

#### €330M INVESTMENT BY ELI LILLY IN KINSALE TO CREATE 200 NEW JOBS

A very significant investment in job creation and the economy of Kinsale and Cork was how County Mayor Tim Lombard described the announcement at the Carlton Hotel, Kinsale, recently by Minister for Jobs, Enterprise and Innovation Richard Bruton TD that Eli Lilly and Co, a global leader in biopharmaceuticals, is to spend €330 million in a brand-new facility at its Dunderrow plant that will create 200 highly skilled new jobs plus 300 more in construction of an additional world-class commercialisation and manufacturing facility IDA Ireland worked closely with Lilly to attract the investment in a 240,000 square feet facility that will further enhance the US based company's ability to bring treatments for illnesses such as cancer and diabetes to patients worldwide.

Construction is due to start later this month and the new plant is due to begin manufacturing in 2016. It's the second large investment Lilly has made at its Kinsale site in recent years. In 2006, it announced a  $\in$ 300m investment in its first biopharmaceutical manufacturing and new-product commercialisation facility which came on-stream in 2010.

Minister Bruton said: 'The Action Plan for Jobs, which the Government published recently, outlined a range of measures which we will take in 2012 to target the high-end manufacturing and health/life sciences sectors for further growth and also to deepen and develop the impact of multinational companies in Ireland.'

Maria Crowe, President of Global Manufacturing Operations for Lilly, praised

the Government for its long-established pro-business environment and support of the pharmaceutical sector in Ireland through its science and technology policies. 'We in Lilly have seen this reflected in our deep and productive relationships with organisations such as the IDA and Irish academic institutions. The output from this commitment to education is also reflected in the excellent candidates who apply to join our company, many of whom have gone on to careers at Lilly operations across the globe'.

Ed Canary, General Manager of the Kinsale site, said: 'This investment is an endorsement of the Lilly Kinsale site's success in developing a biopharmaceutical business in recent years and demonstrates our ability to rise to that challenge. This is in no small part due to the site's excellent performance record, the talent of the workforce and the support from IDA Ireland. 'In the past five years, we have hired and trained some highly talented people and now have a technical talent base and capability in biopharmaceutical commercialisation and manufacturing that makes us a very attractive company for highly skilled people', he added. IDA Ireland CEO Barry O'Leary congratulated Lilly's Irish management and staff saying: ' It is a great success story for the Kinsale site and an excellent addition to the south west region. This investment demonstrates Lilly's enduring commitment to Ireland and further evidence that Ireland continues to position itself as a leading location of choice for the commercialisation and manufacturing of biopharmaceuticals'.

Eli Lilly, which first established in Ireland at Dunderrow in 1981, manufactures the active ingredients for a number of important medicines. To date, over  $\in 1$  billion has been invested at Dunderrow.

The announcement was welcomed by Mayor of Kinsale Fred Treacy (Fine Gael) and also by fellow town councillor Tomas O'Brien (Labour) who is an employee as well as local county councillor Kevin Murphy (FG) and Ciaran Lynch TD (Lab).

'This is incredibly encouraging news for the people of Kinsale and the wider region. It's a huge vote in confidence in the existing workforce and underlines the firm's intention to stay here in the long term,' said Cork South West Fine Gael TD Noel Harrington. He congratulated the IDA and Lilly adding that the company acknowledged the tremendous support of the local community in Dunderrow.

Labour TD for Cork South-West, Michael McCarthy, in warmly welcoming the announcement, said it would have a tangible, meaningful impact on the local economy in Kinsale, by boosting confidence in the local business environment and further putting the town on the map as an attractive hub for multi-national investment opportunities. He commended Lilly, the IDA and other agencies.

'The Eli Lilly announcement is a shot in the arm for West Cork and another vindication of the Government's approach to job creation,' said Fine Gael TD Jim Daly speaking from Brussels, where he was representing the Government at an EU inter-parliamentary meeting on growth and job creation. He also stated that the news would be a huge boost to local retailers and suppliers, and paid tribute to the IDA. Chief executive of the American Chamber of Commerce in Ireland, Joanna Richardson, congratulated Lilly saying it was one of 600 US companies playing a pivotal role in Ireland's economy, employing 100,000 people directly, 2,000 of whom were announced since the start of the year.

The former president who now heads up the Mary Robinson Foundation -Climate Justice - told of how she had witnessed the devastation caused by flooding in Pakistan and emphasised that climate change was a human rights issue.

Kinsale Transition Town (TTK) was urging people and businesses to "go beyond the hour" to take further action on climate change and Kinsale's children brought along pledges describing what they would do to save energy in the future.



#### It's official: computer geekdom is cool. Kinsale recently held the world's largest Coder Dojo with 120 members in attendance.

CoderDojo is a movement orientated around running free not-for-profit coding clubs for young people, where they learn how to code, develop websites, apps, programs, games and more. Dojos are set up, run by and taught by volunteers. They bring in guest speakers and organise events and tours of technology companies. In addition to learning to code, members meet like minded people, show off what they've been working on and so on. It makes development and learning to code a fun and sociable experience.

CoderDojo all started in early 2011 when, then leaving cert. student, James Whelton received publicity after hacking the iPod Nano. Some younger students expressed an interest in learning how to code, so he setup a computer club in his school, Presentation Brothers Cork, where he started teaching basic HTML and CSS. Later that year James met Bill Liao, an entrepreneur and philanthropist who was interested in growing the project into something bigger. In June 2011 the first CoderDojo was launched in the National Software Centre in Cork. It became so successful that young people frequently travelled from Dublin to attend sessions. Owing to this popularity a Dublin Dojo was soon launched in Google's Montevetro building. The increasing success lead to setting up more Coder Dojos around Ireland and subsequently around the world as far as San Francisco, Tokyo, St. Petersberg, to mention just a few locations. At the moment there are around 30 Coder Dojos and they are fast spreading around the globe under the sponsorship of SOS Ventures.

Alan Clayton and Mervyn Greene met James Whelton through SOS Ventures at the Going International Conference last October at Ballymaloe. They talked about the possibility of setting up a Coder Dojo in Kinsale as the Cork one which runs on Saturday afternoons was impractical for people travelling from Kinsale and they thought there would be enough people interested in attending for the town to have it's own sessions. They were right! Kinsale Coder Dojo runs on Friday evenings from 7pm until 9pm. The first one was held on 27th January in the Trident Hotel. It's open to young people between the ages of seven and eighteen. Every week there are about 70-75 regular member plus some new ones. There are an equal amount of boys and girls. CoderDojo has just one rule: "Above All: Be Cool", bullying, lying, wasting people's time and so on is uncool.

"One of the most interesting things about it," says Alan Clayton "is seeing children, who in school are told to sit down and be quiet, happily working away, helping and teaching each other. It's like learning a language and this is the best age for doing that. With so many jobs out there in technology and computers it makes sense for these kids to learn that language."

Each week the kids are given tasks to complete, such as making graphics move across a screen. They are pointed to helpful websites like W3schools.com and there are 6 -12 mentors there to give help when it's needed; these people are hugely talented local volunteers including Nick Grattan, ex director of Microsoft's Developer Network and Jim Blair, head of engineering at local software company Avego.

Coder Dojo has already begun producing it's own entrepreneurs. One of the guest speakers at Kinsale was one of these, Harry Moran from Cork, who at the age of 12 developed an app called PizzaBot as a Coder Dojo project. He put it on sale on the Mac App Store for 79 cents. On its launch weekend before Christmas it outsold Angry Birds and Call of Duty in the Apple store. James Whelton also spoke at the Kinsale Coder Dojo and Bill Liao has hosted a couple of sessions.

The whole operation is free: venues that have so far been donated are the Trident Hotel, Eli Lilly and Ballinacurra House; mentors donate their time; Elasnik gave them a server so they can set up their own wifi network where ever they have their sessions. Although everyone brings their own laptop Alan and Mervyn have have managed to get some reconditioned laptops for kids who don't have their own.

**MAMUKKO** is a contemporary, eco-friendly and affordable range of handmade bags and accessories, designed and produced by brothers Levente & Attila Magyar. These original and innovative creations are made of upcycled sailcloth, tarpaulin and marine fabrics. Each bag is individually handcrafted and finished in their Kinsale based workshop.

"The concept is to recycle, upcycle and reclaim as much as possible," says Levente. Apart from the zips everything is recycled. Even the templates are made out of cardboard advertisement posters salvaged from a local supermarket. Tom's Lorry Covers in Cork give them offcuts of tarpaulin that would otherwise be thrown away. The sails they use come from anyone who has unwanted sails to offload! They use everything, even the ropes, in their designs.

The brothers set up Mamukko last July, initially making a wide range of things that required industrial sewing such as boat covers as well as geo-domes, before narrowing it down to bags, which they discovered they were most passionate about making. Levente, who has a degree in fine art, already had some experience making shoulder bags out of supermarket bags-for-life.

From a family of craftspeople, this business was a natural choice for the brothers. Their father is a leather designer, with 50 years experience. Attila and Levente grew up around it as their father always had a workshop. Their parents were delighted to hear they decided to start this business.

Last summer, their father came over to Ireland from Hungary especially to give his sons a masterclass. They made 150 bags in six weeks and by Christmas took stalls at markets in Cork, Kinsale and Crosshaven. Attila and Levente are happy to be working together as brothers, sharing duties and each contributing their individual knowledge and skills. "Research and development happens every second day here,' says Attila. "At the moment we have about 35 designs in artisan sailing and fashion gear. Nothing is mass produced. Everything is unique and handmade by us, right here in the workshop."

Totally dedicated to their business, they invested all their money in Mamukko. When by December their own funds had run out they were very grateful to receive a South Cork Enterprise priming grant. "It will help us keep going with the business. It sometimes gets tough, but we love it, so we keep going. The motto 'passion and lifestyle', represents our business. We've had so much support from people in Kinsale," they say, "and we'd love to open a Mamukko shop in the next few years." Both brothers are also teachers, so they might even run courses in the future for those who are interested in the trade.

Mamukko is sponsoring day 3 of the KYC Spring Series and their products will be given as prizes. They have had a lot of support from Kinsale Yacht Club and many of the sails they use come from members. Their bags are of course not just for sailing; there is a great array of funky designs, including handbags, laptop bags and school bags with cleverly designed straps that allow them to be carried in three different ways. Because of the nature of the materials there is an emphasis on functionality, durability and comfort.

They take commissions for bespoke boat covers as well as industrial sewing & repairs, instrument covers, DJ equipment carriers & lot more. And they welcome used or unwanted sails anytime! You can find Mamukko bags in Granny's Bottom Drawer here in Kinsale, in Union Chandlery in Cork and online at www.mamukko.ie Their products will also be for sale in a pop-up shop in Dublin for fashion week.

Mayor Fred Treacy, Billy Browne from Oh Baby! magazine, Alison Canavan, Dr. Michael Hynes, public health nurses, and of course plenty of mums Clare has helped over the years were all there. The night was also a celebration to mark ten years of Clare teaching antenatal and breastfeeding preparation classes and providing breastfeeding support. And to celebrate there were drinks, DJ Mark Wilson, and plenty of prizes from Mothercare, Beautiful Bumps, Jellybean, Annette Walsh baby massage instructor and the Trident Hotel.

Karla Crowley, one of the mums Clare has helped over the years, gave an introduction. Clare talked about how important a mothers group is for support and how she remembers all the stories of the women she's worked with. She's delighted with the new website and hopes it will reach more women and make information on breastfeeding more accessible. The launch was sponsored by Sunsweet Prunes. Deirdre Manning assisted Clare with the website and organising the launch.

The launch of the website marks the beginning of a busy time for Clare. She has just been asked to

represent Ireland in in a global online conference on breastfeeding, Gold '12. She'll be talking at the Pregnancy and Baby Fair in April in Dublin and Cork. Alison Canavan, who attended Clare's breastfeeding classes and is passionate about things to do with mothering, is running a 0 to toddlers Parenting Roadshow in Limerick, Cork, Galway and Dublin in the autumn. In

order to get quality information out there she will have experts, including Clare, giving talks on different aspects of parenting. Clare is a Registered General Nurse, Midwife and International Board Certified Lactation Consultant with over twenty years

experience. She has worked in the UK, US and Ireland with 12 years experience working in hospital Labour & Delivery and postnatal care units.

Clare teaches a breastfeeding class in Dublin and Cork every month. A lot of women travel from Limerick for them so she hopes to start a class there soon. She also runs the only private breastfeeding clinic in Ireland which is on twice a week in Bishopstown. Women come from Waterford, Limerick and Kerry for this service. For local women she also makes house-calls in urgent cases.

"Things have changed a lot in the last years," says Clare. "People have become used to getting information from the internet, which on one hand is good as they are becoming aware of different ways of childcare. On the other hand, the sources of information on the net are often

unclear. The HSE and midwives do the best they can but they are so strapped that there is only so much they can do. Also, these 'Celtic Tiger women' as I call them, have travelled and are no longer limited to what their culture tells them so they can feel torn between what they've seen and read and what their mothers tell them. We have learned so

much in the last 20 years or so about babies and their cognisance and it's important to get that information out there."

Clare says of her breasfeeding class: "I don't sell them a fairy-tale. The first two weeks it will be difficult; they need to know that. I give them the foundation of knowledge, the facts of how breastfeeding works. This gives them confidence and empowers them. And they know where to go for help!" - Niamh Prior

# Green Fingers

There's nothing quite like home grown food and many people are getting back to nature by taking allotments or dedicating part of their gardens to growing vegetables. For those who can't grow all their own, getting seasonal veg bags from Kinsale Green Growers is the next best thing.

Kinsale Green Growers is a community supported agriculture (CSA) scheme, providing its members with weekly or fortnightly bags of mixed seasonal vegetables from June to December. Members support the farm by signing up annually for the full season and pay a percentage of the overall cost of their veg in the spring. This money is used directly to buy seeds and equipment for the season ahead and plays an invaluable role in supporting the small scale farmer, in this case Aimi Pinder. By cutting out the middle man, the farmer can get a fair return for their efforts and the community can purchase high quality, fresh food at a good price.

All the vegetables are produced by Aimi Pinder at Ringrone, with help from her best friend 'Rusty' the tractor. After working as a market gardener on an organic farm in the UK, Aimi came to Kinsale to study at the Further Education College and in 2010 completed the course in 'Practical Sustainability, Permaculture and Organics'. Aimi has been involved in Transition Town Kinsale (TTK) since she moved here, first co-running the town's community garden and then as an active member of TTK's food group which aims to promote local food and home growing as a major step towards environmental sustainability and blossoming local economies. In 2009 Aimi created Kinsale Green Growers. "My aim is to create local trade that puts the consideration of the environment and people's health before business.' says Aimi. "I'm happy to be able to make a living while doing something positive at the same time.'

Her vegetables are grown without the use of artificial fertilizers, pesticides, fungicides or herbicides. The furthest Aimi's crops travel is 5 miles from where they are grown and that's as far as she is willing to let them go. This means she can harvest as freshly as possible, often at 4am or 5am day it's collected. Prices aim to compete favorably with supermarket organic vegetables. Members find that the quality and freshness of Kinsale Green Growers vegetables



are superior to shop bought ones and that they keep for longer.

Many farmers choose which varieties of vegetables to grow based on what's high yielding, will travel well and look good on a supermarket shelf. Aimi chooses her varieties based on taste! And an advantage of the direct contact she has with the people who eat her produce is that they can give feedback and put in special requests; some of last years members have asked for more potatoes and a certain variety of squash this year.

The land is farmed in an environmentally sustainable way; of the two and a half acres, only one acre is used intensively for vegetables. Aimi rotates the crops and about a quarter of the land is resting or growing 'green manure'

such as clover, vetch and rye grass which replace nutrients in the soil. To make sure the whole garden is an eco-system, plenty of extra habitat is planted for biodiversity. In the summer, the garden is audibly buzzing with all sorts of bugs, bees and creepy crawlies. "There is no need for pesticides when there are predators to eat the pests!" says Aimi.

Aimi keeps members up to date with what's going on through newsletters and open days when they are encouraged to come and have a look around and see their veg growing. Unlike Ireland, the role of running the services in the US, including Police Dept, Fire Dept, Public Works Dept, School Dept, Libraries, Planning Boards, Appeals Boards, School Committees, Water and Sewer Dept is the responsibility of each

individual town or city, with a property tax providing the vast majority of the funding to provide services to the local community. Certainly Denis has his work cut out to take the seat as his opponent has already secured five consecutive three-year terms. However, buoyed-up by his recent success to the town's school committee and huge support he's receiving on the ground, Denis claims to be confident of success. For the former Kinsale resident, who arrived in the US in 1988, America has proved to be the land of opportunity. A chance meeting state-side with Tom Flatley, the real estate tycoon changed his life forever. Denis remarked: I asked him how I could be successful like you and he answered change your environment. "Hang with people that motivate you and want to see you get to the next level and you will see the difference immediately", remarked the Mayo-born millionaire. More recently, he's added three bars and restaurants to his portfolio in the Boston area. Married to his American wife Mary for the past 21 years, they have three teenage daughters, Emily 18, who attends Northeastern University in Boston, Julia 17 and Olivia 15, who both attend Milton High School.

# KINSALE IS AIMING TO BE NEXT IN THE QUEUE FOR AN OUTDOOR GYM – also known as a

tone zone – similar to that provided in Bandon, Ballincollig, Carrigaline, Passage West and other towns.

The call was made at the monthly meeting of the town council by Cllr Tomas O'Brien who said it was a fabulous facility. An ideal site which would promote healthy activity, he suggested, was the green area near Archdeacon Duggan Bridge which could be used by walkers coming from World's End and the town or from the many estates leading from Commoge and Compass Quay.

Town manager Ms Patricia Power agreed. Cork County Council, she explained, got only very little time in late 2011 in which to make an application and obtain funding for outdoor gyms in Bandon and other towns. She therefore recommended the case for Kinsale be made known, put in place and a site to be 'shovel ready' should further funding be allocated by the Government this year.

Compared to a playground which cost an average of  $\leq 100,000$ , an outdoor gym comprising six exercise items, at a total cost of around  $\leq 17,000$ , was amazing value and had proved very successful. Another possible location could be the Low Road walk at Scilly. It was unanimously agreed to explore the matter.

Cllr Noel Harrington called for attention to the children's playground in the Carmelite field. With regard to the proposed new playground on the Saile Sports and Leisure complex site, the manager informed Cllr Dermot Collins that she had made known the council's concern about the precise location to the Saile chairperson and was waiting for him to come back to her about this. ### Another All-Ireland Victory for Kinsale Community School!

The girls of Kinsale Community School equalled last year's achievement of the school's hurlers when they won a senior All-Ireland title by beating St Mary's of Midleton recently on a scoreline of 3-6 to 2-4.

Under the dedicated guidance of teachers Sinéad O'Donovan and Catriona Leahy the Kinsale girls got off to a flying start and were well on top of their opponents in the first half with goals coming from Niamh Sheehan and Linda Collins to leave the Kinsale side leading at half time on a scoreline of 2-3 to 0-0.

However, in what was definitely a game of two halves, the Midleton team started the second half at a blistering pace and quickly racked up two goals. Kinsale responded by bringing on Amy Harrington who scored Kinsale's third goal. The Midleton side increased their attack and racked up two goals in quick succession but a sterling performance from backs Aoife Keating, Ashling Moloney and Chloe O'Callaghan meant that the Kinsale side maintained their lead to win the school's first ever All- Ireland camogie title.

At a special school assembly Principal Seán O Broin welcomed the victorious team to the rapturous applause of the school community and paid tribute to their hard work and dedication. Team captain



Jacinta Crowley spoke to the spirit of camaraderie that exists in the team and of her pride in the team's achievements – being Munster and All-Ireland champions. Sinéad O'Donovan paid tribute to the work done in the local camogie clubs of Ballinhassig, Courcey Rovers and Sliabh Rua and made special mention of Joe McGrath who generously gave the team sliotars and a new hurley for each member of the panel. As Sinéad pointed out, it was a genuine team effort, both on and off the pitch, which contributed to the school's victory.

Prinicipal O'Broin also had good news to announce to the school with the confirmation that the Dept. of Education and Skills has recognised the need for an extension that will double the size of the school which will go ahead in the year 2014.

#### PUBLIC CAN HAVE SAY ON NEW MARKET QUAY PLAN

The views of the public are to be sought regarding a proposed new lay-out for Market (Short) Quay, Kinsale, plans for which were outlined in a powerpoint presentation by acting County Architect, Mr Sean McLoughlin, at a recent meeting of the town council.

It's hoped funding of  $\notin 100,000$  can be obtained from Failte Ireland to be matched by the town council from its 2012 urban road grant of  $\notin 195,000$  for a first phase.

A key objective for what was the inner core of Kinsale, said Mr McLoughlin, was to replace the clutter of mainly outdated bollards, seating, bins and lighting dotted all over the present area with a more spacious looking, restful and ordered plaza in granite slabs with contemporary furniture and trees plus more attractive lanes leading to and from it.

The architect recommended a uniform road width in coloured resin-topped tarmac with a central limestone channel and a granite pavement in a different colour at the same level to give continuous visual space. There would be a legible serviced area with a clear space for the farmer's market, private space for permanent units and an extension of burgage plots plus water and power points in the plaza. At present, he continued, there was a trafficpedestrian conflict resulting in an over engineered and bleak streetscape with a pavement that was too narrow. He envisaged Market Quay being pedestrianised after 11am each day. There was need overall, he added, to adopt a modern forward looking approach using high quality materials and furniture of its time.

Cllr Michael Frawley said he liked what he saw in attempting to marry contemporary with heritage, especially granite paving for the actual plaza and efforts to upgrade Hayden's and Began's Lanes and welcomed suggestions for up-lighting and brightening up the walls along these.

In reply to Cllr Tomas O'Brien, who commented on the poor appearance of the lanes, the architect said it was proposed to extend new paving along these into the square itself. To his and Cllr Billy Lynch's reservations about trees which could become overgrown and block light, he said these would be in planters and not get too large. Cllr Lynch said he very much favoured pedestrianisation and wondered if canopies could be considered instead of trees.

Cllr Dermot Collins however, felt it was too futuristic in what was a heritage town. To this, Mr McLoughlin said there was a problem of every town looking like the other. Anything sensible that could make the market work there was a good idea, said Cllr Alan Clayton.

The manager, Ms Patricia Power said she didn't want the matter to go on the back burner. There was an opportunity for the council to create in what had become a jaded area, a vibrant multi use urban space where locals as well as visitors could shop, eat, relax and enjoy public events and which would make Kinsale even more attractive. She also welcomed the fact the plan made the lanes less intimidating.

Mayor Fred Treacy said the plan was 'Interesting and exciting' .

Cllr Collins reminded members that there were also plans to upgrade the main thoroughfare, Pearse Street, which never materialised.

It was agreed on a proposal by Cllr O'Brien, seconded by Cllr Frawley, that the proposal would go into the public realm by way of a 'Part 8' planning application by Kinsale TC wherby the public would have eight weeks to see the plans and make observations ahead of a report by the manager taking all of these into account. A decision would then be taken by the council on the project.

As we go to print a notice has been posted announcing that plans are available for public inspection in the Town Hall from 9am to 4.30pm Monday to Friday (excluding Bank Holidays), until Tuesday May 15th 2012.

#### **Tributes to Kinsale Harbour Commissioners**

TRIBUTES have been paid to past and present members of Kinsale Harbour Board which was officially wound up and its duties taken over by Cork County Council at the start of the year.

Cllr Dermot Collins, speaking at the March monthly meeting of Kinsale Town Council, said it was a sad day to see the demise of a body established in 1870, which was older than the county council.

Many members, including Cllrs Billy Lynch, Michael Frawley and Tony Cierans, served on the harbour board, the last chairperson of which was Mr Tony Lane, and it was totally voluntary with no remuneration.

A special tribute was paid by Cllr Collins to Mr Frank Kiernan, whom he was told, was a harbour commissioner for over 40 years. It was a pity, he added, that the town council didn't get the opportunity to take over responsibility of what was a lucrative fishing, commercial and leisure port.

#### CAN PHOTOS OF DOG FOULING BE USED TO FINE OWNERS ASKS KINSALE COUNCILLOR

If a person uses a mobile phone to take photographs of dog fouling, could this in turn be used as evidence in a prosecution by a local authority?

This was the question from Cllr Tomas O'Brien at the monthly meeting of Kinsale Town Council when yet again the problem in the town was highlighted.

'It's an embarrassment at this stage and totally intolerable,' commented ClIr O'Brien who said people who witnessed it felt powerless and because the personnel from Cork County Council simply weren't there. He then posed the question.

Mayor Fred Treacy agreed and said the situation, which was disgusting, had got even worse. It was particularly unpleasant and messy when dog faeces got into the wheel of a wheelchair but it was also a danger to health. It was agreed to seek an answer to ClIr O'Brien's question from Cork County Council.

Cllr O'Brien called for a litter bin at the top of the steps near the Municipal Hall and at the top of the hill by the former convent.

Cllr Noel Harrington reported loose bricks in the pavement at Cork Street and dumping over a wall at the top of the Stoney Steps. Cllr Alan Clayton asked when the council would introduce parking charges in the Town Park when it is not occupied by the funfair. Cllr Treacy said this had been agreed at the 2011 Budget meeting.

The mayor said gullies had disintegrated near the wine museum at Cork Street and many shores in the town were clogged up with cigarette butts and other litter.



It can never be said that Community Spirit, which is the heart and soul of any town, is lacking in Kinsale. #### KINSALE PINK RIBBON WALK RAISES €100,000 FOR ACTION BREAST CANCER

Sunday 4th March was a very special day for Kinsale and the 750 people who participated in the first Kinsale Pink Ribbon Walk, their sponsors and supporters, the organising committee and 140 volunteers, as a staggering €100,000 was raised for Action Breast Cancer, a programme of the Irish Cancer Society.

"We are overwhelmed by this incredible amount raised by so many people, particularly in these very difficult times," said Jackie Dawson, Chairperson, Kinsale Pink Ribbon Walk Committee.

"Walkers and runners had been out training in January and February, to get fit for the 10km run/walk as well as actively fundraising online and on their sponsorship cards. On behalf of the Kinsale Pink Ribbon Walk Committee, all we can say is a huge 'Thank You' to everyone for their wonderful support and fantastic community spirit."

#### **ROSE TRAVELS FROM** WHITE HOUSE **ON MERCY MISSION**

Rose Frawley was among fifty volunteers who recently travelled to complete work on an orphanage at the Linkoni School for the Blind in Mombasa, Kenya.

The project, which was undertaken by the Clare-based Charity: Building of Hope Project, set itself an ambi-

tious target at the beginning of January to transform the existing facility into a building that was fit for purpose.

The first team of volunteers travelled to Mombasa on the 13th of January 2012 to lay blocks and build to roof level. The second team travelled on January 24th to roof the building and carry outside plumbing and electrical works. The third team arrived on site on February 4th with plumbers, carpenters and electricians completing the outstanding work. The final finishing group travelled out on the 15th of February to floor, landscape, paint and tile.

Certainly over the two months of project the transformation has been little short of miraculous with the former buildings which had three children sharing one bed being replaced with a 15,000 square foot building providing residential accommodation for 189 children, incorporating a special care unit for children with multiple disabilities such as autism or epilepsy. The units also consist of six and four bedded cubicles with 36 children in each unit. Each house has showers and toilet facilities. A special medical unit was incorporated into one of the houses. A fully fitted kitchen, dining and living area overlook the harbour. All the houses are fitted out with beds, lockers, tables, chairs, TV and computers. The main core of the four buildings incorporates a landscaped courtyard and play area.

For Rose, who has travelled with the Charity on previous projects, the experience was very rewarding, particularly being able to have a positive effect on so many children's lives.

Of course, she was grateful to the people of Kinsale for their support, with a Coffee Morning and concert at St Multose that featured the Morriston Orpheus Choir being well subscribed to.

### SHATTERING THE MYTH

Speaking at a recent presentation of the proceeds of a Coffee Morning held in the home of Anthony and Mags Cummins, Belgooly, to raise funds for the Irish Epilepsy Charity - Brainwave, Mags said: "It is important to highlight that Epilepsy is not a stigma but simply an illness like asthma or diabetes

With their son, Adam, aged 12, being diagnosed with the illness in 2003, the couple have had to make adjustments to their lifestyle but not any that have prevented the family from enjoying all the activities that other people participate in. A keen sports enthusiast, Adam plays football and hurling with his local GAA club, Sliabh Rua, and like other kids he enjoys the rough and tumble of everyday life, with swimming and cycling being high on his activity list.

Currently a sixth-class student at the local Belgooly NS, the Cummins family expressed their concerns that the recent reductions in the number of SNAs may see Adam without the necessary support when he enrolls in Kinsale Community School in September.

Of course the initial couple of years proved to be trying and difficult times, particularly as finding the correct medication combination to control the seizures proved to be problematic.

However, in June 2006 the family travelled to Great Ormond Street Hospital in the UK, were Adam was introduced to the Ketogenic Diet, under the guidance of Dr Helen Cross.

Certainly the regulated food intake of 1800 calories along with his medication has seen a significant reduction in the number of seizures from a high of 40 a day to 14 a month since 2006.

Both parents readily admit that administering the diet, which is high in fat and low in carbohydrates and proteins has its challenges, but it has not stopped them from travelling to Disney World or Spain.

Local representative of the Brainwave charity, Niamh Jones, who is based at the organisation's Cork office on Washington Street, said: " I am delighted to accept the significant donation of €2,200, which will be used to fund a family fun day for the Cork region."

Echoing many of the sentiments expressed by the Cummins family, Niamh said: "The recent European Epilepsy Week had a very important message "Shattering the Stigma of Epilepsy."

With 4620 individuals diagnosed with the illness in the West Cork region, Niamh remarked there is support available.

In addition to providing services to those affected by Epilepsy, Niamh and her colleague, Mary Lawlor, can also provide information as well as delivering lectures to schools and organisations to highlight the awareness of the condition.

# KINSALE ARTS WEEK NEEDS YOU!

DESPITE its amazing success, which included worldwide coverage last year on the Sky Arts TV channel, Kinsale Arts Week (KAW), which is due to take place from July 7th to 15th, is in crisis.

'Without your help, we cannot continue and this vital resource will be lost to the town,' said guest artistic director and spokesperson Gemma Tipton in a deputation from KAW to members Kinsale Town Council.

In a powerpoint presentation, she listed statistics highlighting the huge benefit to the town and region of KAW:

- 103 events, 43 of these free and 11,474 people visiting the exhibitions.
- 5,800 participating in the Street Day with free entertainment for all ages.
- 68% of audiences from Cork and county.
- 515 artists taking part in the 2011 festival of which 283 were local.

Ms Tipton said KAW had two full time staff and seven contract workers plus 70 volunteers who received training. Four volunteers had since secured full time employment following the 2011 festival. It also worked closely with local bodies such as Transition Town and drama groups.

KAW, she continued, not only benefited local people, it also boosted local employment and promoted Kinsale year round. Its Hospitality Partners Scheme worked with 31 local businesses and 40% of visitors came from outside Cork, KAW with the backdrop of town beautiful town and harbour had featured extensively in local, national and international media and also in the Sky Arts programme (screened by the deputation) which was still being shown. Furthermore, there were over 28,000 visitors to its website last year and it had 2,154 Facebook friends. KAW also printed and distributed 17,000 copies of its programme. 'People now come from all over the world and take stories of Kinsale back so we are putting Kinsale on the world map', she told councillors.

'But, the future of KAW is in crisis. We are operating on a deficit and we were forced to close our office for four months at the end of 2011,' said Ms Tipton. She herself had worked for free from August to December because she believed in KAW. Overall, it was operating on a shoestring and after eight years, it would be tragic if it didn't continue. 'We do it but it's your festival', said chairperson Mareta Doyle, who confirmed that the county's biggest festival was now in crisis.

The committee was very grateful to the Arts Council ( $\notin$ 32,000), Cork County Council ( $\notin$ 12,000), Kinsale TC and others for support but said the money didn't go far enough and said there was need for a year round office and staff to promote, organise and fund raise for KAW.

Noting that the town council had no money to offer this year, KAW was requesting it 1) facilitate the erection of a pop-up marquee in the car park next to the James O'Neill Memorial Building, Church Square, which could seat up to 300; 2) use of the museum over four days to screen two half hour documentary films about the Titanic, in this its centenary year, and Lusitania and 3) support its efforts through funding to further develop the James O'Neill building for artistic and other events, adding that an application had been lodged with West Cork Development Partnership.

Manager Cora Keating and board member Mrs Maureen Tierney were also on the deputation, the latter saying the marquee would be of huge benefit as a town centre venue and to ensure all events take place whatever the weather.

Mayor Fred Treacy, along with Cllrs Dermot Collins, Tony Cierans, Noel Harrington and Tomas O'Brien complimented the deputation on its excellent work and presentation and Cllr O'Brien advised the group make submissions for funding well in advance of Kinsale TC budget meetings. It was agreed to consider the requests made by the deputation.



#### Working today for a sustainable tomorrow

#### World Café

TTK like to explore news ways of doing things, so on 1st February we held an event called World Café, a process of facilitating groups of people to generate ideas or to answer key questions about the organisation. About 30 participants turned up at the Friary and sat around tables in groups of five, equipped with large flipchart sheets and markers for writing, doodling, drawing and scribbling. After a welcome and an introduction to the process, a key question was posed: 'How could TTK be better in 2012 and beyond?' A bell was rung to indicate the start and each group set about discussing possible answers to the question. After about 15 minutes, the bell was rung again and everyone, except an allocated 'table host', moved to another table and each table host explained to their new participants what discussion had taken place there. This created a lively and energetic atmosphere with the greatest possible generation and cross-pollination of ideas. After three more changes, each group was asked to choose the top three key ideas on their sheet of paper which were then fed back to the whole group, typed up and projected onto the wall screen.

The name 'World Café' comes from an idea that the best discussions at conferences take place during the coffee breaks. So it was decided instead to hold one big coffee break! It is an effective process for inclusive collaboration as everyone gets a chance to contribute and everyone feels empowered and a sense of belonging. This event was hugely enjoyable and successful, and a follow up session was held a few weeks later to work out how to realise some of the ideas generated. Watch this space for more details.

#### **Spring Fair**

This year's Spring Fair was held on St. Patrick's Day and a showcase of all of TTK's projects was on display in the Temperance Hall. Stalls included Allotments, Seed Swap, Cambium Edible Gardens, Kinsale Green Growers, Creating Good Compost, Local Exchange and Trading System (LETS), measuring your carbon footprint, local food, information on the anaerobic digester project, a massage therapist courtesy of the Health group, Ellen O'Shea, who had a wonderful array crafts made from recycled fabrics and a local food café. A treasure hunt took participants right across town in search of the Spirit of Kinsale and Caoimhe Hill and Faye Murphy's Young Scientist Project was on display which illustrated people's attitudes to current and proposed environmental taxes. Janice and Dave provided music throughout the day.

Upstairs, there were workshops on using recycled materials to make things, Recycled Art for St. Patrick's Day (Rosita Kingston) and 'Paddify your Bike' (Dearbhail Connon). Said bikes were then taken out to form TTK's section in the parade. We had bikes, scooters, go-carts and rollerblades, four colourful dancers representing the four elements, one Captain Windass on stilts and an electric car, courtesy of Bill Liao, all adding splendour, entertainment and low-carbon transport to the parade.

#### Anerobic Digester Update

A team meeting was held during March, to review a recent public consultation in Dunderrow. Although many concerns were raised about rats, smells and carnage on the road (all issues that can be addressed and alleviated through proper management and technological solutions), it is clear that people like the idea of a local anaerobic digester, a means of creating energy from organic waste. In the case of the one proposed for near Kinsale, food and farm waste will be 'digested' to produce a biogas that can be used to power vehicles. Following two studies showing that the project is feasible, a site is now being sought, in open consultation with members of the public. A trip is planned to visit an existing anaerobic digester in Co. Limerick in the near future and ultimately the project will turn a profit for investors, some of which can be put directly into the community. JOB SEEKERS' THANKS to a civic minded group which forms part of Kinsale Parish Assembly, there's some good news and hope for many of the 1,489

unemployed persons on the live register in the town and its catchment area with the opening recently in the Red Cross building at Church Lane of Kinsale Job Seekers Resource Centre where a welcome awaits not only for persons looking for a job but also prospective volunteers to help run it.

Darren Priest, who resides near Minane Bridge, is development officer at the centre which is overseen by the Kinsale Community Building and Support Group of the local Parish Assembly who identified the need and made it possible. It comprises chairperson Catherine Kelleher,

secretary Mary Roche, treasurer Richard Murphy, Tom Quigley, Roesia Lordan, John Roche, Mary McNamara, Patricia Palmer, Michelle Kiely, Mary O'Connor and Pat O'Brien.

Kinsale Job Seekers Resource Centre is a free drop-in service offering short to medium advice to assist those trying to find employment. Confidential support tailored to the needs of each individual is available and some of the issues the centre can help with are: Rights and entitlements, Career decision making and aptitude, Tools and resources development for job seeking such as CV and interview preparation, Options for training, sources of training, courses that are available and other support services, Identification of job seeking

techniques such as networking, publications and the internet, Development of a personal strategy for pro-active job seeking.

Printing and photo copying facilities are available at the centre which has its office on the ground floor and training room upstairs. There is free parking close by at Church Square.

In order for the centre to be a success however, volunteers with good communication skills happy to work on a one-to-one basic and also persons with internet skills are urgently needed for the new Kinsale centre. Volunteers can work for between four and 12 hours per week and training is available from West Cork

Development Partnership. Recruitment is currently taking place.

'This office wouldn't have opened had it not been for Catherine Kelleher and her group, parish priest Fr Robert Young and Kinsale Parish Assembly who were the first to recognise the need in Kinsale and set about doing something to help', said Darren who, along with Catherine also acknowledged the valuable support of Tony Lane at the Social Welfare Office, Market Lane, and Tom Reilly and James O'Mahony of Red Cross

An approach was made to West Cork Development Partnership (WCDP) and following contact with Fergal Conlon, Local Community Development Manager with WCDP based in Bantry, who gave great encouragement and support, a premises eventually became available for free, courtesy of Kinsale Red Cross who generously allowed the use of its



premises at Church Lane which is close to the town centre.

'Eli Lilly kindly donated computers and equipment and when we needed to borrow a computer screen, Ralf in Computer Services, Lower O'Connell Street, handed one over because of what we are trying to do in Kinsale,' said Darren who has 20 years of international experience in training and education and helping people achieve their full potential.

'Everyone has been hugely supportive not only in words but in deeds and we hope to have many workshops and question and answer sessions conducted by individuals willing to give their time and expertise'. Catherine Kelleher said it was also hoped to invite guest speakers offering practical advice to the centre.

The centre is open from 9.30am to 1pm and from 2 to 4.30pm every Tuesday and from 9.30am to 1pm on Wednesday and Fridays. The catchment area extends as far as Minane Bridge, Riverstick, Coolmain and Shippool near Innishannon. A warm welcome awaits and who knows, it could just be the job to get you back on track.

Connemara Ultramarathon (39 miles!) under his belt. They meet Tuesday evenings at 7pm outside Kinsale Community School. Bike spins are led by Andrew Lockington who has one marathon, one Gael Force and one Ironman under his belt. They depart from the Kinsale side of Duggan Bridge at 9am sharp on Sunday mornings. Helmets and appropriate biking gear is necessary for safety and warmth. Swim club details will be announced soon.

Anybody who wants to come along for a spin or a run to try it out will be covered by insurance as a guest for the first session and if they wish to continue they will need to be covered by insurance the following week through Triathlon Ireland ( $\bigcirc$  8).

The awarding of Gold Anchors is based on the combined results of three stages: assessment in which a comprehensive set of criteria that is checked and surveyed by an assessor; a visit from a mystery shopper; an anonymous online questionnaire completed by berth holders.


#### WORLD BOOK DAY

# Education for Sustainability at St. Joseph's N.S.

#### Inspiring Care for the Earth

In early March 2011 3rd and 4th class pupils at St Joseph's School began sowing seeds for the school's edible classroom. Throughout the rest of the school year the children worked in the garden and learnt about, biodiversity, composting, farming, food miles and seed saving with a strong focus on sustainability.



In the autumn we had a harvest feast to celebrate all the hard work that the girls put into the garden during the year. We dug up all the potatoes, carrots, onions, garlic, beetroot, parsnips, leafy greens and apples from the fruit trees planted on a previous year.

The children helped harvest, prepare and cook for the harvest feast. Together we prepared a delicious soup, and a colourful salad. The girls had great fun washing chopping and cooking the food and especially eating it!!

For our final sessions last year we put the school garden to sleep for the winter. This involved some maintenance of the raised beds. We then mulched with manure, seaweed and a leaf mulch/grass mix that we were delighted to find on the school grounds. Now the soil will be replenished with nutrients for us to begin the cycle again in the spring.

#### FIELD TRIP

In June 2011 we brought the kids to The Hollies Centre for Practical Sustainability near Enniskeane.

They learnt about natural building and got to participate in the making of a cob wall. This is a mixture of clay, sand and straw that is mixed and sculpted using the feet and hands. What a great excuse to get mucky and have fun!!



The children got to eat their lunch in a hand built cob round house which is used as a workshop space. They also enjoyed playing cooperative games which explored the senses and the natural elements. We then visited the Hollies productive market gardens, abundant with lots of varieties of tasty vegetables, herbs, flowers and teaming with biodiversity.

Last year was the 6th year that we have been at St Joseph's School. This programme takes time, effort and funding to stay running. In the past years we have received some funding from West Cork Leader, Leargas, and AIB Better Ireland Award. But recently funding has been harder to come by. We have also volunteered a lot of our time to make this project work. A big thank you to St Joseph's school who have assisted by contributing financially to this project in the last few years.

We welcome parents and teachers to join us in the garden to get your hands dirty, and share in the fun! With your involvement we can enjoy this programme for many years into the future.
