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Dragons' Secret Den a winner for Kinsale

with positive and constructive ideas at the Kinsale Dragons' Secret Den competition where a prize of €1,000 was presented to Adrian Wistreich for www.custombreaks.ie, online an marketing strategy with packages that visitors to Kinsale can book on the web. 'Dragons' for the competition were holiday business entrepreneur Marcelle Spellar, businesswoman and philantropist, cofounder of Holiday-Rentals.com and Localgiving.com who featured on the TV series 'Secret Millionaire' and has an apartment in Kinsale; Bobby Kerr, founder of Insomnia coffee shops chain, one time night porter in Acton's Hotel and a judge on the TV series Dragons' Den; Eileen Moloney of venture consultancy CorkBic and Ivan McCutcheon, rural development manager with West Cork Development Partnership.

A welcome was extended by Mayor of Kinsale, Michael Frawley who thanked the organisers and sponsors.

Cllr Alan Clayton was master of ceremonies for the competition, the criteria for which was how to make Kinsale a better place in which to live and work, how to benefit the community and what can be done to make the projects happen. There were 18 entries and five finalists, each of whom gave a two minutes presentation and answered questions from the panel. Following a break for adjudication, there were two finalists who then gave a one minute address.

Winner Adrian Wistreich, who founded Kinsale Pottery and Arts Centre ten years ago, said he and computers/website expert Mick McElligott established the online travel agency Custom Breaks Ireland in 2009 because they saw the need for a sophisticated but easy to use web-based marketing tool which offered Kinsale's many fine tourism and activity providers the opportunity to upload their business and products on to the www.custombreaks.ie website and have a link with the existing www.kinsale.ie destination website to take instant real time bookings for accommodation, restaurants and attractions and generate more enquiries to a town where tourism is its lifeblood.

Already, 1,000 businesses were presented on the site and since launching it in October, over 200 businesses had registered directly but only five to date in Kinsale even though it presented 'a killer opportunity' for all 190 members of the Chamber of Tourism to have their profiles developed and do online marketing. A delighted Adrian said he would use the €1,000 prize money to upgrade software

and carry out further legwork to promote the new enterprise and Kinsale.

A very creditable runner up was Lucy Hyland, nutritional therapist, chef and owner of Food for Living, with 'Super Snacks' for kids in Kinsale. Comprised of natural seeds and dried fruit, samples were very much enjoyed by the 'dragons' while Lucy pointed out that in conjunction with a community and health progamme she devised involving the children at five schools in the locality, it was all about 'healthy kids and a healthy Kinsale'.



Alan Murray made the case for the Compass Programme in Kinsale under the Brothers of Charity, a community development initiative which aims to encourage full inclusion for people with intellectual disability. It operates in two ways, with volunteers to assist users of its day centre at Lower O'Connell Street and through work experience locally under the Fas EmployAbility services. The life-enriching community project broadens social integration, job opportunities, develops new friendships and generates civic pride in this European Year of the Volunteer.

Gerard O'Leary's novel idea was a song to promote the town called 'You'll always find plenty to do in Kinsale'. The Dunderrow man said music was a powerful marketing tool and he had written the words to do just that for Kinsale which had so much to offer, as shown in a powerpoint presentation compiled by his daughter Denise. Words, he added, could be adapted to promote businesses or products in Kinsale and he hoped to have the song recorded and performed by a singer or singers from the locality.

The project from Liz Creed of Transition Town Kinsale (TTK) was to further develop the '50 Mile Menu' which has proved so successful at the Gourmet Festival in recent years. One of a number of TTK food projects, the aim was to have as many eating places and shops as possible in Kinsale with menus and produce for sale sourced within 50 miles of the town as the crow flies (i.e. all of Co. Cork). This was good for achieving a sustainable local economy, Kinsale's good food reputation, eco-tourism and of course local farmers, producers, suppliers and consumers, said Liz who presented to the 'dragons' a copy of 'Kinsale Cooks' a fundraising book for Summercove NS featuring 50 mile meals. The winner, Adrian Wistreich, was announced by Marcelle Spellar who presented him with the cheque for €1,000. She stressed that everyone who participated was a winner. The former Murphy-Heineken executive spoke of her deep affinity for Kinsale and her sense of belonging in its friendly community. She advised all prospective entrepreneurs to get it right at the start when small, because, as happened to herself, that was the time one could afford to make mistakes.

Alan Clayton also congratulated all 18 entrepreneurs adding that they would benefit from business advice from Angel Investing. The other entries included a local currency, water taxis, a recycle and reuse shop, a cordless water bottle, a community texting service, daytime five-a-side football for job-seekers and a sports festival, all worthy of support.

He also thanked sponsors and supporters Kinsale Town Council, the Chamber of Tourism, Rebel Corporate Events (Ed O'Leary), Hal McElroy and staff of The Trident Hotel, The Blue Haven Hotel, Fairtrade Ireland (Peter Gaynor and Padraig Fitzgerald), Tierney's Friars' Lodge, Kinsale Lions Club, photographer Nelius Buckley and fellow organisers Maria O'Mahony, John McGrath and Jack Walsh. Winner of first prize in the raffle, a hamper of local food from Kinsale Green Growers represented by Aimi Pinder, was Liz Lynch.

On what was a good news night for Kinsale at the fully re-opened Trident Hotel, there were many positive vibes among the large audience.

Following on from this highly successful event some of the shortlisted projects are already underway, (5-a-side soccer for jobseekers, the 50 mile meal award, which is being actively supported by the Chamber of Tourism as part of expanding the Gourmet Festival), while the Dragons' Den facilitator, Alan Clayton, has met with some of the other project leaders in an attempt to get their proposals off the ground. Meanwhile it has been suggested that a 'Song for Kinsale' competition might be hosted during Kinsale Arts Week. The Dragons' Secret Den has been so well received that there is a possibility that it may become an annual event... get your thinking caps on now!

SOMBRE START TO NEW YEAR IN KINSALE

Staff and management of the Trident Hotel, Kinsale, were devastated on January 9th last when a hotel guest tragically died from suspected carbon monoxide poisoning in the hotel.

Miriam Reidy, from Limerick, was visiting Kinsale to celebrate her cousin's hen party but succumbed to the deadly gas which also rendered her sister Patricia unconscious. This was a devastating blow not only to the families and friends of Ms Reidy, but also to those in the Trident Hotel, which has an excellent reputation at home and abroad. The sense of shock and upset in Kinsale has been palpable in the days, weeks and months since the accident as people try to come to terms with it. The management of the Trident Hotel would like to thank the local community for their ongoing loyalty and their support for the owners, management and staff throughout this very difficult period.

We at the Kinsale & District Newsletter offer our deepest sympathy to the family of Ms Reidy as they face into the difficult days ahead Following on from the dreadful tragedy in the Trident Hotel, townspeople were further shocked on February 10th last when a fatal air crash occured at Cork Airport with a member of a much loved Kinsale family aboard. Mrs Heather Elliot, daughter of Roma and the late

Canon Oliver Peare, and sister of Nigel and David of the Quay Food Co., was one of six passengers who was rushed to Cork University Hospital as the Cork Major Emergency Plan was activated. Alas tragically the six remaining passengers, including the pilot and co-pilot, perished in the crash. Mrs Elliot underwent surgery and had treatment for fractures in CUH but has since returned to her home in Northern Ireland to recover from the traumatic ordeal.

The Peare and Elliot families would like to extend profound thanks to the emergency and medical personnel, whose actions clearly minimised the number of fatalities, airport staff, Canon Williams and all the community in Kinsale who supported and prayed for Heather and her family.

They ask that the families and friends of those who lost their lives continue to be remembered in your thoughts and prayers.

GO-AHEAD FOR TWO NEW MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS IN KINSALE TOWN

Planning permissions for two major developments in Kinsale concerning Acton's Hotel and Super Valu were granted under manager's orders circulated to members of the town council at their March meeting.

Full permission, subject to 40 conditions, was granted to Tolbaz Ltd, c/o John Crean, Cunnane Stratton Reynolds, planning consultants, Cork for the partial demolition of Acton's Hotel, Pier Road, and 14 Lower O'Connell Street, for its reconstruction as a boutique hotel and apartment development.

The new development will comprise a 15 bedroom hotel with leisure centre, lounge bar and meeting rooms plus 30 residential apartments in the original Acton's Hotel building, three detached houses, refurbishment of 14 and 15 Lower O'Connell Street, an additional 32 apartments and houses in two blocks separate to the hotel with one block in the area currently occupied by the leisure centre which is to be demolished. There will also be an underground car park with up to 157 spaces and a landscaped plaza.

Conditions include a full archaeological impact assessment and public access to the leisure facility. It's understood the distinctive slate frontage of the hotel will be retained. Jack Walsh is manager of the popular hotel established in 1946.

Permission was also granted, subject to 23 conditions, to I and G Stores Ltd, c/o Colman Cotter and Co, consulting engineers, Ballincollig, for construction of a two storey mixed use retail and community facilities development at the Glen and New Road with a gross floor area of 5,763 square metres.

The development, spearheaded by Super Valu, will include a licensed supermarket, a retail unit on the upper floor, a lower ground floor car park and storage area and upgrading of the existing surface car park. Conditions include €213,186 each in water and sewerage respect of development charges, a contribution of €29,363 towards amenity and environmental works and €199,639 toward and footpath repairs improvements; an information plague to highlight the former use of the site as a gas works and blacksmith's forge, the services of an archaeological monitor and a report to assess the stability of the rock face on the eastern boundary of the site to see if a retaining wall is required.

On a general point, it should be pointed out that while a local authority can grant planning permissions, it is open to people to appeal against these to An Bord Pleanala.

Kinsale Lions Club are organising their second annual cycle challenge. This year they have chosen a challenging coastal route for **April 16th 2011**



New bid for extension of Kinsale's town boundary

Area engineer Mr Brendan Fehily was commended by members of Kinsale Council at their monthly meeting for initiating a fresh bid for a town boundary extension. Stressing that it was 'just an idea', the recently appointed engineer said there was an obvious need to extend westwards in the town to cover many new housing developments. He acknowledged it would be difficult to expand eastwards since this would involve Cork County Council losing out on revenue from several rate-paying businesses in that area of the town. Mr Fehily, who circulated a map of the existing and proposed new boundary, said he would endeavour to bring the matter to county manager level. Cllr Dermot Collins said the issue was very dear to himself having raised it a number of times over the years. Unfortunately, Kinsale TC, hadn't got anywhere with it but he was glad that 'a new pair of eyes could see the logic of it'. Some housing estates, Mr Fehily noted, were half in the town and half in the county council area and added that a town boundary extension would enable Kinsale TC to embark on projects such as shoreline boardwalks.

Kinsale win All-Ireland B Vocational Schools Final

In a pulsating game in Mallow GAA complex on Sataurday March 26th Kinsale Community School won their first ever All-Ireland hurling title. Winning by the narrowest margins, Kinsale saw off the challenge of Nenagh Vocational School on a scoreline of 1-17 to 4-07.

On the path to the final, Kinsale came up against Nenagh and on that occasion Kinsale again beat the Tipperary school by only a single point so it was no surprise that this hard fought game would be a close fought encounter.

Kinsale's never say die attitude, along with their on-field discipline, ensured that they kept ahead for most of the game. Whilst it was a whole team effort on the part of Kinsale, strong performances from captain Colm Daly and midfielder Alan Gould helped the Kinsale side over the line. Indeed it was Gould's goal in the first half that would be the ultimate difference between the teams.

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DEFIBRILLATOR NOTES

HEART ATTACK

What is a heart attack? Coronary arteries supply the heart with blood carrying oxygen. A heart attack is caused by a blocked coronary artery, thus depriving part of the muscle of oxygen. Ireland has a high rate of death from coronary heart disease. 5000 die each year in Ireland this equates to 14 people per day of coronary artery disease.

Signs and symptoms of a heart attack:

Persistent central crushing chest pain that does not go away with rest. The pain may radiate to jaw or throat or left arm.

The person may describe feeling weak, nauseated, and dizzy and may sweat profusely. Action Ring 112/ 999 immediately

STROKE

What is stroke? Either a ruptured blood vessel or a blood clot within the brain causes a stroke. Signs and symptoms include:

(F) Facial weakness

Can the person smile or have the eyes or face drooped.

(A) Arm weakness

Can the patient raise both arms equally and hold for five seconds

(S) Speech problems

Can the patient speak clearly and understand what you say.

(T) Time to call 112/999

Call 999/112 if facial or arm weakness is identified or if there is a speech problem.

Ballinspittle are fortunate to have such a supported group of people, 44 members in total, who are up to date with the current research and practice within or defibrillator group. This is an excellent facility for the people of the parish. Should any individual experience or witness someone who has either collapsed, is experiencing chest pain or is experiencing some or all of the symptoms of stroke call 112/999 immediately. The ambulance control will immediately dispatch an ambulance to that person, but they will also contact us the local defibrillator group to attend to the patient until the ambulance arrives. We have the necessary skills to deal with the patient if he presents with stroke, heart attack or has collapsed.

EARLY REQUEST FOR FREE PARKING IN KINSALE FOR CHRISTMAS 2011

Free parking should be made available leading up to Christmas 2011 to help local business in the town, declared Cllr Tony Cierans at the January meeting of the town council.

Stating that he was contacted by several hard pressed traders who asked if free tickets could issue from pay parking machines next Yuletide, he added; 'We need to make a gesture of support because there is a feeling out there that the council doesn't really care'.

She pointed out that the cash starved local authority had already faced hard decisions ahead of its 2011 budget adding that it was revenue from pay parking that had prevented an increase in the rates at a time when local authorities were generating less income.

Denice On Her Way To Kenya

Fundraising has begun for Denice Cronin of Kinsale, Co. Cork, a second year psychology student in Trinity College Dublin. Denice has been working with an Irish NGO, Suas Educational Development (CHY: 14931)



and has been selected to represent them in one of their partner schools in Mumbassa in Kenya for a ten week volunteer placement this summer. Suas is a movement dedicated to supporting high quality education in targeted under-resourced communities. Suas works in partnership with local organisations and believes in addressing local problems with local solutions. This year Suas will support the education of over 14,000 children across Ireland, India and Kenya.

Denice currently works with students in inner-city Dublin, volunteering in a homework club assisting primary school children from a marginalised community with their homework in a supportive learning environment. She also volunteers in the Capuchin Day Centre for the homeless.

The summer volunteer placement will involve Denice working in Maweni Primary School in the Kongowea slum north of Mombasa town. She will be working as part of a team of teaching assistants aiding the teachers in creating a stimulating, fun and engaging learning environment for the children whilst helping deliver high quality education. A recent government target of universal primary education, despite the extremely limited resources, has led to a rapid increase in student teacher ratios, now at 100:1 in this school. Additionally, Denice will provide one-to-one support for some of the children and also be involved in organising and running a number of extra-curricular activities for the children through various sports, music, drama and art.

Suas receives funding support from Irish Aid which helps fund her place on the Volunteer Programme but Denice also has committed to raising €2,995, some of which goes to the school in which she will be working.

The programme affords me a unique opportunity to work in the developing world and to fulfill a long-held desire to understand the challenges, educational and otherwise, that exist there' says Denice, who is particularly interested in pursuing a career in Educational Psychology. 'This is something I have always wanted to do and I just can't wait for it all to begin'.

Denice began fundraising with an extremely successful coffee morning and jumble sale in Kinsale and is almost half way to raising her target amount. KINSALE BROWNIES HOST WORLD THINKING DAY CELEBRATIONS

On 15th February 2011 over 150 Ladybirds, Brownies, Guides, Rangers, Young Leaders and Leaders from Kinsale and Bandon celebrated World Thinking Day at St. Joseph's School, Kinsale.

World Thinking Day was born in 1926, the date February 22nd was selected because it is the mutual birthday of Robert Baden Powell, the founder of the Boy Scout movement and his wife Olave, who served as the World Chief Guide. This day each year gives Guides the opportunity to celebrate the fact that we are one in ten million members of the biggest global family and to think of those less fortunate.

World Thinking Day 2011 focuses on the theme Gender Equality and Empowerment for girls and young women as it is important to know what challenges girls and young women face today.

Permission for Lid1 store for Kinsale is weclomed by Kinsale TC

The granting of planning permission by An Bord Pleanala to Lidl for a discount store in Kinsale was welcomed by members of the town council at their January meeting.

The Charleville based supermarket chain, which has outlets in Bandon and Skibbereen and many other towns nationwide, was finally given the go ahead for the construction of a discount foodstore incorporating an off-licence with two entrances and 115 car park spaces at Trooper's Close, Barrack Hill, in December.

The board considered an appeal from Admiral's Walk Residents and RGDATA against the decision made by Kinsale TC last February to grant permission. It held that having regard to its location in reasonable proximity to the town centre and the zoning of the land for enterprise and employment, the development would not adversely affect the viability of the town centre, would be acceptable in terms of traffic safety and would not serious injure the amenities of the area or property in its vicinity.

The permission however, contains 14 conditions including traffic and safety measures, a mini roundabout, an archaeological appraisal of the site and an information plaque about the former infantry barracks.

BALLYMARTLE CLAIM FAMOUS VICTORY

Ballymartle Intermediate Hurlers wrote themselves into folklore in February with a one point victory over Dicksborough, Kilkenny, in the All-Ireland Final of the Intermediate Hurling Club Championship, played at GAA headquarters.

Deep into injury time and trailing by two points, the dream of All-Ireland glory seemed to be slipping away for the Riverstick men but up stepped Darren McCarthy and he smashed a 30m free to the roof of the Kilkenny team's net.

In what has been an exceptional season for the local club, the late Ballymartle winner had its legion of supporters looking on in disbelief and for many the magnitude of the club's achievement had still not sunk in, even when the fans had returned to the busy hamlet.

Before the team arrived to parade their newly acquired piece of silverware, the fans waited patiently in the cold February air digesting the day's events.

Local resident Eileen Cronin, who is the widow of the late Ballymartle stalwart Pa Joe Cronin, said: "It had been a nerve-racking experience listening to the game on the radio and the few candles I lit in the local church seemed to have done the trick." Before the team finally arrived under a Garda escort, former Ballymartle net-minder, John Webb described it as one of the proudest days of his life, a point also emphasised by former Ballymartle great and current minor selector John Butler.

Martin Fitzpatrick, who had been the talisman of much of the club's success in the late 80s and early 90s, said: "It is an historic and fantastic day for the local club." Arriving on the winner's podium, the victorious players received a tumultuous welcome from the large number of fans who had waited patiently for a glimpse of the returning heroes.

Club chairman, Joe Hallissey paid tribute to the supporters, who he described as the fifteenth man, he also thanked the selection committee, backroom team, team manager, Anthony McCarthy and coach, Eddie Murphy, as well as paying tribute to the late Mattie Murphy

Team manager, Anthony McCarthy, in return thanked the club chairman, Joe Hallissey and club PRO, Sharon Cronin for what he described as her exceptional organisational skills. He paid a special tribute to team coach, Eddie Murphy for instilling such self-belief in the team. The Tralee-based teacher, Mr Murphy, addressing the massed ranks of supporters said: "Beating a Kilkenny team in an All-Ireland Final was something to be treasured." PRO of the Munster Council and Carrigdhoun divisional treasurer, agreed wholeheartedly with the sentiments expressed by the Ballymartle Coach.

The loudest cheer of the evening was reserved for team captain, Patrick Dwyer, who raised the newly acquired trophy into the late night sky and thanked the team, management and supporters for working together as a single unit to achieve the club's success.

Turning over a new Leaf...

Tracy Keoghan opened her café, The Lemon Leaf, on October 20th 2010 at 70 Main Street. Her aim was to run a café serving well-priced good food made from local produce in a relaxing atmosphere. It is bright and comfortable with tables well spaced out and a calming muted colour scheme. The courtyard is a great outdoor seating space backed by rock face and old arched walls. The food is delicious and the staff are friendly and attentive.

As well as standard fare such as scones, soups and sandwiches, the menu is quite international serving American pancakes, feuille de brique, Croque Monsieur/Madame and spicy chicken bagels to name a few options. 'We pride ourselves on freshness and good produce', says Tracy 'and try make everything healthy, especially the kids menu which includes lasagne and fish cakes. There are no chips or deep fried food. We take orders for takeaway also and we try to accommodate peoples busy schedules as much as we can.'

Tracy's parents owned Creole's pub in Kinsale, so she grew up with a good knowledge of the service industry. She worked in the private yacht industry for twelve years as an interior manager and sailed all over the world. When she returned in 2004 she started work in interior design. Then, like many people in the recent financial climate she decided to change career paths.

The Lemon Leaf supports local producers; the ingredients they use include meat from Lordans in Ballinspittle, bread from Tom's Artisan Bakery in Kinsale, Durrus cheese, Clonakilty Black Pudding, free range eggs from Beechwood Farm near Kinsale and Katie's Bandon Chocolates including the very popular sticky hot chocolate. Though they make most of their own confectionary, they also serve delicious cupcakes made by Sweet Obsessions, who specialise in celebration and novelty cakes which can be ordered from the Lemon Leaf.

There is a little chalkboard above the coffee maching saying when the coffee being served was ground. It comes from Irish coffee roasters Ariosa, based in Ashbourne in Dublin, where it is freshly ground every week. They buy the coffee directly from the growers and pay them fairly. The Lemon Leaf is the only café in Cork serving Ariosa. The ground coffee is for sale in the Lemon Leaf shop as well as G's jams and other artisan products such, lemonades, juices, granola and the very popular Java Teas – a must-taste for tea lovers!

Of the décor which customers are constantly admiring Tracy says 'it's just a lick of paint'. To an interior designer it might be just that, but to the customer the effect is very welcoming. On her first day in the premises she sat down and sketched out the vision she already had in her head. The colour scheme is very much influenced by her affinity with the sea and time she spent in American homes.

Tracy opened The Lemon Leaf five weeks from the day she saw it. As a single mum of a one-year old with a lot of juggling to do, she hardly had enough time to catch her breath. 'It was tough starting off', she says 'and nerve racking in that economy. January and February were the months I was most nervous about but local businesses have been very supportive as have my friends and family.' Tracy has loads more ideas for her café and is looking forward to developing them – as soon as she has the time!

Adrian Wistreich is Kinsale's Top Dragon

In 2006, following a tourism business networking course, Adrian Wistreich, who runs Kinsale Pottery and Arts Centre, set up a tourism business co-operative called Calling, West Cork comprising about companies across the region which marketed themselves together. This folded in 2008 for lack of a commercial structure, and when Kinsale Chamber of Tourism met in 2009 to talk about ways in which Kinsale's tourism business could be developed, Adrian resurrected the idea as an online travel agency business called Custom Breaks Ireland.

With development funding from West Cork Development Partnership, www.custombreaks.ie has been built as a sophisticated web-based marketing tool which allows Irish tourism suppliers to generate enquiries and bookings individually, and aggregated into exciting local 'packages' of activities, accommodation, food, transportation etc.

At the Dragons' Secret Den, Custom Breaks Ireland won the competition with proposals to build a Kinsale travel itinerary menu within the custombreaks.ie website offering inbound tourists the chance to build their own itinerary for their stay in the town, and to book the elements in real-time. It will also allow Kinsale holiday packages to be marketed and sold online.

Businesses in Kinsale which offer tourism activities and services can already upload their business and product profiles to the custombreaks.ie website, and following the win, Custom Breaks Ireland aims to

develop a special software add-on for the site which will allow all suppliers to maintain allocations so that visitors to the site can not only search, browse and enquire about their specific requirements, but can also check availability and book immediately through the site.

Custom Breaks Ireland will help local businesses to upload information and train them in running their allocations. There will also be meetings in town to bring together various members of the Chamber of Tourism to form special packages for tourist visitors in 2011, which will feature on custombreaks.ie website. It will market these packages online and offline, and Kinsale Chamber Of Tourism will be able to build a gateway from the www.kinsale.ie website direct to the relevant section custombreaks.ie website, ensuring a seamless search and booking experience for the consumer interested in visiting Kinsale.

"Kinsale needs a significant uplift in tourism numbers, and this can be achieved economically in the current recession by strong online marketing, as other international media are outside the town's budget." The final programme for August is still in development, but will incorporate many locally organised projects and a series of County-wide events including:


- Three top quality craft exhibitions in prestigious venues including the Mill exhibition venue, Kinsale.



Policing Committee

KINSALE Town Council is seeking three nominees from the community and voluntary sector to sit on its soon-to-established Joint Policing Committee (JPC).

In response to repeated calls by Cllr Dermot Collins for the JPC to hold its first meeting, town clerk, Ms Michelle Kelleher, at the recent meeting of the council, said she had contacted Garda Superintendent Eddie MacEoin who was also anxious to see it up and running.

An ad was placed in the local press inviting representatives from the community and voluntary sector to put names forward. At the time of the March meeting there had been one

response. She was also writing to the three newly elected TDs for the area. It was hoped to hold the first meeting in April.

The town clerk added that the council would take the minutes of meetings the first year and the Gardai the second year. A chairperson and deputy chairperson would have to be elected.

On a proposal by Cllr Tomas O'Brien, seconded by Cllr Collins, it was agreed to hold a meeting of the JPC as soon as possible.

The JPC consists of all of the members of the town council, three Oireachtas representatives; three community/voluntary sector representatives, Gardaí and local authority officials.

Mr Brendan Fehily was recently appointed town engineer.



3D Kinsale

Renowned Tenor, Finbar Wright to perform in Kinsale

In what promises to be one choir of Palencia. of the musical highlights of the year, celebrated tenor Finbar Wright, has accepted an engagement perform with orchestra at Kinsale Parish Church on Sunday April 10th.

Entitled 'Songs of Hope and Inspiration' this concert has been organised by Kinsale Parish Finance Committee as a fundraiser toward the Parish renovation debt.

Dedicated to St John the Baptist, the present beautifully ornate parish church was completed in 1839 with assistance from the various religious communities in Kinsale in an early example of ecumenism. The church features a striking sculpture of Justin Reverend Foley McNamara by his friend John Hogan, one of Ireland's best known sculptors.

The church has been totally refurbished since 2004 at a cost of €1.8 million. Thanks to the generosity of the people of Kinsale this debt has been reduced over the years to €95,000. The end is in sight but the final funds are often the most difficult to gather.

Finbar Wright, tenor, songwriter and poet was born in Kinsale and grew up on the family farm in the nearby village of Ballinspittle. His musical education began at the age of 6 when he received instruction on the piano from the dedicated and well loved teacher Maura Hourihane who instilled in him a life long passion for music.

He studied for 2 years in Spain where he was captured by the beauty and colour of Spanish music and performed his first solo song with the University

In later years at his audition for the Cork School of Music, one of the oldest schools of music in the world, Dr Declan Townsend, then head of vocal studies, famously declared that Finbar had 'gold in his throat'. Finbar worked hard at proving him correct while studying singing there with Robert Beare and theory of music with renowned scholar George Dunne. He also studied piano with distinguished Spanish pianist Angel Climent who was to be his accompanist for many years.

On his path to becoming a professional singer, Finbar studied with renowned performers as Ernst Haefligger, Ileana Cotrubas, the beautiful accomplished Romanian soprano and finally with Ireland's legendary Veronica Dunne.

Having won all of the major singing awards at Feis Maitiu, Cork and at the Feis Cheoil Dublin Finhar represented Ireland at the BBC'S Cardiff Singer of the World competition. He began his solo career in 1990 with the release of his first bestselling album 'Because', produced by Phil Coulter.

Since then he has recorded seven solo albums, one of which 'Whatever you Believe', produced and conducted by Mike Bait, was a Christmas Number 1 in 1992 selling more than 100,000 copies in Ireland alone.

He has also recorded eight albums with the world famous

such Irish Tenors, who have enjoyed phenomenal success all around the world. Finbar has presented a successful television series, 'Music of the Night', with actress Angeline Ball on RTE. He has recorded numerous television specials including; 'Live from the Belfast Opera House' on UTV and in 2006 as part of the Irish Tenors he recorded a ten part series for RTE television which included among his guests composer Andrew Lloyd Weber.

> Finbar has performed at many historical world events including the proclaiming the gospel in chant at Pope John Paul II first papal mass at the Phoenix Park Dublin in 1979; the impressive state dinner given in honour of then US president Bill Clinton in 1995 at Dublin Castle and he performed live for 'Good Morning America' during its coverage of President Reagan's funeral on Capital Washington in 2004.

> He has appeared in concert with such musical legends as Montserrat Caballe, Dame Kiri Te Kanawa and rock and roll legend Jerry Lee Lewis.

> In the course of the evening Finbar will perform many old favourites, both classical and traditional, from his extensive repertoire. There will also be some instrumental pieces from his orchestra in what is bound to be a memorable evening of music.

CCTV CAMERAS NEEDED AT NEW BRIDGE

A call for closed circuit television cameras at Archdeacon Duggan Bridge was made by Cllr Tomas O'Brien and supported by fellow members of Kinsale Town Council at their March meeting.

The councillor said he was told there were several late night call-outs for the RNLI inshore lifeboat, the Coastguard service and also the Shannon based air-sea rescue helicopter following emergency calls concerning incidents on or in the vicinity of the bridge.

Some of these calls, he was told, resulted from observations by members of the

public at the bridge. Some mistakenly thought they saw people in difficulty.

He suggested the council write to Kinsale Gardai asking if it's possible to have CCTV cameras at the bridge which could be instantly monitored at the Garda station to ascertain if there was in fact an incident because it cost a fortune to call out emergency services.

Cllr Billy Lynch asked that the RNLI be added to the list of bodies on the call-out list for major emergencies in the town.

At the previous meeting, councillors debated a letter received from the doctors at the Medical Centre, in Kinsale which has two free designated parking spaces. The doctors looked for leniency

with regard to parking in the event of emergencies. Town clerk, Ms Michelle Kelleher told

members at the more recent meeting that she and the engineer would be meeting the doctors to discuss the parking issue. This was welcomed by Cllr Fred Treacy who said paying for parking wasn't an issue. The doctors needed extra space near the surgery in order to quickly respond to emergencies and to be able to bring heavy medical equipment into and out of the centre. He urged the council officials to do all they could to reach a satisfactory arrangement adding that anyone of them could need them at some stage.

The Kinsale Farmers Market

...is up and running again on Wednesday mornings at a new location next to the tourist office. A stall new to the market in the last few weeks is run by Joseph Desmond of Orchard Cottage Dairy, Ballinhassig. He sells soft goats cheese which he produces from his herd of purebred Anglo Nubian goats.



The goats cheese is available in jars with sunflower oil and either thyme and garlic or with sundried tomatoes, basil and garlic. The Desmonds grow all their own cereals for the goats and other animals' feed on their 120 acre organic farm. Their market stall also has other products from the family farm on offer such as jams, chutneys and free range eggs.

Joseph worked in sales up until a few years ago but was eager to get back into farming, especially when the family farm went into conversion to organic. He had a keen interest in goats and cheesemaking and attended several courses in Baltimore with Judy Wotton of Ardagh Castle Cheese. In the summer of 2008 he left his job and enrolled in the Organic College in Dromcollogher where he studied organic horticulture for a year. 'It was a great experience', he says 'and I met some amazing people through the course.'

In the summer of 2010 Joseph purchased a small herd of Anglo Nubian goats, 10 milking goats and 9 kids, from Chris and Phil Rhodes from Midleton who were cheese and goat masters. They showed him everything he needed to know about goat keeping and cheese. He began



making cheese in August 2010 which he now sells at several farmers markets including Mahon and Douglas with the help of his parents and brother Peter. He also supplies some restaurants. Over the next few years they hope to build up the herd to about 30 milking goats and start

producing a hard cheese and yogurt.

In Joseph's experience customers like to meet the people behind the products they purchase and find out about how and where they are made. He enjoys the farmers market as it gives him him a break from working with the goats all the time and a chance to chat to his customers.

DEVELOPMENT LEVIES IN KINSALE 'INSANE'!

'Bureacratic and insane regulations' was how Cllr Darren Cotter, at the February monthly meeting of Kinsale Town Council, described the existing high cost of development charges in the locality at a time when many businesses are struggling or closing.

In particular, he referred to a car parking levy of €67,588 in respect of planning permission for a proposed new ground floor extension and partially covering the dining area at the award winning Fishy Fishy Café, Crowley's Quay.

Acknowledging that it was the councillors themselves who adopted the Kinsale Development Plan containing such contributions, back in 2007, he pointed out that things were very different then and to continue with such high level development charges 'will cost us business big time'.

In support, ClIr Billy Lynch said the business concerned had previously paid around €60,000 for extra parking for the original building but was proposed by covering the outdoor area actually amounted to less seating for customers and the new parking levy cost more than the job itself.

Cllr Alan Clayton concurred, saying Fishy Fishy Café was a landmark

business in Kinsale and wondered if stage payments could be paid. Clir Cotter however, said the council would be 'shooting itself in the foot' if it didn't do something about reducing development contributions for parking and sanitary services in advance of the next town development plan.





Kinsale Success at BT Young Scientist Competition

Kinsale Community School continued its outstanding tradition of achievement by securing a number of prizes in the 2011 BT Young Scientist Competition. The school, which has produced two overall winners of the competition, secured one of the four main awards when a project on A Statistical Analysis of Public Attitudes to Cholesterol and its Control by First Year students Sophie Healy-Thow, Ciara Judge and Royanne McGregor (pictured below left) was declared runner up in the group category.

Another project, submitted by

Second Year students Ali Hill and Katie Wall (pictured below right) on A Statistical Analysis of the Meaning of the Recession to Early and Late Teens and their Parents was awarded first prize for a group in the Junior Social and Behaviour Sciences.

Caoimhe Hill and Faye Murphy, both Third Years, received both a special award in the BT Business of Science and Technology category and a Highly Commended prize for their project on *The Design and Evaluation of a Novel Heat Recovery Device to Improve Efficiency in Tumble Drying*

Applications. Another Highly Commended prize went to First Year Ciara Boyle for her project on A Statistical Study of Swimming Uptake in Relation to Location and Demographics.

This year nationally only one out of every three projects submitted make it to the finals, but two out of every three projects submitted by our school were judged deserving of a place at the finals.

The success of Kinsale students over the past number of years in the competition is unrivalled and is a source of pride for school principal Seán

O'Broin who stated, 'I am delighted at this year's achievements. All our students who entered the competition have done their school proud. The success of our students is a credit to the hard work of our students and teachers and is testament to the excellent relationship between staff and students and the wider community.' The school is also very appreciative of the relationship it has with Eli Lilly and its personnel, who at all times seek to assist the school in engendering a love of science among the students.





ONGOING EFFORTS TO RETURN KINSALE COURT TO KINSALE

Although plans drawn up by an architect to make the upstairs concert room of the Municipal Hall suitable to enable the return of sittings of the district court to the town were circulated at the January meeting of Kinsale Town Council, at a private meeting held immediately afterwards to discuss a report from the chief fire officer, it was indicated that many deficiencies require attention in order to bring the entire building up to standard for various uses.

Cllr Darren Cotter, at the January monthly meeting, circulated plans drawn up by architect Mr Richard Rainey, Granary Studios, The Glen, Kinsale, at the request and expense of local solicitor Diarmuid O'Shea, outlining steps which could be taken to make the upstairs room suitable for district court sittings.

Kinsale TC in its letter to the Courts Service on October 12th outlined improvements it could possibly undertake included a heating system, soundproof mats, and repainting of the upstairs room but also referred to the physical and financial constraints involved. New windows have since been installed.

Judge McNulty however, had also previously stressed the need for other facilities such as private consultation rooms and a judge's chamber and said he would very much like to see sittings return but went on to speak about the lack of dignity and privacy for everyone who had business in the court and subsequently put forward suggestions to remedy this.

Southern Regional Manager of the Courts Service, Mr Eamonn Kiely, in a letter to Kinsale TC, said the improvements outlined by Kinsale TC in October would not bring the venue up to the standard which citizens were entitled to expect in a court. To a query about capital expenditure on a property owned by a third party, the Courts Service, he said, would be prepared to pay rent for its use thereby giving a yield to Kinsale TC on a per sitting basis.

At previous meetings, councillors echoed the concerns expressed by local solicitors that relocating Kinsale Court to Bandon was a not only a loss of status for the harbour town but also resulted in significant loss of income in terms of lunches and business in general and seriously inconvenienced many local people, especially those with no transport for getting to Bandon. Alternative venues suggested included St Multose Hall, the Temperance Hall, the former Convent of Mercy Chapel and the Mill building at Church Square renovated by Cork County Council into an arts venue.

In a letter to The Law Society Gazette, in November, solicitor Mr Keenan Johnson wrote how 'people power' saved and enhanced the courthouse based on a phased programme of works under the auspices of a local community development company in his locality, Ballymote, Co Sligo. It also serves as a mediation centre.

In the meantime, Kinsale Court currently sits on the 1st and 3rd Thursday of each month at 10.30am in Bandon Courthouse.

Working today for a sustainable tomorrow

A shock to the system can kill or injure depending on the system's resilience. If your system is strong enough to withstand a shock it can bounce back and carry on as before. Transition Town Kinsale is about building community resilience in the face of future shocks. What kind of shocks are we actually talking about? Our global economy is dependent on the availability of cheap energy, and as oil prices begin to rise due to unrest in petroleum producing countries, the time has never been more ripe to prepare for an energy shock. When the price of oil goes up, so does everything else. Our food is heavily dependent on cheap oil. Farmers use it for their machinery; fertilisers and pesticides are derived from fossil fuels; transport brings a huge amount of our food to us from great distances across the world; cooking, freezing and other forms of processing depend on energy, and plastic wrapping which keeps food fresh is of course made from oil. Higher oil prices means higher food prices and if food can't reach our shops and tables then we must ask the question would we be able to feed ourselves? This was the topic of TTK's first event of the year:

CAN KINSALE FEED ITSELF?

About 50 people turned up for this stimulating open forum discussion on Wednesday 23rd February. The panel of experts each gave a short presentation on their views. First up was chairperson Dr. Colin Sage, Senior Lecturer in Geography at UCC. He said that these questions and discussion should be taking place in towns and villages up and down the country in the light of recent rise in both food and fuel prices. Food is such a central part of our lives that we need to question and explore where it comes from and consider producing as much local food as possible.

Next was **Michael Smith,** owner of Supervalu in Kinsale, who outlined how much Supervalu and its supplier company, Musgraves, sell local and Irish food. 75% of the food and 100% of the meat is sourced and produced in Ireland. Supervalu also sells many local products such as Stauntons meats, Glenilen dairy produce, Upton eggs, potatoes from Colm O'Regan and Just Food organic produce.



Colm O'Regan, a local organic farmer answered the question of the evening with a definite, 'Yes, of course it can, and very well.' He said that everything we need is in the area, but it has to be supported locally. This is really important right now when times are relatively good, so that they will still be there if/when times are tough.

Aimi Pinder co-runs Kinsale Green Growers, a vegetable bag scheme that currently has 30 members and has been running for just nine months. Aimi stressed the importance of local food to reduce consumers' food miles. She wants her enterprise to be both environmentally and financially sustainable. She explained the Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) model of food production as a group of people who come together and pay a farmer/grower up front and share in the costs and risks of

growing food. If the crop fails the grower doesn't bear the full financial brunt. This also helps build community spirit, an important part of resilience.

Philip Ward, teacher of Ecology and Plant Science at Kinsale College of Further Education mentioned the amount of land needed per person to grow enough food which is 0.5 hectares. Kinsale, he said, has 5,000 hectares and so you could feed 10,000 people here. However the way agriculture is structured by EU subsidies prevents the kind of system enabling Kinsale to feed itself as food from the far side of the globe is often cheaper than locally grown produce. He said that it is vitally important that we plan for this properly to ensure food security. He said that Kinasle could develop its own food brand like the West Cork Fuchsia brand and encouraged the establishment of food co-ops.

A Q&A session followed the tea break, and topics ranged from the benefits or otherwise of homogenised milk, growing apples and hydroponics (growing plants in water). The overall sense was that we *can* grow enough food locally to feed ourselves, but that we need to implement the structures sooner rather than later and to establish and support as many local food initiatives as we can. This would be a huge benefit to the local economy and would help increase local employment. It would also help us prepare for a future in which food security will become a key issue in a world where oil supplies are about to go into decline.

TREE PLANTING

TTK continues to implement a range of local food initiatives. By the time you read this 25 fruit and nut trees - 3 pear, 6 plum, 10 filbert hazel, 2 chestnut, 2 walnut and 2 cherry - will have been planted on Sunday 13th (last day of national tree week) in a **Community Orchard** at the site of the new Sports and Leisure Complex in conjunction with Saile Community Association.

EARTH HOUR

On Saturday March 26th Transition Town Kinsale launched 100 Chinese Lanterns from the Marina at the Dock to mark Earth Hour 2011. Drummers and fire jugglers joined in this spectacular event which was celebrated all across the globe. www.earthhour.org.

KINSALE GREEN GROWERS (KGG)

This local veg bag scheme is sowing the seeds for another season of the freshest veg around, with new memberships to feed even more people and their families in 2011. KGG is run by Aimi Pinder and Rebecca Stevenson who grow all the vegetables on 2.5 acres at Ringrone and supply members of the scheme with freshly harvested mixed vegetable bags from June to December. The scheme is based on the 'community supported agriculture' model whereby consumers pay a portion of their yearly veg cost up front in the spring, this money goes directly towards buying seeds and equipment and is aimed at creating sustainable livelihoods for local producers. What's more, this system of direct marketing means the members of the scheme receive their food at a very

reasonable and fair price! New memberships are still available and will be allocated on a first come first served basis. Go to www.kinsalegreengrowers.com for more info and to download a membership form.

KINSALE COMMUNITY SUPPORTED AGRICULTURE

After our first year, we have become the first CSA in Ireland to successfully grow and process our own porridge oats in conjunction with Derry Desmond at his farm in Ringrone. We also teamed up with Colm O'Regan who is supplying a monthly sack of potatoes, delivered locally. As the new season starts we are preparing for the next crop of oats and potatoes. We are also going to experiment with a crop of quinoa, a grain-like plant from South America which grows well in Irish climate. It has a high protein content, a good balance of essential amino acids, is gluten free and is a high source of dietary fibre. Sounds like a wonder food!

TRIBUTES AND BEST WISHES TO KINSALE TOWN MANAGER

Tributes and best wishes were extended by members at the February meeting to Ms Mary Ryan who was attending her last meeting as manager of Kinsale Town Council prior to taking up duty at Clonakilty TC. In her report, town clerk Ms Michelle Kelleher said the economic impact and media impact report of the Clipper Festival was launched in City Hall. It was estimated that around €5.6 million was spent during the festival. Cork and Kinsale reached a global audience of 114 million people with a PR value of \$26.5m.

The mayor along with Cllrs O'Brien, Treacy and others welcomed new town engineer Mr Brendan Fehily and complimented him on a very progressive first report to members.

Honduran visitors give Lenten focus

Pamoja Kwa Haki means 'Together for Rights' in Swahili, and is the term used by Trócaire to describe its human rights programme for secondary schools. In this spirit of togetherness and solidarity Kinsale Community School students listened to the stories of Juan and Rudy who travelled from Honduras to share with the students their struggle for justice.

Juan was kidnapped and tortured last January by the Honduran military because of his involvement in campaigning with landless peasant farmers who seek to have their land returned to them. Pamoja provides a model for teachers and students to promote human rights and development education within their school. The teachers and students taking part carry out awareness-raising activities based around Trócaire's Lenten theme which this year focuses on poverty and land in Honduras.

The Transition Year students who participated in this year's Pamoja campaign visited local primary schools in the Kinsale area raising awareness about poverty in Honduras. They also raised funds which were presented to Trócaire during the visit.

For the first time since the foundation of the state the Bandon and Kinsale electoral area does not have a representative in the Cork South West Constituency as a result of the February 25th elections.

With three candidates elected from the western end of the constituency, including Mr Jim Daly, Fine Gael, Clonakilty, Mr Micheal McCarthy, Labour, Dunmanway, and Mr Noel Harrington, Fine Gael, Castletownbere, fears are growing the eastern end of the constituency will suffer as a result.

Newly-elected Labour TD, Mr Micheal McCarthy, who just edged out Fianna Fail's Denis O'Donovan, in a nail biting finish, will certainly come under pressure to deliver for the area having received a ringing endorsement from the electorate in the area. However, the newly elected Labour Deputy has promised that he will indeed prove to be a good servant for the area. Defeated local Fine Gael candidate, Mr Kevin Murphy, expressed his disappointment at not securing the necessary vote to take a seat but thanked most sincerely all those who had voted for the long-serving County Councillor. The Dunderrow-based Councillor also said: "I am a little disappointed with our vote management strategy, which I felt could have been managed better. However, Mr Murphy, who received 6368 first preference votes, said: "I am delighted to be a part of the team that returned two candidates for Fine Gael in the constituency with a whopping 48.5% of all the ballots cast." For Fianna Fail proceedings at the Clonakilty Count Centre mirrored the national picture, with party frontrunner, Senator Denis O' Donovan, losing out by only 500 votes in the final shakedown and Labour's Micheal McCarthy benefiting from a large number of transfers from Independents, Sinn Fein and Fine

Having come fourth in the 2007 decider, the former Dail Deputy said: "It was always going to be a tough fight but I am delighted with the support I received not just from the electorate but also from the party faithful." O'Donovan's running mate, Deputy Christy O' Sullivan, was eliminated on the third count.

ENGINEER OVERSAW MANY POSITIVE DEVELOPMENTS IN KINSALE & DISTRICT

An official who worked quietly in the background but played a key role in many of the positive developments which have taken place in Kinsale and its hinterland over the past 25 years is Frank Morrison who recently retired as senior executive engineer with Cork County Council.

Frank Morrison's career began in the private sector during which he gained valuable experience. He joined Cork County Council in 1975, initially in the sanitary design section followed by water schemes in East Cork when based at Glashaboy and in May 1985 became area (from Roberts Cove to Kilbrittain and from Half Way and Innishannon to the Old Head) and town engineer for the Kinsale area replacing the long serving Pat Treacy. He also worked briefly in the Bandon area.

'It was the summer when the statue moved in Ballinspittle and one of my first duties was trying to make the area safe near it, where thousands of pilgrims were gathering. This was long before the days of stringent health and safety requirements but we quickly had to put in lighting, toilets and improve the roads.

Frank said he was privileged to be part of the rise to prominence of Kinsale from a town with a long running dereliction problem to becoming national Tidy Towns winner in 1986 and the presentation of the prize by the President of Ireland Patrick Hillery.

In what was a united community effort, the council staff and workers under the Social Employment Scheme were outstanding and ensured Kinsale's success. In achieving this, he recalled, the town and county councils succeeded in ridding the town's approach roads of numerous advertising signs and developing attractive green areas at Pewterhole Cross and World's End.

Another highlight, said Frank, was Kinsale winning the European Prize for Tourism and the Environment for which he, along with architect Billy Houlihan and councillor John Thuillier made submissions in 1989. Kinsale also won the All Ireland Best Kept Town Award and numerous Tidy Towns medals in the years that followed

From the 'nineties on, the local engineer oversaw the development by McInerney and other contractors of around 1,000 mainly social and affordable homes in the Ballinacubby, Cappagh and Commoge areas of

Kinsale along with an unofficial bypass which only very recently was taken in charge. In effect, said Frank, it was the 'new town of Kinsale' including the site for the community school, which did not in any impact on the old heritage town yet provided a new link to the Bandon Road.

Other projects he was involved in included the water scheme, the almost completed sewerage scheme with treatment plant, broadband and the new gas pipeline, which although causing unavoidable inconvenience, would prove very beneficial in the town's future development. There were also new car parks and some road and bridge improvements along the R600 road to Cork and the setting up



of the recycling centre next to the council offices which has proved very successful.

As a result of a trip to American twin port Newport, Rhode Island, USA, said Frank, the idea of the 1601 Mast commissioned by Kinsale TC when Dermot Collins was mayor, was born and over ten years later, it was proving to be a very popular photo landmark.

Frank said he regretted that an inner harbour boardwalk planned between the Trident Hotel to Archdeacon Duggan Bridge didn't become a reality during his tenure and also spoke of the need for Kinsale to have a proper bypass and further enhancement of its beautiful streets, including more pedestrianisation

Renowned as being straight talking and a doer, the engineer's views on many a contentious planning application were very respected and he enjoyed a very good working relationship with elected members at meetings of Kinsale TC and the county council's Bandon-Macroom Area Committee.

His office for the past quarter of a century was the magnificent looking former Workhouse dating back to 1841, where, said Frank, he was very fortunate to work with excellent colleagues. They included fellow engineers John Twomey, Sean Lynch and Rob Andrews: supervisors such as Dan Cummins and the late and much revered Tom Kelly and staff officers including Delores Galvin, Anna Burke and Enda O'Halloran; town foreman Charles Henderson; Des Wixted, Mary Rvan and other managers and town clerks; architect and new town manager Denis Deasy and many fine town and county council office and outdoor staffs.

'I've done my bit' said the 62 year old long serving council official who took the opportunity to thank all the people he worked and dealt with in Kinsale and district including restaurateur Jim Edwards where he dined nearly every day and wished his successor Brendan Fehilly all the best.

Tributes were paid to Frank when he attended his last meeting of Cork County Council's Bandon Macroom Area Committee in County Hall in December.

Cllr Kevin Murphy said he was very sorry to see him retiring because he was 'a top of the range engineer.' The town of Kinsale looked a lot better because of the quality of his work and that of his staff. He was also diligent and loyal having served as engineer in the council for the past 26 years.

'It's the end of an era', said Cllr Alan Coleman who spoke of the huge contribution he and former county architect Mr Billy Houlihan made to raising the international profile of Kinsale through various schemes. The senior executive engineer never sought publicity but had steadfast views and was a great man to get resources into an area and get work done.

At the December meeting of Kinsale TC, Cllr Dermot Collins said Frank always delivered, always returned phone calls and was most accommodating. He was an excellent public official who had Kinsale's best interest at heart and was totally dedicated to his work.

Cllr Tomas O'Brien recalled many a verbal tussle with Frank but there was never a grudge and Cllr Tony Cierans and Mayor Michael Frawley and other members and officials concurred.

Best wishes were also extended to engineer Rob Andrews, who has retired and following tributes, a vote of sympathy to the late Tom Kelly, district supervisor who was described as 'an absolute gentleman' whose passing was a huge loss.

QUEEN ELIZABETH TO VISIT KINSALE?

Queen Elizabeth II has been invited to Kinsale as part of her historic visit to Ireland this year.

Views were mixed but the decision to issue the invitation, was made on a proposal by Cllr Dermot Collins (Fine Gael), seconded by Cllr Tomas O'Brien (Labour) at the March meeting of the town council.

Cllr Collins, who also proposed that President Mary McAleese be invited to the town, said it would be most appropriate in light of the historical significance of the Battle of Kinsale in 1601 and the defeat of the gaelic chieftains by the English and the conflicts which carried on in the North until peace was achieved under the Good Friday Agreement. Now was the time for the monarch to see where it all started, he added.

Cllr O'Brien pointed out that Queen Elizabeth's son Prince Andrew made an historic visit to Charles Fort in 2001 along with President McAleese and dignatries from Spain to attend the 400th anniversary commemoration of the Battle of Kinsale.

'When Queen Victoria visited Killarney, it put that town on the European and gobal map and over 100 years later it's still reaping the benefit. A visit by Queen Elizabeth, I'm sure, would be a great boost for tourism in Kinsale', he added.

Cllr Noel Harrington (Sinn Fein) however said the invitation was 'a bit premature' and questioning the high cost of security, added: 'we never tried to conquer England but they conquered us for 800 years so I am against the visit'.

'The time has come to put history behind us and look forward', said Cllr Tony Cierans (Labour). 'We need to start opening up communications both ways so I totally support the visit to Ireland which can only further improve Anglo-Irish relations'.

Cllrs Fred Treacy (Fine Gael) and Alan Clayton (Green) concurred, the latter saying he couldn't see anything but good from such a visit.

Cllr Billy Lynch (Independent), however said he would not put his name to an invitation. Ireland lost its heritage after the Battle of Kinsale and the Flight of the Earls and while accepting there was a lot behind them, there was still the question of the Six Counties which were dear to him.

Deputy mayor presiding, Cllr Darren Cotter (Fianna Fail), said it would perhaps be positive to send an invitation and see what happened.

Last week, Buckingham Palace formally accepted the invitation for the visit to Ireland which will take place in May. The last time a British monarch visited Ireland was in 1911, Elizabeth's grandfather, King George V (he and his successors did visit Northern Ireland). Relations strained in the decades which followed but there were official visits to the UK by Presidents Mary Robinson and McAleese.

Kinsale has four royal charters which are on display in the local museum which is due to re-open to the public on April Ist. It's likely the invitation to the Queen and her husband, the Duke of Edinburgh to Kinsale will be made through the British Embassy in Dublin.

Cllr Harrington proposed the council hold a reception at the Trident Hotel for visitors to Kinsale from the O'Neill Society, Co Tyrone, who are being hosted by Kinsale History Society over the last weekend in May. Cllr Collins asked that the issue be discussed in committee. It's understood the council will hold and contribute towards the cost of a reception.

Strong ties have been forged between the O'Neill and O'Donnell Societies and the history society in recent years. The Municipal Hall, incidentally, is not currently available for council receptions.

Cllr Cotter said Mayor Michael Frawley was in New York on a private visit after which he representied Kinsale at the St Patrick's Day celebrations in the twin centre of Newport, Rhode Island.

Town clerk Ms Michelle Kelleher, said Mr Wolf Burg, president of Antibes Twinning Association, was in Kinsale the week previous and was eager to seeking ties between the two twin ports. A meeting of the Kinsale twinning committee to discuss this has been arranged.

DON'T SAY, TEXT IT!

While many people are struggling in the current economic environment, some individuals, including former electrician, Mr Richard Butler, are using the opportunity to turn their entrepreneurial ideas into successful business opportunities.

The Riverstick-native, who employed ten people at the height of the construction boom, realised that as the building industry began to decline in 2008 he needed to re-evaluate his career prospects and develop an idea that was sustainable.

A member of the local Ballymartle GAA Club, Richard had often reflected on the difficulties coaches, trainers and officials faced in trying to inform players of times of matches and training and he began to examine if a centralised texting system was the solution.

In essence, the texting service, unlike web-based systems, allows each code-holder in a club or organisation to send out a text message to the relevant individuals.

Pitching his sports text idea to the South Cork Enterprise Board, Mr Butler received a very positive response from the local body, suggesting he apply to the Genius Programme at the Rubicon building, based at the CIT.

Certainly the challenge of applying to the programme in 2009 for the former electrical contractor was indeed daunting. However, to his surprise, of the 82 applicants in that year, Mr Butler was one of only eighteen projects to be accepted to the year long initiative.

According to Mr Butler the programme proved to be hugely beneficial, providing a structured mentoring programme as well as gleaning knowledge from the other participants on the twelve month initiative.

Using 500 GAA Clubs throughout the country as part of his initial market research, it soon became apparent that the texting service was indeed very marketable.

Boasting a nationwide client base that includes community groups, schools, sporting organisations, pubs and restaurants and, more recently, the Cork GAA County Board signed up for the service, Mr Butler has had to rebrand the company as *Grapevine Communications*, reflecting the growing popularity of the service.

At \in 1.50 for fifty texts, Grapevine is certainly providing value for money, according to Mr Butler.

With the business now expanding nationwide, he is hoping to add a fulltime employee to the two part-time employees working with his wife, Teresa, in the business. Certainly for any individual who is seeking a way out of the current economic mire, Richard Butler at www.grapevinec.com is a beacon of hope.

MANY ROAD AND FOOTPATH WORKS PROPOSED FOR KINSALE THIS YEAR

Recommendations on the spending of €195,000 on the urban road and footpath block grant were contained in a map circulated by area engineer Mr Brendan Fehily at the March meeting of Kinsale Town Council.

He said there was also a block of money which could be spent for reinstatement from The Spaniard to Charles Fort, Summercove (1,750 metres) in the aftermath of and funded out of the Kinsale Main Drainage Scheme.

It was proposed under the urban block grant to resurface 70 metres of road and carry out work on a boundary wall at Barrack Street, replace 150 metres of footpath at Sleaveen Park, repair the footpath at World's End as far as the town boundary, pavement restoration westwards in Pearse Street from Londis to the corner and overlay a section of road at Compass Hill.

The engineer said there would also be some reinstatement work to be done following Bord Gais half and full road width works.

Cllr Fred Treacy welcomed the proposal to improve the footpath at World's End which he described as being in a disastrous condition.

In agreement, deputy mayor presiding CIIr Darren Cotter repeated the call for public lighting from World End to Archdeacon Duggan Bridge and CIIr Dermot Collins concurred. The engineer undertook to pursue this adding that a boardwalk would be a great idea, similar to that at the Marsh under an urban renewal scheme.

Cllrs Treacy and Tomas O'Brien recalled that $\le 80,000$ was allocated for a lighting scheme and Kinsale TC was prepared to fund the cost of three lights but there was controversy over the stone wall and the scheme never materialised.

Members generally approved the recommendations, which will be finalised at the next meeting and complimented Mr Fehily.

James O'Neill Memorial Building

'James O'Neill Memorial Building' is the official name of the restored former Mill at Church Square, members of Kinsale Town Council were informed at their March meeting.

It was confirmed in a letter from Mr Maurice Manning, senior executive officer with Cork County Council which restored and owns the building, stating that on the recommendation of its corporate policy group, the full council officially named it such at a meeting on October 11th.

James O'Neill, a leading businessman and major employer was the first chairman of Kinsale Urban District Council in 1899 and held the position until 1905.

Members of Kinsale TC were obviously unaware of this, since 'naming of mill' was an item on the agenda of their March meeting but Cllr Fred Treacy handed in the letter he received from local county councillor Kevin Murphy from Mr Manning and also stating that arrangements were being made to erect a suitable plaque there.

The former mill was used for the

first time in many years last summer for an international exhibition to coincide with the Kinsale leg of the Clipper Round the World Yacht Race and was officially re-opened by Lord David Puttnam at the start of Kinsale Arts Week. It has not been used since but there are hopes it could be used for district court sittings.

A strong case for naming the building after James O'Neill was made last year by former urban district councillor and harbour commissioner Mr Seumas O'Neill. His grandfather James O'Neill was responsible for the building of the grain mill opposite St Multose's Church which was sold to Henry Good in the late 1940s. The site also comprised the local electric works, stables and later garages for the O'Neill family business which also included hardware and a bakery. James was father of Eamon O'Neill who was elected to the Dail and served as Leas Ceann Comhairle and great grand father of Eamon O'Neill, harbour board member and auctioneer.

Cllr Treacy said he couldn't stress strongly enough the need to for court sittings to return to Kinsale having regard to the fact that many of its officers were in Bandon on court days. He urged the council to do all it could to get sittings back in Kinsale.

In reply to ClIr Dermot Collins, the deputy mayor said everyone who saw the Mill building thought it was ideal and reminded members it would only be required two days a month.

Municipal Hall

Meanwhile, Cllr Tony Cierans said the continued closure of the upstairs concert hall of the Muncipal Hall (former court venue) was 'a massive setback' to many local community groups and urged that everything be done to have it back in use as soon as possible.

The town clerk said she was liaising with the town architect, Mr Johh Ludlow and trying to progress it but reminded councillors that a fire officer's report limited use of the upper storey, which has only one exit, to a maximum of 40 people. It should however, be possible to repaint the concert hall. Furthermore, there was inadequate space downstairs for the town council office and need to include part of the council chamber.

The manager, Mr Denis Deasy, who is also county architect, said he would ask the town architect to do a

report outlining the options and costings for the council taking into account means of escape, implications for staff and other health and safety requirements highlighted by the fire officer etc.

The downstairs chamber now had a limit of 20 people and upstairs, with a limit of 40, had inadequate access with the entry/exit door at the side of a street and at the top of a staircase. He added that it was hoped to have the report in four to six weeks.

He assured Cllr Cierans that while there were difficulties to overcome, these were not insurmountable.

Museum

The town clerk reported that following interviews conducted by Cllr Collins and herself, there were six new volunteers for Kinsale Regional Museum which is due to re-open to the public on April 1st, the same day as Charles Fort and the International Museum of Wine in Desmond Castle.

'City and County Archivist, Mr Brian McGee inspected the museum recently. He will advise how to deal with the paper artefacts as well as give advice in relation to lighting, heating and storage', Ms Kelleher added.

TRIBUTES TO OUTDOOR STAFF AT KINSALE TOWN COUNCIL

There was high praise for the outdoor staff from Councillor Fred Treacy at the January meeting of Kinsale Town Council for the outstanding work carried out in very difficult conditions to keep streets and footpaths clear during the icy weather in December.

He also complimented town and county council workers who had to deal with a 'horrendous amount' of indiscriminate dumping on the streets of the town over the Christmas period, most notably at Short Quay.

Other members concurred and Cllr Noel Harrington highlighted the problem of bottles and cans littered along the scenic Low Road walk near Scilly as a result of mainly underage drinking by night. It was agreed to refer the matter to the

On a proposal by Cllr Darren Cotter, it was agreed to request the use of a camera available from the environmental section of Cork County Council for use in litter black spots in the town. Cllr Dermot Collins said detections could possibly be made using the existing close circuit security cameras already in place at various locations in conjunction with the Gardai.

Huge contribution to work of museum

Along with that of the late Michael Mulcahy, a name synonymous with Kinsale Regional Museum is Eugene Gillan, Cork Street, Kinsale, whose association with the building embraces

A native of County Sligo, Eugene's work as a lighthouse keeper took him all around the coast of Ireland and he first took up duty at the Old Head in 1950 with the late Frank Ryan.



Interestingly, an ancestor of Eugene was a lighthouse keeper there in the 1750s while his great great grand uncle, also called Eugene Gillan, was controller of the market which operated at Market Square where the museum

Eugene is married to Breda Walsh whose uncle Seamus Breathnach, along with Fr Patrick McSweeney, founded Kinsale Museum in the former Vocational School building that used to be located at Butcher's Row, in 1940. Four years later, the old courthouse and former market house, a cherished building in the heart of Kinsale which the local urban district council found difficult to maintain, was threatened with demolition. Eugene recalls that a very large crowd attended a public meeting, a voluntary committee was established and it was resolved to conserve it as a museum.

During what was a period of economic depression and mass emigration in a town rife with dereliction, the people of Kinsale and district displayed great civic pride and generosity by raising funds to preserve and conserve the building as a regional museum. Work was carried out by direct labour involving many volunteers and matching funding was eventually provided by Bord Failte Eireann.

The museum collection, said Eugene, was moved from the Vocational School in Bandon Road to present location in Market Square and there is a plaque depicting its official re-opening on April 9, 1959.

At the age of 60, Eugene Gillan took early retirement from Irish Lights and became a shipping cargo surveyor in Ireland and the UK. In whatever spare time he had, he, along with people such as the late Michael Mulcahy devoted countless hours collecting, sorting, restoring and cataloguing the rich array of artefacts admired by thousands of visitors over the years to this 'museum within a museum'.

Eugene said he was particularly proud of the section to the rear of the museum featuring the former trades of Kinsale. He thanked the many people who donated items for public display, including long time friends of the museum, Kinsale Sub Aqua Club who dived on several shipwrecks in and around the harbour,.

Maintaining with integrity, a listed building that dates back over four centuries is an ongoing struggle and there was further deterioration in the 1990s. Major structural repairs and refurbishment were carried out in 1999-2000 with financial assistance from the European Union under its Structural Fund, Failte Ireland, Cork County and Kinsale Urban District Councils.

In more recent times, Eugene said great work was done by curator up to October 2008, Michael O'Connell, well known also for his work in the museum at Clonakilty and Dr Paddy O'Callaghan who now lectures in law at Hamburg University. Always active, Eugene Gillan is also president of Kinsale and District Local History Society. He has over the years contributed articles to its annual journal and given numerous lectures, most recently during National Heritage Week. He is also a renowned sketch artist and painter and has illustrated many a fine local publication, all of it voluntary in the cause of preserving all that's best about Kinsale and Irish heritage.

PAY PARKING PROBLEM FOR DOCTORS IN KINSALE TOWN

KINSALE Council simply cannot afford to provide free parking places for doctors in the town, declared manager Ms Mary Ryan at a recent monthly meeting. She was responding to a letter from six doctors, five of them attached to the Medical Centre, expressing concern that local parking restrictions will impact on patient safety and even cost lives. It was pointed out that recently two doctors, who returned to Kinsale and had to park in the car park off Pier Road, having attended emergencies during the day, were issued with parking fines.

'Kinsale has no emergency ambulance, the nearest being at least 30 to 45 minutes away. Local doctors respond to all medical emergencies. We take this role very seriously and update our skills and emergency equipment regularly in line with best practice. Each emergency requires the attendance of at least one doctor and usually six bags of equipment (oxygen tank, emergency drugs, emergency resuscitation equipment, nebulizer, doctor's bag and defibrillator). As you can appreciate, timely attendance to our patients requires planning and systematic organisation,' wrote Drs. Margaret O'Regan, Helen Barry, Tony Foley, Pat Downey, Carmel Murphy and Claire McCarthy.

'It is imperative that we park in the vicinity of the surgery to reach patients as quickly as possible. We have four doctors on duty each day. We currently have two designated off-street car parking spaces and urgently need the co-operation of the town council to allow doctors to park legally, within close proximity of the Medical Centre, displaying 'Doctor on Call' signs. We need to do this without fear of being issued with further parking fines.

'We aspire to serve our patients with the highest standards of care. Our patients deserve to be attended to and managed promptly in the event of an emergency and we would appreciate your help in resolving this issue,' the letter to councillors, the town clerk and manager added.

Ms Ryan however said cash strapped Kinsale TC couldn't afford to make an exception by providing free parking for doctors adding that she had no sympathy for a sector which didn't reduce its fees. Stressing that Kinsale TC needed the money, the manager said the provision of additional designated parking spaces could possibly be made available if they were prepared to pay the current €1.20 per hour pay parking fee.

Cllr Dermot Collins however, said Kinsale had been trying for the past 15 years without success to get an ambulance, despite false promises by the Health Service Executive and he didn't believe the doctors, who effectively provided this service, were in any way abusing the parking situation. He favoured cars with 'doctor on call' displayed being allowed to park without penalty.

Mayor Michael Frawley said some doctors were fearful of this in case such display signs could result in their cars being broken into by persons trying to steal equipment or drugs but Cllr Collins asked how the traffic warden was expected to know if it was a doctor's car. Cllr Alan Clayton said he was sure no doctor was expecting to park all day for free and would pay if this was the case but in many instances they needed to park for a short time and be close to the centre in order to move heavy equipment.

The people of Belgooly are in shock following the death of Kenneth Murphy in a work related accident on March 16th last. Our deepest sympathy goes to the Murphy family and Kenneth's friends and colleagues on their tragic loss.



MRS AUDREY LAWSON-JOHNSON RIP

The death has occured in Northamptonshire of Mrs Audrey Lawson-Johnson, who was the last living survivor of the Lusitania, which was torpedoed by a German U-boat off the Old Head of Kinsale on May 7th 1915.

Mrs Lawson-Johnson was just three months old when tragedy struck with the loss of almost 1200 lives. Saved by her nanny, she along with her parents and brother survived but tragically her two older sisters perished.




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
