Now in its 6th year, Kinsale Arts Week annually transforms the town of Kinsale in to an artistic hub of activity for nine event-packed days and nights. Shop windows become exhibition spaces, historic forts become music venues and old mills are given a new lease of life as art galleries. There will be lots to enjoy, with music, classical concerts, children's events, dance, theatre, artists trails, workshops in everything from tiny book making to Commedia Dell'Arte and a brand new art gallery space housing work by some of Ireland's finest artists. Here are some of the 2010 highlights:

MUSIC

Charles Fort welcomes three hypnotic, magical and downright sexy stars to its glorious outdoor stage...

Hypnotic Brass Ensemble bring their jazzy, infectious, joyful grooves to the stage for what the President of the United States himself says is a performance that 'soothes the soul'.

The Bootleg Beatles have filled the Royal Albert Hall, the main stage at Glastonbury and even Buckingham Palace with their spectacular stage production featuring the fab four's classic hits.

Camille O'Sullivan, Cork's most ravishing star, will take command of the fort at Kinsale with her show-stopping, soul-baring, provocative new show.

In addition to the outdoor gigs at Charlesfort, the festival is delighted to welcome one of the foremost pianists of his generation, Jack Gibbons playing a programme of Gershwin and Chopin. Fresh from their 2010 tour of China, the Irish Chamber Orchestra will bring their superb musicianship to the sublime setting of St. Multose Church. Now performing regularly as a duo, popular accordionist Dermot Dunne and virtuoso violinist Katherine Hunka will join the ensemble as they present an exciting mix of music which ranges from celebrated classics and virtuoso show pieces to a selection of works with a strong Latin flavour.

VISUAL ART

This year the festival is very proud to announce the opening of a new visual arts hub in Kinsale; the town's beautiful, deserted old mill building has been renovated and transformed into a fantastic new venue for the visual arts programme at the festival. 'The KAW Art Hub at the Mill' will feature work by Alice Maher, Dorothy Cross, Patrick Scott, Charles Tyrell, Donald Teskey, John Doherty and Eithne Jordan. Also on show at the Mill, to celebrate the arrival of the Clipper 09-10 Round the World Yacht Race, the festival has invited each of the international regions participating in the race to select an artist to represent them at an exhibition. There will also be an Artist's Trail taking visitors on a magical mystery tour through the wealth of artist's studios in Kinsale and its surrounds.



LITERATURE

The literature programme is packed this year with a wide variety of gems, with readings by multi-award winning novelist Joseph O'Connor and acclaimed author Claire Kilroy and a screening of the insightful documentary into the life and work of poet Derek Mahon by Roger Greene. The screening will be followed by a Q&A session with Derek and Roger. Poet Christopher Reid, winner of the Costa Book of the Year 2009, will also read his work, as will poet Gerard Smyth.

DANCE

An exciting series of film screenings playing Screen Dance, an artistic genre where choreography and film reside together. The stunning Forward Motion, a British Council project co-produced with South East Dance in the UK. RTÉ's excellent Dance on the Box 2010 will also be screened, providing people with the opportunity to see some of the most skilled Irish dance and film practitioners work together. The screening will be introduced by David Bolger, Artistic Director of CoisCéim Dance, whose film Deep End Dance in collaboration with Conor Horgan will be screened during the festival.

COMEDY

Fresh from gracing our TV screens for the World Cup, the Après Match team will be coming out to play. Apart from the usual mix of weird and wonderful characters such as Bill, Eamon, Liam, John, Gary Lineker, Mark Lawrenson, George Hook, and Martin King this show will also include new targets like Martin O'Neill, Ryan Tubridy, Brendan O'Connor, Vincent Browne, Joan Burton and many more. The incomparable Kevin Mc Aleer will also return to the festival after his roaring success in 2008.

THEATRE

Prepare to step into a world stirring with drama and romance as La Locandiera by Wonderland Productions transforms Kinsale's Ballinacurra House into the world of 18th century Florence. Enjoy a delicious four course meal and allow Mirandolina, the hostess at the inn, to serve you whilst her suitors caper, court and swordfight for her attention. Acclaimed UK company Sharpwire bring their spellbinding one man operatic thriller Johnny's Midnight Goggles to the festival, with the incredibly skilled actor

Matthew Sharp also giving an Opera singing master class and lunchtime cello recital during the festival.

FAMILY

Entertainment with theatre for kids, 18mts - 18yrs, and a family Green Day filled with lots of green-themed entertainment and activities including a Vegetable Circus, growing workshops and a community dance performance. There are also a whole host of workshops for the kids, including a Play in a Day and Tiny Book Making! And of course there will be the ever popular Street Day taking over the streets of Kinsale for a day of outdoor fun.

Here Come The Clippers

KINSALE CLIPPER STOPOVER CARNIVAL
JULY 2nd - 4th 2010

Kinsale is the first port of call in Europe for the Clipper Round the World Yacht Race and the town is hosting a Kinsale Clipper Stopover Carnival to extend a fantastic welcome to participants. The fleet of 10 Clipper Round the World yachts is expected to arrive sometime during Friday/Saturday, July 2nd/3rd.

Highlights of the Carnival Weekend include "Ebb-Tide-Flow", an audio-guided walk distributed on mp3 players designed by artist Fiona Hallinan and composer Alex Synge. During the weekend children and adults will be invited to come to the Methodist Church and make a page for "The Clipper Adventure Book". The book will follow the journey of the clippers around the world and will then be exhibited for the year at the local library.

Food and drink are key ingredients for a good carnival and they'll be plenty of both at the fabulous Artisan Food Market on Long Quay where stallholders will participate in a market which will consist of the finest artisan food and food to go, all from the locality. There will also be busking spots featuring artists such as The Invisible Men; Grant Goldie; The Fanzinis and their Cannonball Circus and Cork City String Quartet.

One of the centrepieces of the Carnival Weekend will be Live Music at the Square throughout Saturday and Sunday with artists such as Ian Whitty and The Exchange; Aaron Dillon and Band; Novella Hermosa and Txutxukan.

Friday July 2nd will see the Kinsale Clipper, an evening of music in different venues, where instead of the audience travelling to see different acts in different venues, the acts come to each venue in turn. The Locations are: The Trident Hotel, Actons Hotel, Vista Bistro, Jolas Restaurant, The White Lady, The Blue Haven and artists include Colin McLean Latin Trio and Kinsale's own The Good Rain.

Kinsale Arts Week has invited each of the regions participating in the Clipper Race to exhibit at the festival in a unique art exhibition "Stopover" which will commence on July 2nd in the newly renovated Old Mill Building.

The culmination of the weekend on Sunday will be the Clipper Parade where the streets of Kinsale are going to be transformed into the mighty trade routes - from Asia to Europe - that the Clippers of old sailed along all that time ago.

On Thursday 17th June at 1615 local time (1915 GMT) *Cork, Ireland*, crossed the start line at Royal Cape Breton Yacht Club, Sydney, to begin the 2,075 mile race to Kinsale. The team, led by Hannah Jenner, had 48 hours to build the biggest possible lead before the fleet of nine Clipper 68s starts to hunt them down. For the first time in the Clipper Race's history this will be a pursuit race after the original Clipper 68 was lost when Cork hit a submerged reef in the Java Sea last January.

The Challenge 67 that the team is now sailing is slightly shorter and also heavier, so the fleet is racing under IRC handicap rules. For Race

12 that handicap is being applied up front, hence their departure from Cape Breton Island two days before the rest of the fleet.

Cork's crew almost immediately changed up from their yankee headsails to a mid-weight spinnaker to take full advantage of the ten knots of breeze. Irish crew member Kevin Austen shared his thoughts prior to the boat departing, saying, "This Atlantic crossing is a nice big carrot at the end of the stick and we are looking forward to pushing her hard and bringing her home. The concept of the pursuit race is really interesting; the next 48 hours will be pedal to the metal, keep her moving to get as much space between us and the pursuers. The weather gods have not been on our side in the last couple of races but we have already shown that we can be competitive. We are hoping to show that properly now and push fast and hard across the last great ocean crossing of this race."

The others are really looking forward to the moment the team makes landfall on the other side of the Atlantic, including County Kerry resident, Jacqui Browne.

"When I see Ireland for the first time, you will probably never see such a big smile, ever, on a person's face," she says. "I'll have the biggest grin I have ever worn! Even this morning, seeing the routing chart and seeing the straight line across the Atlantic, it makes home feel very close."

Before they slipped their mooring lines, the team was invited to a send-off reception at which Burton MacIntyre, a local step dance teacher who will be coming to the stopover in Kinsale and Cork with the Cape Breton Island delegation, put the crew through their paces. For many of the team arriving in Ireland will mark their return home after almost a year away and a quick brush up on their dancing skills in readiness for a huge party in Kinsale was deemed essential. Burton promised to be on the quay side to greet the team when they arrive after the final major ocean crossing of the Clipper 09-10 Race. He won't be alone - the Cork crew members already have big plans for celebrating their homecoming and supporters will be there in large numbers.

Kevin says, "My mother has a few plans for Cork but it's easier getting a line up for a music festival early on as it is to get the plans out of my Mum! I have heard talk of a big barbecue. They will all be in Kinsale; my friends - the two Tims, Luke and Neil and all of my mates will be down. They've rented a house in Kinsale and it should be a massive big party."

Jacqui will also have a sizeable group of supporters waiting to cheer her in as she arrives home. "It will be really emotional but for now it's excitement at the anticipation of seeing friends and family that I know will be waiting at the quayside and I'm really looking forward to seeing them and hearing them screaming and roaring out my name. I would expect at least 50 to 60 people that I know will be there - people from Cork and Kerry plus many of the Cork crew who have sailed on previous legs. It's going to be one big happy party." Kinsale Honours Sr. Mary Donovan SCHOOL PRINCIPAL RETIRES

'THANKS a million from a grateful town for serving us so well for so long and for working so hard and achieving so much', said Mayor of Kinsale Tomás O'Brien at a town council reception in Acton's Hotel on May 28th in honour of Sister of Mercy Mary Donovan who has retired after 25 years as principal of Kinsale Community School and prior to that Our Lady of the Rosary Secondary School.

There was a very large turnout of public representatives, teachers, staff, parents, students plus many friends and supporters of the school to pay tribute to Sr Mary, a native of Drimoleague.

'There isn't a minister, TD, senator or councillor for this area, past or present who doesn't know Sr Mary who continued to impress on all of them over many years, the need for a new school on a green field site. Following a hard fought campaign, Kinsale Vocational and the Convent secondary schools amalgamated and the new Kinsale Community School opened in 1996 and it wasn't long before the Sr Mary was to the fore in the next project, an extension which was granted after much lobbying and today Kinsale is in need of a further extension, such is its popularity.'

Reflecting on the school's many successes in academic achievement and in sports, music, drama art, design, debating, maths quizzes and most notably twice producing winners of the Young Scientist of the Year competition, the mayor said it continued to punch above its weight leaving many fee-paying schools in its wake. Sr Mary led a great team in creating one of the best community schools in the country and he and his fellow councillors were delighted to honour a lady who followed her religious vocation, achieved so much and brought knowledge to many.

The mayor presented to Sr Mary a specially commissioned photograph of the school by Nelius Buckley captioned 'The school that Sr Mary built' after which Nelius presented a portrait photograph of the retiring principal and thanked her for being so very supportive, approachable and understanding to him and his family since 1995.

Garda James O'Mahony said both he and Sr Mary came to Kinsale in 1984 and recalled how she broke the mould by inviting him as a Garda officer to talk to pupils at the former convent school. 'Sr Mary always had young people at the centre and put them first and when the annals of history of this town are recorded, her name will be prominent'. The juvenile liaison officer also spoke of how Sr Mary worked in a quiet way for many people, adding that she was honest, hard working, direct and straightforward.

Mr Charles Dolan on behalf of Eli Lilly, a long time benefactor of the school, paid tribute to Sr Mary for her leadership, passion and vision for the betterment of the students. 'You have left a tremendous legacy in Kinsale and the wider community', he added.

Mrs Eileen Murphy on behalf of the parents, thanked Sr Mary and wished her a happy retirement. Her association with her went back to the campaign she led with a group of parents of children attending the old convent school which had freezing conditions, a lack of space and a consequent limited range of subjects that could be taught. Sr. Mary left no stone unturned and overcame many hurdles to get a new school for Kinsale and today it had one that was the envy of many, she added.

On behalf of the teaching staff, Cllr Tony Cierans opened by saying of Sr Mary 'good leaders don't follow a path, they create their own' and in the course of a light hearted address said that during the 20 years he taught in Kinsale, Sr Mary was at the cutting edge of all activities and on a personal level spoke of the special

relationship between the Sisters of Mercy and the lay teaching staff.

'Kinsale Community School strives for academic excellence, student welfare, a balance between hard work and extra curricular activities and all under the watchful eye of Sr Mary. She has only one concern and that is the students. She is interested in each and every one of them.'

Cllr Cierans also spoke of her passion for best practice and said she expected the same in return. If she had something to say to you, she would say it straight out but if you needed a word of professional advice or an issue that needed resolving, she was also available to all. 'I don't live too far from the school and on most Saturdays or Sundays her car would be seen in the school car park. She is what is often called a grafter and there is no area in which she is unwilling to muck in.'

Saying it was a privilege to work with her, he went on: 'We admire your complete dedication. Thank you for creating from nothing the place that we call work. We share in your dream on a daily basis and it lived on a daily basis also by 746 children for whom the school is a safe and happy place to spend these vital years. You have built the school and you too are a rock of professionalism, integrity,

generosity and leadership. You will be a hard act to follow and we will miss you'.

Returning thanks, Sr Mary said she was overwhelmed by the messages of goodwill she had received and said it was a pleasure to work in such a happy atmosphere with the pupils, teachers and staff over the past 25 years and one that was based on the core value of respect with the children at the centre.

She also paid a glowing tribute to boards of management and parent bodies over the years, the latter of whom raised £100,000 towards the building of the new school and along with herself never gave politicians a minute's peace until it was delivered. The people of Kinsale had always been wonderful and so too were many business benefactors whom she listed while throughout her career the Sisters of Mercy were always been very supportive. All, she added, were companions on a journey which had been a pleasant and fulfilling experience. Sr. Mary concluded by thanking the Mayor and Kinsale TC for 'a night that will always be special to me' and the staff of Acton's Hotel and along with other speakers extended best wishes to incoming principal Sean O'Broin.

A number of staff spoke at the ceremony in the gym; Don O'Shea highlighted how Sr Mary, though not an avid user, was a huge proponent of technology in education; Marie Hayes spoke of how Sr Mary supported and facilitated the sporting life of the school;

Honor O'Brien reflected on how the pastoral care was at the heart of Sr Mary's concern for students; and finally Tony Cierans spoke not only of Sr Mary's love of roller-coasters and her cameo parts in the school shows but also of her huge support for the extra-curricular life of the school.

Fergal O'Brien, Jennifer Ryan, Tessa Kingston and Jeremiah Wright spoke eloquently and ably on behalf of the students about Sr Mary's contribution as a principal. The MC for the event was Seán O'Broin who summed up Sr Mary's philosophy of education as one which always placed at the centre the best interests of the students.

A presentation of photographs, a Kinsale crystal vase and flowers, was made on behalf of the students to Sr Mary. The ceremony ended as it had begun with sustained applause for the woman who has given so much to education in Kinsale.

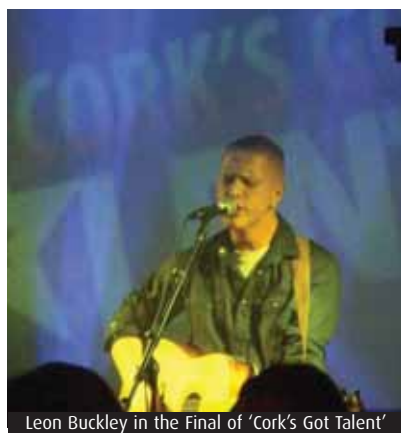

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Fáilte Sáile

'A fantastic facility' said Cllr Tomas O'Brien at the monthly meeting of Kinsale Town Council when referring to the Sáile – Kinsale Community Sports and Leisure complex nearing completion at Cappagh which he recently toured when he was mayor.

The first phase, he stated, was nearing completion and he recommended fellow councillors view the excellent facilities coming on stream and for the community to support fund raising efforts (e.g. Buy a Brick). He added that it was a great advertisement for the voluntary sector and local authorities working together.

Sáile – Kinsale Community Sports and Leisure Project is an initiative by the Kinsale Rural Development (KRD) Community Association Ltd. KRD is a voluntary non profit sporting body made up of a group of local activists committed to bettering the lives of residents of Kinsale and environs. Its primary focus is to provide Kinsale with a multi-use community, sports and recreation centre.

The centre is located on a 7.5 acre site and has been leased to the association by Cork County Council.

After many years of campaigning, work finally commenced in 2009 with Phase 1A – all-weather playing pitches, basketball courts, a kick about area and a community orchard. This will be followed by a community centre with a sports hall, dance studio, gym and multi-purpose meeting rooms will be built once funding has been secured. In the future, a 25 metre swimming pool may also be added, again subject to funding.

MICHAEL FRAWLEY ELECTED NEW MAYOR OF KINSALE

A family tradition of service to the community continues with the election of Cllr Michael T. Frawley (Fianna Fail) at Mayor of Kinsale, 20 years after his father and namesake was elected first citizen. Cllr Cotter (FF) was also unanimously elected Deputy Mayor and glowing tributes were paid to outgoing Mayor Tomas O'Brien (Labour).

Cllr Frawley at 29, we're told, is Kinsale's youngest Mayor and is set to become the first to get married in office when on September 4, he ties the knot with Aggie Dudsik in Poland. Son of Michael and Rose Frawley and brother of Janet and Olivia Frawley of the award winning White House Restaurant and Bar (and nephew of Maureen Mortimer of The Lord Kingsale), he is also chairman of Kinsale Vintners and member of the Chamber of Tourism, Good Food Circle, Kinsale Rugby Club and other organisations and very active in the local community.

Cllr Frawley was proposed by Cllr Fred Treacy (Fine Gael) who said he came from a family which gave great service to the town. He would no doubt be kept on the straight and narrow by his father who was cathaoirleach of the then Kinsale UDC in 1989-90.

Seconding, Cllr Alan Clayton (Green) said Cllr Frawley had all the qualities to do the job coming from a business rooted in the town. He also spoke of the new mayor's active involvement with Kinsale Fairtrade and Transition Town. Cllr Frawley was then unanimously elected mayor.

Returning thanks, Cllr Frawley promised it would be a year of short speeches but he was very conscious of receiving the highest honour of first citizen and had a very hard act to follow in Cllr O'Brien. He looked forward to 'a challenging and exciting year' and hoped to see the resolution of the 'public toilets crisis', more overtime or an increase in council staff, a closer relationship between the council and community organisations and progress towards the proposed Kinsale Marine Park. He concluded by thanking residents and ratepayers for their patience during work in the town on the main drainage scheme.

The new mayor was congratulated by Cllr Lynch who said he was well known and liked and did a very good job as chairman of Kinsale Harbour Board while Cllr O'Brien said he was a very good deputy mayor. Cllr Cotter and other members added their congratulations and best wishes.

Cllr Cotter was unanimously elected deputy mayor on a proposal by Cllr Billy Lynch (FG), seconded by Cllr Noel Harrington (Sinn Féin). He was Mayor of Kinsale in 2004-05.

Cllr Treacy led the tributes to the outgoing mayor saying Cllr O'Brien served the town with great dignity and fairness and set a very high standard. Cllr Harrington said he did a great job and put in a huge amount of his personal time while Cllr Cotter said he was impeccable, adding that Kinsale was very proud of what he did. The manager Ms Mary Ryan concurred on behalf the staff and herself and spoke of the huge amount of hard work put in by Cllr O'Brien.

Cllr Lynch said Cllr O'Brien did an excellent job in what was the busiest year for a mayor while Cllr Tony Cierans (Labour) said he was role model for him as a new member and spoke of his great sense of justice, his patience, encouragement and enthusiasm.

Cllr O'Brien, who attended 131 functions plus meetings in his year as mayor, thanked his wife Aine and family, the manager for always being fair and straight, town clerk Ms Michelle Kelleher; Ms Claire O'Donovan, Ms Niamh Spillane and Ms Claire Levis in the council office; town foreman Mr Charles Henderson engineers Messrs Frank Morrison and Rob Andrews, area supervisor Mr Dan Cummins and Messrs Enda O'Halloran and Tom Kelly in the county council office; workmates at Eli Lilly, the media for its fair coverage and fellow councillors and added: 'Kinsale has a great story to tell'.

Later, Mr Michael Frawley senior 'killed the fatted calf' at the most appropriately named White House where a barbecue was held with members, officials, family and friends to celebrate the unanimous and popular election of the new Mayor of Kinsale.

Kinsale TC seeks extension

Having previously been rejected by Cork County Council, Kinsale Town Council is to go direct to Minister for Local Government Mr John Gormley TD requesting an extension to its boundary.

Speaking at the May meeting of the council, Cllr Dermot Collins - who previously proposed an extension - referred to the map showing the proposed enlarged area and pointed out that if granted, would have little impact on the revenue of the county council since it contained few industries from which rates are collected. He also made the point that it was the attractiveness of Kinsale town that encouraged Eli Lilly to set up its pharmaceutical plant at Dunderrow which is a major rate payer to the county council.

One of the oldest towns in Ireland, Kinsale has one of the smallest local authority areas. A significant number of houses and businesses are under the jurisdiction of County Hall although some households in that area can vote in town council elections.

NATURAL GAS FOR KINSALE?

Kinsale is a town in a dilemma. Just as work is about to be completed on the main phase of the sewerage scheme, involving disruptive but necessary excavations of its streets and traffic diversions, comes the offer of natural gas for its residents and businesses.

Reaction at the May meeting of Kinsale Town Council ranged from predicted uproar to an offer that's difficult to refuse.

Last month, Gaslink, the independent operator of Ireland's natural gas network, announced its intention to extend the natural gas network to Kinsale and Innishannon as well as an additional two towns in counties Tipperary and Meath, at a capital cost of around €15 million. Timing and roll-out to the four towns would be on a phased basis and be dependent on demand, interest and industrial / commercial development in each town.

"This is good news for the four towns and

Gaslink will work with local authorities, businesses and developers in each town to ensure that natural gas flows to these towns as soon as economically viable," said Aidan O'Sullivan, General Manager, Gaslink.

At the monthly meeting of the Cllr Michael Frawley recalled that his father and namesake, along with Mayor Tomas O'Brien and others called for Kinsale natural gas for Kinsale several years ago but the request was turned down by Bord Gais yet now it could happen.

Cllr Darren Cotter concurred, recalling the first proposal was going to serve Eli Lilly, Dunderrow but not the town.

This was confirmed by Cllr Dermot Collins who recalled a request back in 1999 but he feared there would be uproar if the people were asked to have the streets dug up all over again. Members were informed that all utility companies were written to asked if they had any plans in advance of work commencing on Kinsale Sewerage Scheme and area engineer Mr. Frank Morrisson was told by Bord Gais it wasn't interested in laying a network in the town. The recent announcement by Gaslink

therefore came as a shock because Kinsale TC had done its bit to ensure the town wasn't going to be dug up all over again.

Cllr Frawley however said that while it was annoying that the request came at this stage, there were many businesses in Kinsale with gas tanks which would prefer to have a piped supply. He believed that there was interest and warned against merely dismissing the offer from Gaslink.

Cllr O'Brien said that if the the council approved digging up its streets so soon again, they might as well leave town because the past two years, along with the recession, had been very tough on businesses. He voiced dismay that the council hadn't been contacted by Bord Gais all along. Cllr Noel Harrington concurred adding that eight businesses in Kinsale had closed in recent times.

* Bord Gais made a presentation to Kinsale Chamber of Tourism members in the Trident Hotel on June 23rd last on the proposed pipeline to Kinsale. We will have more details in our next issue of the Newsletter.

PEST BIRDS TO GET SILENT TREATMENT!

Although it hasn't reached Hitchcock proportions as featured in the classic movie 'The Birds', Kinsale Council is to hire falcons to give pest birds the silent treatment and get them out of town!

Town councillor Darren Cotter had complained about the proliferation of pigeons and their droppings at various parts of the town and especially in the Town Park area and it was agreed to have the matter investigated.

Acting town clerk Ms. Michelle Kelleher at the May meeting of Kinsale TC reported that a survey of the town had been conducted. Ravenstone Bird Control Services has submitted its findings and recommended that a silent but visual bird control programme should be implemented so as not to cause disturbance to traders and residents.

Falconers will patrol the town centre with tethered Harris Hawks and falcons to ward off pest birds. Inflatable bird repellents will also be used at the museum building to frighten away pest birds. I will not notify councillors when the control services is due to visit'.



Town Responds to Mayor's Call

There was a huge turnout recently to an appeal by the local Mayor, Mr. Tomas O'Brien to take part in a clean-up of the approach roads to the town.

Over seventy people from a number of organisations in the town joined the initiative, including Kinsale Rugby Club, Kinsale Lions Club, Kinsale Chamber of Tourism, local Gardai and a large number of residents in the town.

The local Tidy Town's Committee, who have ploughed a lonely furrow for a number of years, were thrilled with the turnout.

Speaking after the event, Mr. O'Brien said: "I am absolutely thrilled with the response from the community and hopefully we can build on it." In response to the Carrighoun newspaper making the Mayor aware that there is only two litter wardens to police the entire county, the Mayor promised to pursue the matter.

SOW AND GROW EVENT

In spite of exceptional cold weather this spring, sowing and growing enthusiasts demonstrated a wide range of skills and techniques at this event in the Temperance Hall on March 20th.

Workshops given on seed sowing by Dan Benn (Star Organics), composting by Stella Blad-Stahl and raised beds by Daniel Krakauer were keenly attended by novice and experienced growers. Seed saving and swapping is being revived to preserve heritage seeds, increase biodiversity and availability of seeds. Karen Keller Murphy, Liz Creed and Irene Ryle were kept busy with many queries and exchanges on this topic.

Young seedlings and plants were available from Star Organics so Dan Benn was there to dispense advice and information to all who purchased.



Ringrone Allotments have hugely increased their numbers this year so nearly all plots are allocated. Conversations between allotmenters include growing techniques, seed and vegetable varieties, polytunnels, cloches and mulching.

Education for Sustainability, TTK's schools programme, was presented by Jeannie showing the wonderful work by the team who teach in the local primary and secondary schools. There were photos of the children proudly sowing their vegetable growing beds. Seeds were sown by children and taken home to be nurtured and cared for during the coming months.

Community Supported Agriculture was represented by Aimi and Becca of Kinsale Green Growers box scheme. They are growing an extensive range of organic vegetables and fruit which will be supplied every week at competitive prices. Information was available on Derry Desmond's oat growing and Colm O'Regan's potatoes as CSA projects.

Preserves of exotic flavours by Deirdre Birmingham could be sampled and a fine selection of books from the Kinsale Bookshop was available for purchase.

Education for Sustainability (EFS) received a grant this year from West Cork Development Partnership under their LEADER programme to fund part of a year-long programme for Transition Year students at Kinsale Community School. Tara de las Casas and Virginia Stearns, who have been teaching sustainability and food growing skills at Kinsale's primary schools, are running the course which includes a combination of classroom activities, hands-on experience, discussion and films.

The students have put in some raised mulched beds for growing herbs and vegetables, planted some fruit trees art and participated as volunteers in TTK's annual Spring Fair.

The students, who are part of Transition Year's Green Team, also participated in a Community Powerdown Toolkit course, exploring community solutions to peak oil and climate change.

By the end of the programme, the students will understand the key climate and energy issues and have some of the skills needed to implement sustainable solutions to the challenges we face in the coming years.

TTK are very grateful to West Cork Development Partnership for their support for this endeavour which is part of its vision for Kinsale as a thriving and sustainable community.

CHAIRMAN of Kinsale Harbour Commissioners and local county councillor Kevin Murphy has welcomed a letter from the marine section of the Department of Transport stating that funding of €900,000 has been approved for reconstruction of the commercial berth at the Pier Head.

He thanked Minister for Transport Noel Dempsey, whom he spoke to recently in his capacity as chairman of the South and East Regional Assembly at a meeting in Co Meath, for his positive response and also to past and present harbour board members who have lobbied for the improvement to the Pier.

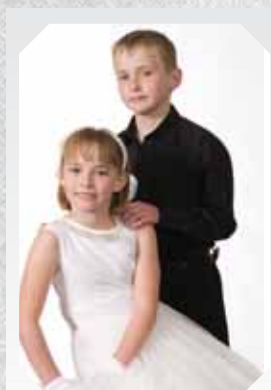

Dear Editor

I am an American woman who had the privilege of spending two and a half months in Kinsale last summer. Because my father lived in Ireland for many years, I had visited many times, often for months at a time. As such, I didn't expect this summer to be the exquisite learning experience it was.

My time in Kinsale taught me a great deal about things I wasn't looking for: family values and the value of family... and the fact that there is still a heart beating in at least one small region of this world.

The term family values has been discussed and exploited politically ad nauseam in the U.S. It is used as a euphemism for almost any political agenda to the extent that it no longer refers to the value of family as a cohesive societal unit.

However, I was delighted to find the embodiment of family values alive and well at the Kinsale Equestrian Centre. This summer and previously, I have been privileged to "work-to-ride" at the Kinsale Equestrian Centre. In my capacity as stable hand, I was able to observe the operation of the Centre as well as the interaction of the many families who have one or more members riding there.

The Centre itself is a family run business. Zoë and John Barrett own and operate the Centre while raising their four children. They are supported with all manner of help from various family members who appear at the Centre whenever they are needed. Zoë's brother, Mark Dennehy, is the Centre's farrier, when he is not doing his "day job." Zoë's father, Don Dennehy, helps with almost anything that needs fixing or making and is also part of the "purchasing department," helping acquire wonderful horses and ponies for the Centre. Zoë's mother, Hester Dennehy, is an able judge of horsemanship and helps with the camps and with her grandchildren. John's parents, Monica and William Barrett, also help with their grandchildren. In addition, Monica acts as gatekeeper to ensure that the young students are safe and accounted for when they enter the stable, and William helps behind the scenes keeping the stables clean and the horses fed, etc. In this way, the Kinsale Equestrian Centre is an amazing example of a family working collaboratively to provide a wonderful environment for horse-lovers in the area.

But the Dennehy/Barrett family support for the KEC was just a part of my education. While working at the Centre, I have watched what happens to families as their children fall in love with horses and riding. The love affair appears to be contagious because so many of the parents in the area follow suit and begin riding lessons. It appears that many mothers and fathers in the area wish to be part of their children's lives and to understand their passion for horses. Other parents take full advantage of the viewing opportunity at the Centre to watch their children's lessons. Sadly, having worked at a riding school in the U.S. for the last fifteen years, I cannot say these observations are consistent with what I see there, where children are dropped off and picked up later, generally with little or no parental interest in sharing their children's passion or even observing the lessons. Rather, the riding lesson represents a form of babysitting.

Since the Kinsale Equestrian Centre's inception, I have been to Ireland for three different extended visits and have ridden at the Centre each time. As such, I have watched the Centre grow and flourish into a thriving community of families sharing a common interest within their own families and among the families. The Kinsale Equestrian Centre has become a hub of activity for a growing number of area families who have an appreciation for equestrian activities that have been so much a part of Ireland's historic landscape. In a world which is becoming increasingly fragmented and where family values are becoming more and more difficult to find, experience or teach, Kinsale is fortunate to have the Kinsale Equestrian Centre, where family values are exhibited and shared regularly.

What I learned on summer vacation is that family values are alive and flourishing at the Kinsale Equestrian Centre. For my part, I intend to return as often as possible to experience this rare commodity, and to have my daughter join me whenever possible.

Public Toilet Facilities in Kinsale

Dear Editor

I make the following comments on the above:

The Public Toilets situated beside the Tourist Office are, without doubt, in poor condition. In their current state they reflect badly on the Town and are not in good enough condition to be open to public use. Substantial money is needed to bring these up to an acceptable standard.

In the meantime:- The APC situated next to the Bus Shelter on the Pier Road should be in good order and be operational at all times. That is what the Town pays the provider for; the Council has an obligation to ensure that they get value for money and to ensure that Kinsale receives the service it pays for.

Kinsale has a second statutory authority - the Harbour Board. A state of the art modern building funded by the public purse - in a central location WITH ground floor toilet facilities that are directly accessible from outside. Kinsale Town Council should work with the Harbour Board to make these toilet facilities available to the public.

Failte Ireland has a public office on the Pier Road, again with toilet facilities. Kinsale Town Council pays a substantial amount of money to Failte Ireland on an annual basis. A very tangible and useful service that they could now provide would be to make their toilet facilities available for public use during their opening hours.

Kinsale has the existing infrastructure and facilities by which to ensure that we can provide adequate toilet facilities for public use. What is needed is the will and drive to work together to make it happen. Now would be a good time to demonstrate how public bodies can do 'joined up thinking' and how the public service is committed to getting maximum value for public money spent. It would be irresponsible of the Town Council to borrow a very large amount of money to spend on the toilet block when there already are a number of options that could, and should, be available.

What happens to the public toilet block in the long term does of course need to be addressed; at this point in time that is a separate issue that should not hinder the availability of public toilet facilities in the Town.

On completion of his term as Mayor of Kinsale, Cllr Tomas O'Brien fills us in on his busy year:

Infrastructure:

The main drainage pipe laying is now complete. Kinsale Town now has the benefit of having a state of the art flood drainage and waste water treatment system. The treatment plant will be operational at the end of the year. We can all look forward to the inner harbour water quality improving immensely. Thanks to Noel O'Keefe and his team at Cork County Council, Sorensen Construction and most importantly the traders and residents who had to deal with the inconvenience over the last number of years.

Mill Building

This fine building in the centre has had many proposals for its use over the years. It will house an art exhibition during the Clipper Yacht race and Arts week. It will be available for approved projects

in the coming months. This building is owned by Cork County Council and the refurbishments are funded by them also. It will be managed by Kinsale Town Council.

Museum:

After much work and effort from the Town Clerk Michelle Kelleher and staff this historic asset is ready to open the doors once again to the general public. The museum will be staffed by a team of volunteers and they have already been busy cleaning the building. Thanks to them for giving their time to show tourists and people of the town, our history.

Toilets:

The town council were unable to budget for these being open for most of the year, due to the current economic situation. All options are still being examined. The Automatic Public Convenience is open at a charge and ongoing discussions with the

The new car park at the Glen (above the Fire Station) is nearing completion and parking will be available here for eight tour buses and cars.

Communication:

All town council minutes are now on the council website so the people of Kinsale can keep updated on council minutes.

Publicity:

The Kinsale Chamber of Tourism market Kinsale very well nationally and internationally. Special credit must go to Martin Shanahan and his wife Marie, and all the staff of Fishy Fishy and the local cast of the RTE Cork production team of "Martin's Mad about Fish". The students, who were conferred in a number of areas, including Childcare, Office Administration, Tourism, Drama, Media Production, Permaculture and Outdoor Educational Instructors, were joined by family, friends, Mayor of Kinsale, Mr. Tomás O'Brien and Senator Eoin Harris, at the inaugural event.

Addressing the large attendance at Wednesday's event, the current Director of the facility, Mr. Fergal McCarthy, paid tribute to Mr. John Thuillier and his wife, Margaret, for their foresight in establishing the facility in 1997. Describing the school as a unique institution, Mr. McCarthy also emphasised the two objectives of the Kinsale College: to educate its students to obtain viable sustainable employment and to create a platform to advance their studies.

Before asking Senator Eoin Harris to officiate at the ceremony, Mr. McCarthy said: "I am pleased to announce two additional courses for the coming year, including a culinary course and a horticultural course, which will be linked to the restaurants in Ireland's gourmet capital". Having arrived in Kinsale only a couple of hours previously, the Senator was taken directly to the local institute where he witnessed at first hand the extensive curriculum available to the student population.

Addressing a captivated audience, Senator Harris, who originally began his working career as a member of the staff of UCC, stressed the importance of the pursuit of lifelong education. The Cork-born Senator, who has also worked in both broadcasting and the print media, took the opportunity to reflect on the current economic crisis, said: "What is most needed now is courage and the tough times will pass." His words drew a loud applause from the assembled audience, and it continued for some time, as he presented each graduate with their individual scroll.

SANDYCOVE ISLAND CHALLENGE SWIM DONATES €1000 TO KINSALE LOST AT SEA MEMORIAL

On May 7th 2010, the organisers of 'The Edge Sports' Sandycove Island Challenge Swim (along with Cork Lions Club President Teresa Dineen with members and friends of Cork Lions club) presented a cheque for €1000 towards the funding of the Lost at Sea Memorial.

The Memorial is a place of Remembrance to all those who sailed from the Port of Kinsale down through the years, and who were unfortunate to have lost their lives at sea. Many people from Kinsale were members of the Merchant Navy, Naval Service, Fishing Community, and sailors who travelled all over the globe on the high seas. Some of these people never returned, having been lost at sea, and it is in their memory that the Memorial on the Pier Road has been erected.

Initially, on the suggestion of an old Kinsale seafarer, Gerald Gimblett, some fishermen erected an anchor & plaque at the Pier in the 1980s as a Memorial, but subsequent to the loss of a local fishing vessel, the Honeydew II in 2007, a committee was formed and the memorial expanded to what it is today, a model of a Kinsale Hooker fishing vessel, with a background of a sail.

Chairman of the Lost at Sea Memorial commented that "the next phase will see the re-erection of the original anchor, together with the placement of an electronic touch-screen display kiosk. Funding for this phase is well under way, and with the generous support of the Sandycove Island Challenge Swim, the Committee has reached half-way in their target of €7,000 to complete this phase. The electronic kiosk will give the public access to unlimited information such facts as names of seafarers lost at sea, the vessels they were on, where they were lost, and information on the Port, etc".

Ciaran O'Connor of Cork Masters Swimming Club said that "he was delighted to be in a position to support the work being done for the Lost at Sea Memorial Project and also wanted to recognise the contribution that Kinsale Harbour Master, Captain Phil Devitt, has made over the years to the safe running of the Sandycove Island Challenge swim".

"The Edge Sports" Sandycove Island Challenge swim was first held in 1994. Cork Masters Swimming Club and Cork Lions Club run the swim annually as a joint charity event. While it is promoted as a mass-participation and fun event, it does have a serious competitive element for those so inclined. The swim itself is approx 1,800m around Sandycove Island. Safety measures, including boat support, are implemented as per Swim Ireland recommendations.

At the cheque presentation, Paschal Horgan of Cork Lions Club commented that "the Cork Lions club are delighted to present this cheque toward the Lost at Sea Memorial in recognition of the help received from Kinsale Harbour Master, Phil Devitt, in ensuring the



event's safety to the participants in the Sandycove Island Challenge since its inception. I would also like to thank Cork Masters Swimming Club for their continued running of this prestigious event as well as the members of Cork Lions club, their families and friends for their help in ensuring this remains a well run and safe event for all involved and raises significant sums which are donated to very worthwhile causes." Market in Church Square car park just not working

KINSALE's Farmers' Market is suffering since it moved to Church Square car park and there was a strong call at the May meeting of the town council that it relocate to where it began in Short Quay as soon as the town phase of the main drainage scheme is completed.

The issue was raised by Cllr Alan Clayton who asked if the market, held every Tuesday, could go back to Short Quay when the street was resurfaced. Town engineer Mr. Rob Andrews replied that under the Kinsale Transportation Plan, it was not intended to do so.

Mayor Tomas O'Brien however said people he spoke to believed the market was "dying a death" in Church Square. "Whether it's the location, market trends or the recession or a combination of these I don't know but it's not working". Cllr Dermot Collins concurred saying he saw few people at the market when he called there on May 4th.

"People in the market told me it's off the beaten track and some of them said they couldn't make a living," said Cllr Noel Harrington. "The town centre would be more suitable".

Cllr Tony Cierans asked that council officials negotiate reinstatement at Short Quay because it was becoming an issue.

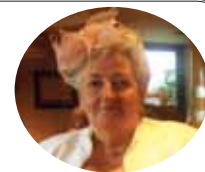

Conscientious Coffee

Last January, Clonakilty man Kieran White, managing director of The Island Beverage Company based in the Bypass Business Park Bandon, travelled to Ethiopia to witness the completion of an ambitious project to bring water to the village of Illili Darartu. The project was begun after Kieran and colleagues in the Irish coffee roasting company Java Republic visited the origin of the coffee beans they were sourcing and met the coffee farmers and their families. By visiting the farms, it created a direct link between the company and the farming communities, increasing understanding of the product and also becoming aware of the harsh realities of the industry.

As a result of their trip to Ethiopia in 2006, a huge fundraising effort was made on return to Ireland, managing to raise €132,000 to build a new school, a medical centre and water works project in the village. Speaking while finalising his travel arrangements, Kieran remarked "More and more people have become increasingly aware of the significance of buying coffee which has ethically sourced coffee beans. Java Republic is leading the way in Ireland in this regard and was recently voted 2nd most ethical coffee company in all of Europe. We're proud to say that Java Republic gives 11% of our net profits back to projects in the coffee growing communities like the water project we're going to see next week."
