especially at under-age level.

Mr. Charles Henderson, who is chairman of Kinsale Tidy Towns, said its sub-committee had come up with specific proposals to boost the 2009 campaign. In particular, it wished to develop the site of the old pound with paving, a light and display boards highlighting the fact that Kinsale won the national Tidy Towns competition in 1986 and numerous other awards over the years and was the first winner of the All Ireland Best Kept Town and European Tourism and Environment awards. He pointed out that the vacant site was owned by the town council and should be an amenity.

Mr. Collins spoke in support but asked that the council be furnished with drawings and plans, noting that there was a previous proposal to put an outdoor chessboard at the site which never materialised. Other councillors also supported the proposal with Mr. Tomas O'Brien saying the idea of enhancing the old pound had been kicked around for years.

Mr. Henderson added that during the month of May, paint was on sale at a reduced price in Murphy's Hardware, Main Street and Bandon Co-op Retail Store, Farm Lane, aimed at boosting the Tidy Towns effort.

With regard to the problem of dog fouling, town clerk Ms. Michelle Kelleher said she checked with An Post and was told the cost of delivering leaflets about this to every house in Kinsale would cost the council €700. She had however, arranged for the dog warden to visit the town shortly to hand out leaflets and said the county council was being updated. It was hoped to have the Kinsale town crest on those for local distribution and Mr. Collins suggested leaflets could be posted to dog licence holders and known dog owners.

Ms. Kelleher added that outdoor council workers had an attachment on their new carts and their routes would incorporate key areas so that dog excrement could be removed.

At the previous meeting, Ms. Isabelle Sutton and other members queried whether the 'bring site' in the county council yard would be downgraded. They were informed that the manager had consulted with the engineers in waste management as to the possibility of installing a coin operated cardboard compacting machine. Quotations were awaited and a report was due to be issued at the next meeting but the bring site would not be downgraded in the meantime.
