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With a documentary and coverage by Sky Arts HD channel, this summer's Kinsale Arts Week (July 9th to 17th) will have an audience of millions.

The programme for the 2011 festival, which has two primary themes 'The Horse and the Sea', was launched recently at a reception in luxurious Ballinacurra House, and attended by its many patrons, friends and supporters including a special guest, Bosco the horse.

Guest artistic director Gemma Tipton said the festival was taking place in 'the most beautiful place in Ireland' where she and her team had been very busy in recent months lifting the phone to phenomenal artists, all of whom said yes to performing in Kinsale.

Just some of the highlights contained in the excellent 46 page souvenir programme, she said, included headline concerts at Charles Fort with Nouvelle Vague, Waterloo and The Undertones, each with local support bands including West Cork Ukulele Orchestra.

'It has been amazing to see all the talent and ideas come together and I couldn't be happier with it. It's got drama, comedy, fabulous food, the sea, horses, great art, music, poetry, architecture, book launches, theatre, cinema, exhibitions, workshops, food markets, a wine club, family and free live music and street performers. Come and join us in July but book early', said Gemma who specially thanked The White Lady Hotel and other venue providers, the KAW board and Maureen Tierney and family who recently named their 'very promising' racehorse 'Kinsale Arts Week'. Chairperson of the 7th Kinsale Arts Week (KAW), Mareta Doyle said: 'We're absolutely thrilled. It's our biggest yet and we can't wait to share it with Kinsale, Ireland and the world'.

She thanked hosts Des and Lisa McGahan of Ballinacurra House, private estate for exclusive hire; funding bodies, The Arts Council, Failte Ireland (Hilary Creedon), Cork County Council (Mayor Kevin Murphy, Cllr Alan Coleman and Arts Officer Ian McDonagh), Poetry Ireland and Kinsale Town Council; the festival officers and board, Londis for the box office, all sponsors, patrons, friends, businesses, volunteers, artistes < and audiences as media well as partners, most notably Sky Arts HD TV channel who, she added, will be covering KAW for the first time and making а documentary' which can only be good for Kinsale and West Cork.'

from Main Street, Kinsale, who was honoured with a National Award to Volunteers in Irish Sport at a ceremony in Dublin on May 31st last. Catherine was among eleven dedicated volunteers who were presented with their awards by the Minister of State at the Department of Transport, Tourism

and Sport, Michael Ring TD, in the Aviva Stadium. Catherine was nominated by Kinsale Ladies GAA for her incredible dedication to the club. She was the founding secretary of Kinsale Ladies Football Club in 2001 and more recently has served as both Treasurer and Registrar. Catherine has been involved with the management of underage teams since the foundation of the club.

In 2008 her U14 team emerged as winners of the Kilamcud Crokes All Ireland Shield Competition. Catherine is also responsible for organising a mixed U14 football competition during Kinsale's Regatta Festival each August. The reality that Kinsale has become one of the biggest and most successful clubs in Cork in its short nine year history is testament to Catherine's diligence and commitment to the club.

Also amongst the award winners was Gerry Fleming, Head Coach of Neilstown Boxing Club who counts Olympic Silver Medalist Kenny Egan amongst the many boxers who have passed through his hands, while the youngest person to receive an award was 24-year old Doireann Ni Mhuiri from Cork, who has been involved in coaching at Blackrock Camogie Club since the tender age of 14. The award winners were selected by a committee chaired by Olympic Gold Medal Winner, Ronnie Delany, alongside representatives from the Federation of Irish Sports, Irish Sports Council, The Irish Times, RTÉ and the Department of Transport, Tourism & Sport. Catherine, a teacher at Belgooly N.S., is an inspirational role model for all those around her, not only does she look after her girl's team but she is also very involved in the running of a Peil Camp at Easter and Summer for boys and girls, and the VHI Cúl Camp. She has also undertaken considerable fundraising for the charity Haven in Haiti. The people of Kinsale are thrilled that the tremendous work of one of their own has been acknowledged in this way. Catherine is a very well-deserved recipient of this prestigious award, we are all very proud of her!

KINSALE AND DISTRICT DAY CARE CENTRE PREPARES FOR OPENING

The building phase of the Kinsale Day Care Centre was completed a number of months ago. It is now about to open and become operational. The purpose of the Centre, which is located on a beautiful site in the grounds of Kinsale Community Hospital, is to provide medical and social supports for the older person. Having availed of the services provided on a daily basis at the Centre, the individual patient will return to the familiarity of their own home environment each evening.

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Nothing has been spared in putting this superb facility in place. Great attention to detail and the use of top class materials and fittings are evident in all aspects of the design and construction. Medical research clearly demonstrates the value of Day Care

Centres. Studies show that individual well-being is enhanced by enabling people to remain at home as long as possible in dignity and

independence but having access to appropriate treatment when required and within a reasonable distance of home. A policy document, "The Years Ahead", produced in 1988, referring to Day Care Centres said that "they provide an important service in the continuum of care necessary for the elderly at home and support for carers".

In Kinsale it is envisaged that the purpose built Centre will cater for 20 people per day, Monday to Friday from 9.00am to 5.00pm. Apart from Kinsale town and surrounding area the catchment for the Centre extends from Roberts Cove to Innishannon and from Ballymartle to the Old Head of Kinsale. Facilities available include access to physiotherapy, a dedicated chiropody clinic, an occupational therapy resource centre and specially fitted relaxation room. The most modern toilet and shower facilities have been installed to cater for those with restricted mobility. A comfortable room, fitted with recreational and educational facilities leading outside to a patio and landscaped garden, is the focal point. This is adjacent to a dining area which is linked to a well-appointed kitchen. A fully equipped laundry will facilitate personal needs and a hairdressing salon is among the extensive facilities available.

Funding for the project which in total amounted to \in 1.4 million came from both voluntary and state resources. The voluntary committee who have driven the project wish to acknowledge the HSE which has supported the Centre from the start. While massive constraints exist at the moment the HSE has provided the site, medical and technical advice and assistance with



finance. The remainder of the finance and the management of the project has been undertaken by a voluntary group. The group was called together by the Hospital matron and members are drawn from various organisations in the community who have expressed an interest in establishing the Centre.

To bring the project to this stage the organising group has been fortunate in receiving generous support from a number of individuals and various groups in the community. Not alone has a substantial amount of finance been contributed but all the fund raising efforts have been characterised by a tremendous spirit of giving and community support. While the project has reached this successful stage it is appropriate to say that the Centre will continue to require finance to improve facilities, purchase transport, employ staff and develop the resource to its full potential and capacity. From the beginning the Project group and the HSE have been at one in recognising the vital connection that exists between the older person and the community. Respect for the elderly has been a traditional value in Irish society. Today this connection is expressed not just in terms of the financial support for the Day Care Centre but also recognising that by virtue of a lifetime of experience the older person has a range of skills, knowledge and wisdom which they are happy to share. The Centre will strive to provide opportunities for the users to continue to make a valuable contribution.

The Project group wishes to expand the services and facilities at the Centre. Having established the essential elements of the Day Care Centre the intention is to integrate with the local

primary care teams contributing a holistic response to lifelong health care. Of particular interest is the change occurring in the age profile of the population and the need to establish diagnostic programmes and initiate

responses to the phenomenon of living longer. The Project committee's new focus is now on the management, operation and development of the Centre in cooperation with the HSE. Recently the Project group has been fortunate in having Kathy Etty appointed as Nurse Director of the Centre.

Kinsale Day Care Centre is a pristine state of the art facility anticipating a busy and active involvement with older people in the Kinsale and surrounding area.

New Garrettstown waymarked trail will become huge amenity.

A family fun day held on Easter Monday, celebrated the official opening of what is set to become 'a huge amenity' not just for Courceys Country but for all of West Cork, the Ballinspittle-Garrettstown Woods Waymarked Trails. The opening was organised by Courceys Integrated Rural Development

Association who have developed the 1.5 and 5.2 kilometre circuit national trails in association with Coillte, both starting and finishing across the road from Kilmore estate near Ballinspittle village.

World coastal rowing champion John Keohane performed the official opening with entertainment from Comhaltas Ceoiltoiri Eireann, and a unique 'oar versus hurley' sporting challenge featuring teams led by John Keohane of Kilmacsimon Rowing Club and Suremen GAA Skills Challenge champion Vincent Hurley of Courcey Rovers. Following the official opening, there was an opportunity for children to walk the nature trail and adults to hear about its many interesting historical landmarks from Raymond White.

Committee member Mary McCarthy recalled how, arising out of a discussion at a parish forum organised by the rural development association, it became apparent that hundreds of acres of local woodland were not utilized nor were many people aware of its amenity value. A small committee was formed to establish waymarked routes which met with a very positive response from Mary O'Brien of Coillte who furnished the requirements and a costing of \in 5,000 after which she, along with the committee local historian Raymond White and walked the route to identify important historical points of interest such as a deer walls, spa wells and remains of a mansion house and rabbit warren.

'A fund raising walk held last June raised \in 4,700', said Mary who thanked everyone who supported the project to date and stressed that it was not only for the benefit of the people of Ballinspittle but for a huge area beyond to enjoy for free.

Ballinspittle, with three new retail outlets opened in the past 12 months, was thriving, she said and predicted that the woodland trial, less than an hour from the city, would become a huge amenity and tourism attraction. It could be also used for 5K runs, Hallowe'en and other fun and fund raising events, all of which would boost the local economy.

A fascinating brief history of the woodland was given by Raymond White. It once comprised 1,865 acres but only 15 of these were planted, mainly around the big house. No more trees were planted at Kilmore until 1750 when the Kearneys, who had earlier



displaced the Cores (many with the name Garrett), were owners. By 1844, shortly after the Franks became its last owners, there were 40 dwellings in the wood. After the estate was divided in the early 1950s, the Dept of Forestry planted 512 acres, mainly conifers covering a wide variety of flora and fauna. From elevated ground along the new Coillte national waymarked trails, there were excellent views of Garrettstown beach, the Old Head of Kinsale and much more.

Mayor of Cork County, Kevin Murphy, Kinsale said the new amenity was for everyone's enjoyment offering healthy exercise, was a most worthwhile project and springtime was the ideal time for its opening. Mayor of Bandon, Margaret Murphy-O'Mahony said she was felt honoured to be associated with 'a fantastic amenity' which was ideal at a time of great stress. It didn't happen by magic so great credit was due to the development committee 'God bless all who walk in it', she added. Bandon town councillor Gillian Coughlan was also in attendance.

Michael McCarthy TD, Dunmanway, said the project was a fine example of a local community putting a structure in place for

visitors and local alike and for developing the potential of West Cork's finest resource, tourism, which in turn would boost spending in the area.

Tony Lane, chairman of Kinsale Harbour Commissioners and a keen walker, expressed his delight and in also paying tribute to the committee, welcomed the fact that historical facts were recorded because this was important. It was fantastic in recessionary times and with so much negative talk to see local people getting together and doing something positive to develop such a marvellous amenity in a seaside resort with a

> fine tourism tradition and he also praised Coillte for its 100% support. Looking forward to 'walking the walk' he added: 'we have it all in West Cork, let's use it'.

Guests, who included Mary O'Brien of Coillte, Fr Tom Kelleher PP and Canon David Williams, Kinsale, were welcomed by development committee Gillan chairman Igan who acknowledged the great support of various groups in what was 'a fantastic community' and thanked hosts Jimmy and Mary McCarthy and staff of The Blue Horizon who provided refreshments,. Other officers of Rural Courceys Development Committee include JJ Hayes, vice chairman; Carthach McCarthy, secretary; Ray Martin, treasurer and Noreen Quinn, PRO.



VIEW OF THE FUTURE: WEST CORK IN 2030

A workshop on the future of West Cork took place on Thursday May 18th at the Trident Hotel Kinsale. Facilitated by world renowned community and economic development experts David Beurle and Juliet Fox, of Future IQ Partners, the workshops marked the beginning of an ambitious project designed to stimulate a region-wide discussion about the future of West Cork.

A broad spectrum of people including business owners, politicians and secondary school students took part. The attendees were split into groups for a future game. They were given a series of decisions to make and then shown the result each decision would have on West Cork for the long term future, based on drivers in the globe and in the region. They engaged in dialogue about what those possibilities are and how action and inaction might play out. People got an idea of what kind of choices they could make in the region in order to help it develop as economically, socially and environmentally sustainable, dynamic and prosperous region.

Future West Cork is a local intiative started by Ian Dempsey and Lisa Cashman of West Cork Development Partnership in Clonakilty. 'A lot of regions around the world are in an interesting transitonal point. There's a lot of change and flux happening and it's an ideal time for a regional community to pull together to shape the kind of future they want', said David Beurle. 'The initiative is about allowing the voices of the people of West Cork come together in a structured and intelligent dialogue about what sort of future people aspire to have for the region in 5, 10, 20 years, looking beyond the current crisis and saying "where do we want to end up"?'

One of the interesting things that came out of the meetings with stakeholders in different towns was that the people of West Cork strongly value their natural heritage and landscape and want that to be preserved and protected in the future.

The next phase of the project will entail more face-to-face conversations in a series of targeted workshops to make sure that each demographic gets to understand what it's about and has their say. These workshops will be run, not only by Juliet and David but also by community champions who are trained facilitors in how to talk about senario thinking and how to engage their own communities and organisations in thinking about the future in a different way and start taking action in a collaborative way toward a common vision. 'One of the things we've seen in our work around the world', said Juliet, 'is that the more people are on the same page heading towards a common vision, the more power they have in what that vision can become.'

Discussion will also move online to enable young people to engage in way that they are used to communicating. An important part of the initiative is getting young people to have their say. Developing a critical mass of popular consensus in West Cork is vital in terms of realising goals and in order for that to be achieved there must be real and significant engagement from the people of West Cork which has population of around 108,000.

"On a global and a timeline scale this is a rare opportunity', said David, 'and we applaud and congratulate the community of West Cork and the West Cork Development Partnership for having the foresight, the vision and the courage to start this kind of conversation. I think the citizenry should take every opportunity that this provides and step up and have their voice be part of it because everybody's voice counts.'

Aged 61 and previously mayor in 2006-07, Cllr Treacy is a member of Dunderrow Community Alert, Kinsale Lions Club, Kinsale Healthy Options Project, the Regatta Festival and St Multose's Church Choir. He played hockey for Ireland, Munster, Cork Church of Ireland and Bandon and is a correspondent for the sport. A retired insurance risk management surveyor, he and his wife Irene reside at Tisaxonbeg, Kinsale. They have a daughter Nicola and son Mark (married to Roisin) and grandson Darragh.

'There are a lot of challenges facing Kinsale such as housing, parking, general care of the environment and attracting new businesses and industries but if we show leadership and work together, we can bring the people with us', said the new mayor who also stated that he looked forward to the effective working of the new Joint Policing Committee and would press for the return of district court sittings to Kinsale, more support for the Tidy Towns committee and re-establishment of St Patrick's Day parade.

'As a council, I realise there is only so much we can do but with the support of the people we can achieve things. However, it is important that we listen to, consider and respect all views and get all sections of the community working together in a common focus and accepting that there are problems to be addressed,' Mayor Treacy added.

Cllr Lynch was unanimously elected deputy mayor on a proposal by Cllr O'Brien, seconded by Cllr Cotter.

Congratulations and best wishes were extended to the new mayor. Cllr Collins said Cllr Treacy was very capable and well liked while Cllr Lynch was honest, direct and open and very well known with deep roots in the town, so Kinsale TC had a good team at the helm. He and all other members supported the call for revival of the St Patrick's Day parade last held when he (Cllr Lynch) was mayor in 2003-04 especially now that the main drainage scheme was completed. Cllr Alan Clayton (Green) said it was important to have people of experience in office to learn from, adding that people didn't realise how difficult it was for councillors to get things changed.

Cllr Frawley thanked fellow members, officials and the Press for their support in his year as mayor during which he got married. He said it was a real eye-opener, very educational and great fun. Tributes were paid to the outgoing mayor for bringing energy to the office in his unique way. Cllr Noel Harrington (Sinn Fein) said he did 'a fantastic job'.

Cllr Lynch welcomed Cllr Cotter as fellow delegate to the Association of Municipal Authorities of Ireland (AMAI). He replaces Cllr Collins, a former president of

FATMAN TO IRONMAN David Fitzsimons

It would be easy to say that this journey started 14 months ago when I first hit the submit button on my on-line registration, one Saturday afternoon. I had already signed up for my first full Marathon (Sydney Sept 2010) and my first Half-Ironman (1.9k/90k/21.1k Shepparton Nov 2010). Could I complete the trifecta with my first Ironman in the same 12 month period? I did not know if I could complete any of them to be honest. The journey actually started a long time before. Not only have I lost over 40Kg, peaking at 20 stone (127kg) and a 42" waist, I was always the "fat kid", last picked on the football team, eating became a past time. I just never had the discipline.

One Sunday morning I remember sitting in my sun room and seeing one of my neighbours go jogging past This was part of his routine, an easy Sunday morning jog 4-5 miles. He asked me to join him one day; I laughed. But one day I just decided to go out for a run, no heart rate monitor, no skins, no fancy running shoes and certainly no GPS. I don't think I even made it a mile, but it was the first time I "went for a run" (now I would call it a jog). It took about 4 weeks but then I joined my neighbour and slowly we built up to a now infamous 6.2 miles (10km) don't ask me how long it took, those were the days I went back out in the car and measured the distance from the speedometer. Then there were a chain of events that happened in early 2006. We sold our house and the company I was working for was bought out and it looked inevitable that my role was duplicated in the new organisation so there it was no job (probably), no mortgage (definitely), but we did have an Australian visa.

I decided that I was not going to Australia overweight and not being able to enjoy the lifestyle it had to offer so I signed up a Personal Trainer, David Taafe, I paid up 10 weeks in advance. I thought this would be more motivating. He taught me why we were doing things e.g. the benefits, objectives etc. Then the results started to come, we originally said 1 stone (6.3kg) in 1 month, it was closer to 2 stone in the first month. I could not stop there, we went onto 3 stone in 2 months. It was time to start buying new clothes. I thought that was it. I was able to buy size large shirts and 36" trousers, this was great. It kept coming, when we finished our program I was now 14 stone (89kg). I also had to throw out all the clothes I had just bought, I was now wearing medium shirts and 34" trousers.

After we moved to Australia I found a job about 16km away from home and decided that I would ride my bike to work, circa 150km a week, this was keeping the weight off. I had started to train as an Australian Rules Kids coach (Auskick) and the mention of the Gatorade Triathlon series came up. This is an annual triathlon series in Melbourne, it's 5 sprint distance races and 1 Olympic distance race. I was only a little bit curious so decided to have a look online. My first Tri book was "Triathlons for Dummies" that seemed to fit the personality. OK I was in...which race should I pick there were 6 to choose from oh what the heck I signed up for all 6.

Before I knew it I was on the start line in St Kilda, I don't remember much except it was over in a flash, my result was 65th overall (1500) and 12th in my category (111). I was hooked - there was no bigger high. But I can categorically say there is one bunch of people that no athlete can be successful (in any form) without, and that is their family. This is where the sacrifices and patience truly happens. I struggled sometimes mentally to wake up at 5:00am I can only imagine what is was like for Jenny and how strange it was for the kids not to see Daddy every morning for breakfast. Without my wife or self named "Iron Widow", Jenny, I would never had made all those start lines. Some time later, as I finally left for my 1st Ironman, I gave Jenny a kiss goodbye and I knew that it was up to me know to do the rest, I owed it to Jenny and the kids to do my best, time for payback.

As I was ready relatively early, I was able to get to the front at the swim entry point. I found myself right on the front and middle of the swim start, I had never been here before. Then bang! Crap the gun, press the button on my Garmin and I am off, 3.8km bath with lots of people. I executed the coach's orders, swim hard for 30 strokes and then find your rhythm, the 30 strokes was easy, finding your rhythm amongst this craziness was tough. All I remember seeing on the clock was 1:12, boom right on time. I had given myself 1:17 but coach said I should be able to do a 1:11 to 1:15. Job done!

My mistress (aka my bike) was there ready and waiting for me, helmet on and off we went. Riding through town I forgot about the speed strips they have in Port Mac, the first one you forget about you make sure the second time or else you will be singing the high notes for the next 6 hours. Then there was a scream on my left. Jenny and the kids had found a spot and managed to see me. I managed to wave backwards from about 200m up the road. As I approached the finish I could feel my quads starting to cramp over them as I stood up, the sight rolling back into town was awesome. I had fallen off my bike in Shepparton but I managed to end up at 5:54 15 mins out from my goal of 5:45.

One last covering of sunscreen and I was off, I had run 3 hours + in training so I knew I had the distance in my legs but did I have it after 7hrs and 15 mins of swimming and cycling, there's only one way to find these things out really. My quads were burning and every step hurt on both legs. I kept saying to myself only "1 hour and I would be an Ironman", "30 mins I would be an Ironman" and so on. I thanked the volunteers and spectators on the last lap, I shouted out for my green armband thanked every other volunteer I met for the last 500 metres and then went for it. I was directed into the finishing chute, a 200m straight line, adorned by crowds on each side banging, clapping, shouting, and dancing. At the end of the chute you have the arch with a clock and all you can hear is the sound of Mike Reilly (the voice of Ironman) calling your name. Hell Yeah I was an Ironman!

I asked the question earlier on whether or not my goals were SMART when I sat and wrote them last year. My actual diary entries for the training year from May 1st 2010 to May 1st 2011 read as follows, remember these were also the first time I attempted any of those distances.

Goal 1: 3:30 Marathon

Achieved 3:10 Sydney, Sept 19th 2010

Goal 2: Half ironman under 5:30

Achieved 4:42 Shepparton, Nov 12th 2010

Goal 3: Half Ironman under 5:00 Achieved 4:44 Torquay Triman, April 3rd 2011

Goal 4: Ironman 11:00-12:00

Achieved 10:55 Port Macquarie, May 1st 2011

Of course the journey does not end, they say Triathlon is not a sport it's a lifestyle. Where will it end? I don't know, the carrot is always to try and qualify for a spot in Hawaii at the Ironman World Championship, I might have to wait until I am 70 years of age but where would we be without a dream!

Kinsale-Antibes School Exchange

Sixteen students from Kinsale Community School spent last week of May in Antibes, France, (Kinsale's twin town) as part of a school exchange which has been operating for a number of years. Next year already 29 students have enrolled to do the exchange. The students attended French classes in Lycee Audiberti in the morning and cultural visits were organised including a visit to the Picasso Museum in the afternoon. On their first morning in school they were treated to a typical French breakfast and later in the week to a picnic on the beach. A reception was held also in the lycee where M. Cepi from the Town Council presented the students with teeshirts as a souvenir of their visit.

Mr. Burg (president) and Mary and Noel Riordan from Antibes-Kinsale Twinning Association were also present. Students were interviewed by a reporter on their experience of their exchange and article will appear on next issue of Riviera Reporter which is an English language magazine for Riviera residents. The students were accompanied by teachers Anne-Marie Flavin and Tony Cierans from K.C.S.

The Antibes exchange students had already visited Kinsale early May where they also attended classes and enjoyed a very successful experience.

2 NEW PEDESTRIAN CROSSINGS FOR KINSALE

'They said it couldn't be done', remarked Cllr Michael Frawley at the monthly meeting of Kinsale Town Council when welcoming the news that pedestrian crossings will be put in place at two locations on the busy Pier Road.

Town engineer, Mr Brendan Fehily, reported that it was intended to paint crossings on the main road near the 1601 Mast and the Marina entrance, the latter of which would also benefit young people going to and from Kinsale Outdoor Education Centre. The crossings would not have flashing beacons but would be painted on the road surface, similar to that seen in many towns on the European mainland.

This was welcomed by Cllr Tomas O'Brien and by Cllr Frawley who recalled being told previously by another official that crossings couldn't be put in place on regional roads. Pier Road is along the R600.

Cllr Frawley also repeated the call for a crossing at Eastern Road near Featherbed Lane because there was a problem of speeding there and no protection for pedestrians going on to the main road. In support, Cllr O'Brien also suggested signs on the path leading from Scilly Dam warning pedestrians.

Cllr Tomas O'Brien welcomed the yellow box at Boland's Corner which overall he believed, worked well although Cllr Darren Cotter said it was difficult for vehicles coming from Long Quay to Pearse Street to avoid stopping in it due to the pedestrian crossing being so close to the junction. In reply to Cllr Frawley, the engineer said he was told it would be very expensive to provide a boardwalk at the World's End road similar to that done near Commoge Marsh. He was due to meet a representative of Failte Ireland which could possibly part fund such a project and would report back.

In reply to ClIr Dermot Collins, Mr Fehily said consideration was being given to putting in planters or bollards in order to prevent parked cars blocking the through traffic filter lane of the R600 from Long Quay into Emmet Place at Boland's Corner.

Cllrs Billy Lynch and Noel Harrington welcomed the report from the engineer stating that the issue regarding alleged interference with a right of way at Scilly was with the enforcement section in Cork County Council. The latter also complimented local residents who recently carried out a clean up of the area.

Cllr O'Brien said there was need to mark out an area to ensure exit and access to Calpe Cottage, Scilly, opposite the Man Friday restaurant. Cllr Harrington called for an extension of the double yellow lines in the vicinity of The Spaniard corner because drivers had difficulty getting through.

Bollards to protect the plaza in Short Quay needed to be moved up higher because they were constantly being knocked or bent by passing vehicles, said ClIr Fred Treacy while ClIr Frawley asked for the area, which is used for public events, to be cleaned up.

Cllr Treacy also called for marking out of the parking bays at the Super Valu car park. Town clerk Ms Michelle Kelleher replied that permission was required from the owner and would be sought. An extra 25 car park spaces could be created if drivers parked correctly.

Pot holes and subsidence of the road near Kinsale Equestrian Centre and at Compass Quay were reported by Cllr Treacy. He asked if additional road funding for Cork County Council could be directed to Kinsale and in support, Cllr Collins said significant development charges levied from Eli Lilly and others should be spent in the locality.

Cllr Harrington welcomed the repainting of historical signs in and around Kinsale and called for lining of the dangerous junction at Pewterhole Cross. In reply to Cllr Alan Clayton, the town clerk said people who had display boards on footpaths had been written to and asked to removed these because of the problems they posed for persons with disabilities. A display board for local advertising was in place near the tourist office which could be used instead of those on a footpath. If a business wished to put any item on a pavement, it would have to seek permission from the council and if approved, have insurance cover in the event of an accident.

Maybe Dr. Colin Sage is unaware that Kinsale is a seaside town with its own fishing fleet or maybe someone just forgot to ask for representation from a fisherman or fishery representative.

Kinsale is situated adjacent to the richest fishing grounds in Ireland, possibly up to 99% of all fish landed in Kinsale leaves on the back of a truck destined for Scotland, Italy, Spain and France, among others. A *VERY* high percentage of fish offered on plates here is imported from Asia, (prawns and panga) and Iceland/Faroes (Cod), which is treated with preservatives to increase its shelf life. Aimi Pinder's talk sounded very interesting and sounds just like a model run in Boston with fishermen. Yours sincerely

THE DAY THE EARTH MOVED IN KINSALE

Many of you are probably completely oblivious to the fact that Kinsale Community School is home to one of the very few seismometers in Ireland. A seismometer is the apparatus used to measure an earthquake's presence and magnitude. By this point you will be aware that there was recently a very large earthquake in Japan. But, did you know it was also recorded here in Kinsale? Right down to the very last aftershock.

With the news of the scale of devastation due to the Japanese earthquake and of potentially explosive nuclear-power plants, ten-metre high tsunami waves and tilting continents, it is difficult to process, and truly understand, the severity of this situation when you are so far removed from it, let alone the epic forces at work right beneath our feet. Even though we are 5,993 miles away and separated by two vast continents, the earthquake was very clearly detected here.

I've found that many people are familiar with the terms associated with earthquakes but without any real knowledge about what they mean. Take the Richter Scale for example. I'm sure that 99% of people have heard of it, yet few have any idea as to what it shows. It is a scale that measures the size of the earthquake, ranging from 1 to 12, with 1 being the smallest and 12 the largest. But, what you probably don't know is that with every level reached, the earthquake is ten times larger than the previous level. For example, say you encounter a Level 1 quake. If it reaches Level 2 then it is 10 times larger than Level 1, if it increases to Level 3 then it is 100 times larger than Level 1. Now try to imagine the intensity of the Level 9 quake that Japan suffered. Scary stuff!

But why did it happen? Firstly, you need to know that the Earth's crust is made up of a small number of giant pieces, called Tectonic Plates, that fit together like a giant jigsaw. They are all constantly either pushing against each other or pulling away from each other. The ingredients for an earthquake are simple: two opposing plates, like the Philippine Plate and the Pacific plate; immense amounts of pressure; and a whole lot of time. Get these and you're faced with one of the earth's most destructive and jaw-dropping natural disasters.

The series of events leading up to an earthquake are also basic physics. Heat causes solids to turn to liquids and liquids to start to move (think of a pan of butter that melts and then bubbles up). The Earth's Core is a very hot 3700 degrees Centigrade. The rock here has liquified and this is called the Mantle. The Mantle moves in an upward circular movement due to this heat. As it rises it cools a little and sinks back down to the centre again. The Earth's Crust lies on top of the Mantle (like an egg shell) and so, therefore, does the Tectonic Plates. And who lives on these plates? That would be us!

Tectonic Plates are always moving, and pushing against and around each other, but do bear in mind that 'moving', in Geological terms, is a very different concept. It can be likened to an elastic band being stretched and stretched until it cannot stretch any further. Now it's back to physics again. What happens when you let an elastic band go? It snaps. However, in Geological terms, the 'snap' is when the real drama starts!

The sudden release of energy, or the 'snap', is the earthquake. After the initial shaking the quake slowly loses energy, usually within a space of a few minutes and the seismometer records this data on a graph. It seems quite unbelievable that such a dangerous and fantastic force of nature can be simplified on a single piece of paper, but it really is that straight forward. The graph before shows the actual earthquake occurring and it doesn't take an expert to see that there were several minutes of unrest before the actual earthquake struck, along with its devastating wave of destruction.

We can see the pressure building, rising and rising until this vast amount of energy is suddenly released due to a slip between the two plates going past one another (usually one slips below the other). The same can be said for the last few minutes of the earthquake's incidence as the plates slowly and reluctantly move back into place.

The most significant, and fascinating, aspect of this event to me was the effects of the quake in terms of changes observed on a global level. It was so powerful, it delayed the sunrise in Kinsale and it moved the entire planet by 25cm, altering the Earth's axis as well. 25cm sounds like a miniscule amount when we think of it compared to the earth's area, but because the planet's mass has been redistributed, the speed of the Earth's rotation will be changed. Minute as these changes may seem, over centuries, these will affect the length of day and, possibly, alter the seasons as well. As well as this, the tremors have also sunk the coastal plain of Japan by up one metre, leaving certain parts of the Japan permanently underwater. This is why so many supposed "tsunami-proof" towns were destroyed. The 10-metre high sea walls surrounding these areas were insufficient to stop the 10-metre high Tsunami wave that hit as the walls were now only 9-metres high leaving space for the raging waters to move in and engulf everything they come across.

Earthquakes of this size, according to leading seismologists, occur only every 1000 years and it was the fifth most powerful that has occurred in the last century.

Unfortunately, the extent of the damage does not end there. Over 500 aftershocks ranging from magnitude 5 to 7 have occurred since the original quake and damaged already weakened buildings. As if this wasn't enough to worry about, the pressure that was between the two Tectonic plates, although temporarily released, is now rising elsewhere along join between the 2 Plates. The Earth is like weighing scales and constantly needs to be in balance: if tension is released in one area, it must be equalised elsewhere. Like a jigsaw puzzle, the pieces of the Earth have a finite space to move in and have to find a way to fit into place. When they don't it is fireworks! The question professional seismologists are desperate to crack is "When and where will the next big release be?". The answer is indefinite; it could be days, months, years, or decades. We have no accurate way of knowing and, so, where people in earthquake prone zones cannot predict the next 'Big One', they can only try to prepare as best they can.

This is the kind of work the top minds in the geological world are working towards, to reach that next level of understanding to better prepare the world. This kind of work I am interested in. I'm not saying I am going to be making headlines in the National Geological Survey anytime soon, but I am taking full advantage of what is available to me in Kinsale and I strongly urge people to do similarly.

My interest in Earth Science stems from the simple fact that the earth is shaped due to 4 very basic elements, earth, air, fire and water, and it is the mixture of these that causes some of the most spectacular landscapes and spectacles on Earth.

FEILE PEIL NA NÓG 2011

On the weekend of June 30th Kinsale GAA will host teams from Emyvale, Co. Monaghan, and Tinryland, Co. Carlow, for the national Feile competition.

Féile Peil na nÓg is a national festival of Gaelic football for boys and girls under 14 years of age. It was first held in Cavan in 1982, the brainchild of Fintan Tierney of Butlersbridge. Féile An Cabhán 1982 saw a total of 40 teams participate, 20 of whom were from other counties. It consisted of two boys divisions. Girls didn't participate until 1994.

Each year approximately 30,000 boys and girls from each of the 32 counties, and some teams from the UK, Europe and USA, participate in Féile. A preliminary competition is held in each county for the right to represent the county at the Féile finals. The winning club then travels to the host county, Corcaigh 2011, where they are hosted by one of the clubs in that county.

Féile Peil na nÓg places great emphasis and importance on proper participation, presentation, punctuality and sportsmanship. Féile involves the whole community, clubs, schools, social and cultural groups, families, civic and religious authorities. It is recognised by the GAA as a major festival of great importance for the promotion of football among the youth of our country. Féile Peil na nÓg helps to bond communities, forge friendships, provide educational opportunities and unearth new leaders.

Feile hasn't been held in Cork since 1986 so this is a very special time for the GAA in Kinsale. We welcome the 24 boys and girls from these clubs who will be staying with families locally and their supporters who are coming in their hundreds and staying locally too. Thanks to everyone who recently supported the coffee morning in aid of Feile where we raised over \notin 1400.

GAA in Kinsale can be traced back to the 1870s when there were 4 clubs based in and around the town. These clubs amalgamated in the 1890s soon after the official founding of the GAA. At underage level we haven't had massive success county wise in a number of years, but we have produced a few divisional wins at both hurling and football. Lots of work is being put in at underage level & the club has produced 3 Cork minor footballers, 1 Cork Minor hurler & a Cork U21 footballer in the last 4 years. The club now trains kids from the age of u-6 up in both hurling and football and in recent years has had big numbers at our Cul camp and now annual local schools blitz. With the construction of a hurling wall and the purchase of a new pitch nearby, the club has great ambitions and hopes for the future.

PRESTICIOUS AWARD FOR KINSALE BASED WRITER



Congratulations to Kinsale based writer Afric McGlinchy who has won the prestigious 2011 Hennessy Award for Emerging Poetry.

The Hennessy Literary Awards are open to writers who have had stories or poetry published in the New Irish Writing page of the Sunday Tribune. The page was founded by David Marcus in the Irish Press, and has been edited for the past two decades by Ciaran Carty. The page now has a new home in The Irish Independent. Afric won the award for two poems: 'Never lie to your lover' and 'Under the heart, a horseshoe shape'.

The Hennessy Literary Awards proved to be a launch-pad for writers such as Neil Jordan, Patrick McCabe, Ita Daly, Dermot Bolger, Marina Carr, Joseph O'Connor and Colum McCann. 'It was blooming exciting – and a bit of a shock - to even be shortlisted', said Afric, 'and then to win was just fantastic.'

Afric was presented with the award at a ceremony at the Royal Kilmainham Hospital on April 12th. Around a hundred people were

there to celebrate the 40th anniversary of the awards with a silver service dinner. She had her photo taken with the three judges: Ciaran Carty, Paul Durcan and Derek Johns; with Mary McAleese; and with the sponsor, Maurice Hennessy. The judges and author Sebastian Barry, who was inducted into the Hennessy Hall of Fame that night, all gave speeches. 'Thankfully the winners didn't have to speak as my nerves were shot after I heard my name called', said Afric. 'Paul Durcan read my winning poems really compellingly - that was an experience in itself!'

The award has opened up a lot of doors for Afric. Since winning she has already got a publisher for her poetry collection and received invitations to read her work in Ireland and the UK. Dermot Bolger introduced himself to her at the awards, said he had short-listed her poem and invited her to read at the Mindfield Festival in Dublin, which she has since done. She will be reading at Kinsale Arts Week and then in Coventry and at the Coffeehouse in London.

Afric was born in Galway and lived in Limerick until her family emigrated to Zimbabwe when she was 15. She moved to Kinsale in 1999. Although she's been writing since her teens, 'poetry had always been private thing', she said and she never thought of publishing it until her sister suggested it after reading one of her poems. It was only when she moved to Kinsale that she started sending work out. 'Being back in Ireland triggered a whole burst of creativity. I'm addicted now.'

Once her poetry book is published she has plenty more projects lined up, including getting back to a novel and some non-fiction. As for immediate plans, Afric aims to 'knuckle down now to do some serious editing.'

In the past, Afric was a guest reader at Ó Bhéal in Cork and at the White House in Limerick. Her poems have been published in a number of journals, including Acumen, Magma, Poetry Ireland Review, Wordlegs, Southword, Revival, Scottish Poetry Review, Crannóg and The SHOp. She was also a prizewinner, longlisted and shortlisted for several other competitions. She has written plays, lyrics, a novel and three works of non-fiction. Wild around Kinsale

The Irish Environmental Network defines biodiversity as 'the variety of all life forms on Earth, from the tiniest bugs living in the soil to the butterflies in your garden, the plants they feed from, and the biggest whales in the sea. Biodiversity includes the diversity of individuals within a species (genetic diversity), diversity of species within an ecosystem or habitat (species diversity) and the diversity of ecosystems or habitats (habitat diversity)'.

Biodiversity is the basis of human existence, our life support system. In order to conserve species it is necessary to assess the variety that already exists and scientists have identified 31,000 species so far in Ireland. The National Biodiversity Data Centre has estimated that there are 457 bird species, 563 marine fishes and 60 mammals in Ireland. These are just three of the categories which have been surveyed.

It is estimated that many species are under threat as a result of habitat loss and climate change. As individuals and communities we can contribute to halting biodiversity loss by learning to identify the diverse plants and animals within our own areas and by planting trees, flowers and shrubs which will attract pollinating insects. Kinsale, being situated in a tidal harbour where the Bandon River enters the sea, is an area which should exhibit considerable variety of species due to its diverse range of habitats. It would be interesting to find out how the environment of Kinsale rates within a national context.

Five possible sites are under investigation, and a survey of potential waste to be collected from farms and businesses has already started. An important landmark event is to be a presentation to any interested local investors and business owners, that will take place in the Blue Haven Hotel on Monday June 20th at 5.45pm.

The project is the first of its kind in Ireland, and designed to be owned and run locally, as a sustainable energy source for the community. Jobs will be created. Local water quality will improve. The outrageous cost of trucking waste to far away landfill will be saved. Shares in the venture will be available for as little as ξ 500, so we hope everyone will be able to come along on June 20th and find out more.

VANDALISM

to flower tubs and newly installed windows at the Municipal Hall was strongly condemned by members of Kinsale Town Council at their June meeting.

In the early hours of May 30th, 16 panes of glass in three large heritage style windows were smashed and one of the bricks was thrown with such ferocity that it struck the inside wall of the council chamber, reported town clerk Ms Michelle Kelleher who added that three heavy flower tubs directly in front of the buildina overturned. were Damage amounted to approximately €3,000.

She paid tribute to contractor OK Woodcraft Designs, Doneraile, for immediately installing the old windows on a temporary basis and having the repairs carried out in just three days.

In reply to Cllr Dermot Collins, the town clerk said Gardai took fingerprints at the scene and there was insurance cover.

Cllr Darren Cotter suggested a closed circuit television (CCTV) camera be installed at the Bowling Green overlooked by the Municipal Hall. Ms Kelleher said the council was currently seeking a costing which she added, would be higher if directly linked to the Garda station instead of to recording equipment in the hall. Cllr Fred Treacy said it would be much more effective if linked to

the barracks. In agreement, Cllrs Collins and Cotter said monitors there for existing CCTV cameras in the town had zoom capacity while Cllr Tomas O'Brien said cameras outside The White Lady Hotel were also excellent.

Cllr Noel Harrington said vehicles were broken into and damaged at The Ramparts, Scilly and Ardbrack and suggested a mobile CCTV camera be used in such places.

Cllr Collins complimented Gardai on recently observing two sergeants and a guard quizzing youngsters drinking in a public place at the Low Road walk at Scilly.

It was agreed to discuss vandalism, security cameras, anti social behaviour in some housing estates and other issues at the next meeting of Kinsale's new Joint Policing Committee (1PC).

The town clerk said that following a two week survey by traffic warden Mr Tim O'Donovan, it was established that 21 spaces could be marked out at the Bowling Green car With regard to the park. proposal for pay parking to offset some of the €300,000 incurred for buying the lease for the green, nine residents' parking permits would be needed plus three reserved for staff which was quite high. It was estimated the cost of putting in a pay parking machine etc would be recouped in three years.

If pay parking was agreed, it would require a formal change of the by-laws and it was also proposed to include pay parking at the Town Park on the area occupied each summer by Piper's Funfair. Both proposals would have to be advertised, Ms Kelleher added. On a proposal by Cllr Darren Cotter, it was agreed to discuss the matter again at the next meeting.

In reply to a request from Cllr O'Brien, Garda Sergeant Pat Ryan said there is currently one camera from the Kinsale town CCTV system that can monitor Archdeacon Duggan Bridge from

a distance. It is used for any incident reported in its vicinity and also monitors the Castlepark and World's End areas.

'An additional camera at close proximity to the bridge which would give better clarity as to activities in that area is the ideal solution. The cost to put this in place and link it to the Garda Station is approximately €28,000', Sqt Ryan added. It was agreed to refer the matter to the JPC but Cllr O'Brien said an effective camera could significantly reduce the high cost of calling out emergency/rescue services which were not always necessary.

Cllr O'Brien welcomed the news that the public toilets, which were vandalised over the May bank holiday weekend, had reopened at the start of June.

Mr Tony Lane, who is chairman of Kinsale Harbour Commissioners Kevin O'Donovan, and Mr Travellers liaison officer in Cork County Council, were unanimously elected to represent the voluntary/community sector on the JPC. Welcoming the appointments. Cllr Collins predicted the JPC would benefit the town and community.

Cambium is a nursery with principles in organic growing set up and run by Iona Rea Wilson and Daniel Krakauer. Really it is three businesses in one: nursery, woodwork shop and landscape gardening. They specialise in culinary herbs, edible gardens, vegetable plants and home-growing in tiny spaces.

lona and Daniel started work on Cambium in January, on the first Monday of the new year. Their six day working week soon turned into seven days a week of planning, sourcing and building new infrastructure. In the first week in February they put up their polytunnel, or polywonkel as they call it, due to it's unique shape as a result of being moulded by strong winds. They are passionate about every detail of their business, for example they use coir or coconut fibre pots because they are better for plant roots than other biodegradable pots.

The couple both attended Kinsale Further Education College and Daniel also did a market garden course with Jim Cronin in Clare. Starting a plant nursery was the perfect way to to put their knowledge to use and to take advantage of their garden space. Daniel had a background in woodwork before studying permaculture, so he has been making lots of raised beds, funky window boxes and and plant containers. The Cambium stall itself is a beautiful example of this side of the business.



Iona and Daniel have a stall at the Farmers market on Wednesdays and at the Seaview market on Saturdays and Sundays. Their plants are also for sale in Diva's Deli in Ballinspittle and Rohu's country market in Inishannon. They are currently working on plans to set up a small garden centre

Kinsale Man's Contribution Acknowledged

Fittingly the members of Kinsale Harbour Board stood for one minutes silence at the monthly meeting of the local board to mark the recent passing of one of the town's favourite sons, Mr Seamus O'Neill.

A member of the voluntary Harbour Board Committee for twenty five years, Mr O'Neill had also served as Chairman for one term.

Addressing April's meeting, Board Chairman, Mr Tony Lane, extended the sympathy of the entire committee to Seamus's son, Eamonn, who is the fourth generation of the O'Neill family to serve on Kinsale's Harbour Board.

Reflecting on Mr O'Neill's career in public life, Mr Lane acknowledged the contribution the late Mr O'Neill had made not just to the local Harbour Board but also as an elected member of Kinsale Urban District Council, holding the office of Chairman for a number of terms.

A tireless campaigner for the town, Mr Lane highlighted the late Mr O'Neill's extraordinary vision in the 1950s in attracting French fishing vessels to Kinsale, bringing much welcome trade to the then stagnant port. In fact Mr O'Neill's efforts to establish economic links between the two republics did not go unrecognised and he was decorated by the French government in 1991 for his contribution for building an entente between the two fishing communities.

Member of both the Harbour Board and Kinsale Town Council, Mr Billy Lynch, who is also a local fisherman, said: "The late Mr O'Neill was a unique individual who will not be just missed by the French fishermen but also by the entire seafaring community in the harbour."

Also wishing to be associated with the previous remarks was long-serving board member Mr Frank Kieran, while Harbour Board Commissioner and County Mayor, Mr Kevin Murphy, said the late Mr O'Neill was a straighttalking individual, who always spoke his mind.

Mr Murphy added: "It is a shame Seamus will not be present at the naming of the former mill building in the town in honour of his late grandfather, Mr James O'Neill, later in the year."

Mr Murphy said: "The O'Neill family has made a unique contribution to the economic growth of the town and it is fitting that the former mill building will be dedicated to the memory of the late James O'Neill.

With further tributes being paid by Mr Alan Coleman, Mr Virgil Horgan, Mr Tony Cierans and Mr Pat Guilfoyle, the late Mr Seamus O'Neill's son, Eamonn, thanked the Board Members for their kind words and expressed his appreciation on behalf of the O'Neill family.

KINSALE HARBOUR NETS €1.25 MILLION

There was welcome news for Kinsale Harbour recently with the announcement that the town is to receive \leq 1.2 million for capital projects.

The substantial contribution includes €420,000 for the ongoing work at the main pier, €300,000 for remedial work at Lobster Quay, €400,000 for an extension to Adams Quay and €130,000 to cover the cost of the design stage of a proposed extension to the main pier. There was a broad welcome from all nine members of the voluntary Harbour Board to the significant allocation of funding for the existing and proposed capital projects in the historic port.

Chairman of Kinsale Harbour Board, Mr Tony Lane, said: "The investment will certainly go a long way in securing the jobs of those who make their livelihood from the sea." In addition to the fifteen fishing vessels currently operating out of the busy harbour, the port also provides substantial employment, with Henry Good Limited importing animal bulk feed and grain for the brewing industry at the main pier.

However, despite securing the funding, the members of Kinsale Harbour Board expressed their frustration at its most recent meeting at the slow progress in deciding the future of the voluntary board. As far back as 1999, a KPMG report recommended that Kinsale Harbour Board should be transferred from the control of the Department of Transport to Cork County Council but despite a number of meetings between the Department and the local authority no announcement has been made on the Board's future.

Harbour Commissioner Eamonn O'Neill, a fourth generation member of the Board, has consistently argued that the services of the existing Board be retained in running the harbour and his suggestion has received universal support from all nine members of Kinsale Harbour Board.
